#### Dear Friends,

In last months letter I told that our Vicar, Hugh Trenchard, was retiring on ill health grounds, sadly I must tell you that before actually retiring, Hugh died on the 16<sup>th</sup> November. This was a great shock to us all and we hold his wife Gill and mother Eunice in our prayers. It was our hope that in retirement that Hugh would be able to begin to recover his health to the extent that he and Gill would be able to enjoy some years together. By the time you read this Hugh's funeral will have taken place and we will have said our farewells and have the opportunity to thank God for Hugh's ministry amongst us.

I first met Hugh while he was in transition from the Rectorial Benefice Cyncoed and his move to the Board of Mission where he served as the Social responsibility Officer (SRO) co-ordinating the Church in Wales Province for this activity. He came into my office at the Welsh Office seeking European grants for the church; I remember saying that I could spare him 15 minutes, but we parted 2 hours later after deep theological discussion and lots of cups of tea. I subsequently attended some of his meetings with Diocesan SRO officers and later joined the Board of Mission Council. During his ministry in the Caerwent Benefice we have been in close contact and I have had the benefit of his wide knowledge of church history and the breadth and depth of his reading. His pastoral ministry with the sick and bereaved is widely acknowledged especially by those that receive it. We will miss him for many reasons.

The four Parochial Church Councils will now play their part in seeking a new minister for our Benefice, and this work starts at the beginning of December and we pray that God will guide us all as we draw up a "Parish profile" describing our vision for the future of our parishes. During the interregnum we must work together supporting each other so that God's work may continue during this time. Our Group service is on the 30<sup>th</sup> December at St. Mary's Llanfair Discoed at 9.45 a.m. and the Penhow group of parishes have accepted an invitation to join us.

Advent Sunday is on the 2<sup>nd</sup> December and it's during the season of Advent that we reflect on our Christian lives and prepare to once again celebrate the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the greatest of all God's gifts to us. Yes there will be other preparations in progress for Christingles and Nativity plays as well as hunting for Christmas gifts, but these will be meaningless at heart of what we do is to the glory of God.

There are many services in December to which we can look forward to, and I hope as many of you as possible will come along and join the celebrations.

I wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas and New Year.



yesterday and they are looking fine, shows how tough they can be. Hopefully I will also get these planted this weekend, but if I do, they will be protected from the worst of the winter weather by a couple of cloches, just as an insurance policy. I will put some more seeds in pots over the coming weeks.

This should help ensure that some survive and that we extend the cropping period over a longer time. I'm also going to try some early peas. As before these will be sown in peat in a length of gutter in the greenhouse, but will be planted in the tunnel for a bit of extra protection. Hopefully this will provide us with a first picking of peas in early May.

One job I really need to concentrate on over the coming weeks is hedge cutting. We don't have many evergreen hedges at Barn Farm, so cold frosty weather isn't normally a problem. We have some nice beech and mixed hedges that need attention, but these can be cut at any time now and in any weather. The little box hedge around the formal part of the garden will need to be cut when there is no threat of frost though. If not, the cut edges soon turn brown and then you run the risk of getting die-back, which spoils the effect. One other job I really must get round to as well is sorting out the fruit cage, removing all this years fruiting canes, especially from the raspberries. Maybe a job to be left for after the Christmas pudding!

Here's wishing you all a happy and successful Christmas and New Year. Happy gardening until next year.

# The Christmas Mini Fair at Shirenewton Church On Sunday 9th December

Every year the Sunday Club supports the **Tigers Club** in Uganda and we hold a Christmas Mini fair in the church. After the church service, we will be selling our recycled Christmas cards and tags, pots of spring bulbs, mini Christmas cakes, Christmas Yule baskets and much, much more. The members of Sunday Club work hard to make the crafts and to run the Mini Fair themselves - so do support them by coming along on the 9<sup>th</sup> at around 10.45.

The umbrella organisation for The Tigers is Retrack and I have just read the Annual Review and it makes for challenging reading. One 12 year old, abused by his step father walked 85 km to Kampala and, in return for shelter, was required to scavenge for scrap metal. But he was accused of stealing, severely beaten and three of his fingers cut off. Luckily he was found by, and is being cared for the Tigers.

The review admits the work is not easy - many of the boys have suffered rejection, abuse and violence whist living rough on the streets and it takes a lot of hard work, perseverance and patience to regain the trust of these boys. But it pays off - by the end of 2006, 573 homeless children had been offered a permanent alternative to life on the streets.

So please support Sunday Club's Mini Fair. All the money will go to the fantastic work that is being carried out by the Retrack's Tigers Club in Uganda.

I've been busy cementing an edge in alongside our drive. I think I mentioned that the strip to the fence was then going to be filled with soil, planted up with spring bulbs and sown with grass. I have completed just over half now and although I say so myself it is beginning to look quite tidy. Being mean, I didn't want to have to buy several tonnes of topsoil to fill this area in - more importantly this isn't very environmentally sound. Instead I am digging the paths up in between the raised beds in the vegetable patch, using this in the base, as it's a bit varied in nature. Next to go in is the bonfire, well sort of anyway! There is about ten years worth of bonfire to remove. This comprises of a mixture of ash, peat and soil. The first is self explanatory, the peat has come from years of pots and planters that were dumped for disposal, but never burnt and the soil has come from the numerous plants and weeds that we have also disposed of. Some of which has burnt, but most of which has rotted down into what is a quite nice loamy mixture. I am having to remove the odd coat hanger and door hinge, not to mention some plastic pots that have got mixed in as well, but at least we are re-cycling what we can. I am also pinching a couple of barrow loads of fine soil from the raised beds, but the reasoning behind this is to allow me the room to administer several barrow loads of manure instead. Each bed will shortly be rough dug and covered with manure so that it has the winter to gradually work in.

The onions I planted in early October are now through and look well. I haven't noticed any garlic yet, so I hope my experiment of saving some cloves from last seasons' crop works out. If not the household will be garlic free next year – good news for vampires! I need to get on and clean off one of the raised beds this weekend if the weather is kind. We had a collection of asparagus crowns delivered this week, and I need to get these into the ground as soon as possible. They look well at the moment but if the weather proves unkind I will have to earth them in somewhere sheltered to keep them going until I can prepare the bed. The autumn broad beans that I planted in pots were moved out of the greenhouse the other day. Mice had succeeded in eating four of them, which is amazing really because the two black and white cats we have usually sleep in the same greenhouse. The bean plants were starting to get drawn up in the warmth. Unfortunately I chose to put them out just before the cold night but I looked at them

#### Gardening Corner

Funny to think that it is now almost the end of November as I write this page, the last in 2007. Looking outside into the garden I can see clematis, roses, penstemons and even the odd iris still flowering away, not to mention the more traditional autumn type flowers. Even the bees from our hives are flying strongly. This can be good as well as bad news, depending on whether they are finding much food. I was watching some entering one hive the other day but they were carrying little pollen. If they remain active the likelihood is that they will burn more food flying around than they are actually bringing into the hive. I did check the status of the hives several weeks ago and they had a good supply of honey that should see them through a normal winter. I was hoping to extract some honey this year but for the amount that I would have bottled I decided it was best to leave with the bees!

The under-gardener has been busy cutting away those flowers that have finished for the year. This is a lot earlier than usual as we wouldn't bother normally until late spring. However we decided that as we might get a really wet winter again (at least more a risk of this than extremely cold!), it would be better to remove the rotting foliage, as it sheltered huge numbers of slugs and snails last year. The frogs and hedgehogs snaffled many of them, but they struggled! Talking of hedgehogs, we will leave all the tall grasses to gradually fall down. These provide the perfect home for an active hedgehog, during the winter, as they can get right in underneath the grass that acts like a thatched roof. Reminds me of the nest we found several seasons ago when the little animal had found a carrier bag and pushed that just under the grass layer, to help keep his leaf bed nice and dry!

The better weather has meant that the greenhouse had an extended season as well. We have just picked the last tomatoes and cucumber, fortunately just before the cold frosty night of last week. Unfortunately that night finished the dwarf beans off that we had in the tunnel. I was away in Cambridge and forgot to give the underling instructions on covering them up with fleece. Never mind, the carrots are still going, and we have plenty of leeks, Brussels and parsnips to keep us going well beyond Christmas. The greenhouse has been cleared of all the old plant material and this has been put on the bonfire. Most of the stems and leaves had traces of tomato blight, so I didn't want to have this introduced to the compost heap.

#### **STARGAZING IN DECEMBER**

The planet Venus is still shining very brightly to the south in the morning sky.

The crescent moon lies near Venus at early morning on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> December.

The reddish planet Mars can be seen in the evening sky to the south-east, to the right of the bright stars Castor and Pollux in the constellation of Gemini, the Twins. It is getting brighter until it is at its closest to Earth on 17 December, the closest for two years.

The Winter Solstice, the shortest day of the year occurs on the 22<sup>nd</sup> December.

In the evening, to the southeast the constellation Orion is particularly impressive – three bright stars make up his belt; two stars are his shoulders, and two more make his legs. The bright blue-white star in Orion's right leg is Rigel. The bright star at Orion's left shoulder is Betelgeuse (pronounced "beetle-juice"). Betelgeuse means "the armpit of the giant"! Betelgeuse has a reddish colour – it is a vast red super-giant star, large enough to contain the entire path of the Earth round the Sun. Because massive stars burn their fuel at a much faster rate, Betelgeuse has an estimated lifetime of only 5 to 10 million years. This can be compared with our Sun's lifetime of about 10 billion years.

The W-shape of Cassiopeia lies to the northwest, whilst the 7 stars forming the Plough can be seen in the northeast.

Edward Joseph Lowe lived at Shirenewton Hall from 1880 until his death in 1900. His many interests included Astronomy. In the summer of 1860 he joined a group of scientists led by the Astronomer Royal on the HMS Himalaya to carry out scientific observations of the Total Solar Eclipse in the Bilbao region of Northern Spain.

#### **SHIRENEWTON MOTHERS UNION**

At our meeting on the 14<sup>th</sup> November 8 members and three guests welcomed Jean Hackett who now represents the Diocese on the Faith and Policy Unit at Mary Sumner House, as our Speaker on The Slave Trade past and present. She gave a well researched and presented graphic display to illustrate her talk. Whilst there is little we can now do to change what happened in the past, Jean urged us to support any efforts by the MU (and other groups) to bring to light cases of domestic and commercial slavery being perpetrated in the South Wales area.

Jean also brought to our attention the fact that recently the United Nations Commission on the Status of women, of which the MU is a member, agreed that the Commission should call on governments and relevant institutions to act for global development, and particularly to: –

- 1. Recognise the critical role of both formal and non-formal education in the achievement of poverty eradication and other development goals.
- 2. Increasing girls' ability to attend school and extra-curricular activities by investing in public infrastructure projects and quality public services.
- 3. Put simply this means that women and girls should have access to schools and other educational projects and that money should be invested in such things as easy access to clean water. At the moment many girls spend hours fetching water and helping in the home while the boys go to school. The MU wants to change this.

Jean told us that the UK Government committed itself to implementing these two agreements in March 2007 but she asks MU members and others who support our aims to write to our MP to ask him to urge the Government to keep its promises and do more to give every girl the opportunity to be educated. For those with internet connections there is now a direct link to the Prime Minister at "10 Downing St. e-petitions" found through the Google search engine.

#### Caroline's Cookery Corner

I apologise for giving a recipe that is out of season, it's something that really annoys me, but as there are so many frozen lobsters around now I have been asked by a few people how to prepare and cook them, so I thought I Would write it in this months mag. In case anyone wants it for Christmas.

To prepare the lobster is simple. Place underside down and with a sharp knife cut lengthways—you can see a fine line down the back I generally stick the knife through the top of the shell and cut down the tail, then turn it around to finish cutting the head. On the inside just below the eye is a sac, remove that on both halves. Now the lobster is ready for to eat if serving cold.

I recently made a risotto with lobsters, a little fiddly but tasty. Remove all the flesh from the lobster—cracking the claws with a nutcracker. When removing the flesh from the shell you will find some feathery bits—throw those away and place the rest in a saucepan with water and a fish stock cube and boil for 20 minutes. Cut the tail into large chunks . Fry chopped onion and celery in oil until soft. Add a good knob of butter and risotto rice and stir until the rice is coated . Add a good splash of wine and reduce , , then add the stock so that it coats the reduce— keep adding more stock until the rice is nearly cooked. Add frozen peas and chopped cherry tomatoes. When the rice is cooked and moist add the lobster to heat it through. Finally stir in chopped parsley and season.

Sorry I have not given any quantities, but I just threw everything in.

If you want to serve the lobster hot without going to all the trouble of picking it out; cut in half, remove the sac—(all the rest is delicious).

Crack the claws, dot the flesh with 1 oz. butter and place under the grill in a tin for about 8 minutes until heated through—don't overcook or it will be rubbery.

Melt 1 oz butter in a small saucepan, add a 1/4 pint double cream & a good dash of Worcestershire sauce and season. When lobster is heated through, pour any juices from the grill papoured over each half.n into the sauce and boil for a minute.

Serve the lobster with the sauce .

In the run up to Christmas I hope you will be doing your online shopping through the Church website. Remember it costs you nothing and the church gets a commission on your sale. I constantly stress that most of the 'big' high street stores are represented on the site. So, if you are shopping at John Lewis, Tescos, Argos, etc you can access their websites through the church site and earn the church a small commission for doing so.

Since I started monitoring the site with a 'proper' monitoring system in early June this year, I can report that we have had 395 unique visitors with almost 2,500 page views from 23 countries including Australia, the USA, Canada and, of course, Ireland and the UK. They can't all be interested in the community council minutes - can they?

Now listen very carefully I shall type this only once - reading it MAY SAVE YOU MONEY. Now I have your attention ........

Two recent aspects of my personal computing are worth relating. Both involve renewals. Lets call them the saga of the printer and the saga of the security suite.

The saga of the printer: So our HP DeskJet had run out of ink and needed new printer cartridges. I searched the usual suspects (through the church website of course). They are the Inkclub, Ink Factory, Amazon, etc. I couldn't believe that the B&W cartridge was £22.92 and the colour cartridge was £45.99. Ouch. I search sites not on the church website - no difference! So I purchased the cheaper recycled cartridges at £4.98 & £7.99 respectively. They didn't work. In fact I've never had success with any of the 'plug compatible' or 'recycled' printer cartridges. So what was a man to do? The answer, obviously, was to buy a new printer. I purchased a brand new HP DeskJet colour printer (which, by the way, also acted as a photocopier and scanner) for about £35. New cartridges for this printer were £8 and £9.50 respectively. So, hard to believe but true, a new more functional printer and new cartridges for less than the cost of the cartridges for the old printer. We as a family run 5 separate PCs and we had a 5-PC licenses. When I looked at the cost of the renewal I was horrified. So a bit of research later I saved around £30 buying purchasing two brand new 3 user licenses of the Kaspersky Internet Security 7 - which comes very highly rated at the moment.
