Dear Friends,

As I write Christian Aid week is coming to an end; it began on Sunday 13th May and ends on Sunday 19th May. If you missed the red envelope there is still time to donate to this wonderful charity by either contacting someone from your church or by going on line <u>www.christianaid.org.uk</u>.

Christian Aid is Britain's longest running door-to-door fund-raising drive, it is 50 years old this year. In 1957 £26,000 was raised for its overseas work collected by some 200 supporters up and down the country. That was a lot of money then and today, due to inflation and other factors, the figure needed is £15.5 million. It is likely that some 300,000 volunteers will be posting the red envelopes through letter boxes and returning to collect them with, hopefully, generous donations enclosed. When gift aided, a donation provides an added bonus to Christian Aid.

Christian Aid works with 700 organisations in 50 developing countries. As well as its work on HIV, education, health and sanitation, and peace and reconciliation, the charity is training people to deal with the effects of climate change which is already destroying the lives of thousands of vulnerable people across the world. As well as door-to-door collections Christian Aid is encouraging us not only to give money, but also to plant trees in our gardens, community spaces and churchyards, as a way of reflecting on the impact of deforestation and climate change on poor communities around our fragile planet.

I suspect that many of us enjoyed gifts and festive food at Eastertide and we enjoy our homes, gardens and a lifestyle which two thirds of the world's population cannot even dream about as all they have experienced is just surviving from day to day. As we approach Pentecost, we are reminded in our Sunday Scripture readings, that after Our Lord's Ascension to his Father, he gave us the power of the Holy Spirit to be with us to strengthen our faith to follow in the way that Christ had taught as being God's plan for his world and for all his people. I know that a number of events have taken place in our parishes to give added support to Christian Aid and there will be others during the year supporting a number of projects in developing countries but we can give even more by supporting Fair Trade as much as possible in our shopping and in our general awareness of the needs of the hungry, the poor, the homeless, the orphaned children, the widows and elderly. This is the teaching of Our Lord.

I sat down (yes it does happen occasionally!) with a cup of coffee the other morning and watched a number of blue tits hopping from one plant to another in the nearest flower border. Were flying away with bills full of little green caterpillars, so at least they were earning their keep! Talking of earning their keep the cats continue to bring back a steady supply of rabbits, which hopefully will keep them away from the garden! In fact the other morning the under gardener warned me that there was half a rabbit left on the drive that needed clearing away! I was a bit shocked when I went to do this 'nasty' task to find that it was actually a squirrel! We haven't had a cat catch one of these since we lost our tortoiseshell some five years ago. I can only think that it is the nutty one (Alice- so called as she has black eye patches just like Alice Cooper the punk rocker!) as she attacks anything that is about. Underneath the fluff she is tiny, so if it was she must have had a bit of a tussle. I can't think it was either of the other two black and white cats as they are too idle! Anyway I digress. Bugs! Oh yes we have had the usual attack of lily beetle and I see also that the verbascums are showing the first signs of mulleon moth attack. Unfortunately the caterpillars of these are black, yellow and white - very similar to cabbage whites and the birds seem to leave these alone. This means I will either have to resort to hand squashing (not a task I particularly relish!) or getting the sprayer out – another task I don't particularly relish!

I have managed to prune most of the soft fruit canes for this year at long last. The final ones will come under the cutters this weekend. A bit on the late side but never mind! Another outstanding job that I'd like to get sorted is the small box hedge around the formal garden. This was lightly trimmed towards the end of last season, but with no late frosts and this warm spring the hedge has the look about it that it never actually stopped growing! Still must get on otherwise none of these 'little' jobs will get done. Look forward to seeing some of you at the garden openings this year. Happy gardening until next month. Steve Hunt.

many of our herbaceous plants that we sell, and she has also kept on top of the many vegetable plants. The tomatoes have all responded well to being put into bigger pots, as have the cucumbers and Melons. The squashes and courgettes just kept growing and growing so I had to bite the bullet and plant them out in the vegetable garden. These should continue growing well now with the rain – just as long as we don't get any late frosts! I can't believe that we will now, but we all know just how funny the British weather can be! We'll just have to keep the fingers crossed and hope for the best as I took the bull by the horns and planted out the first climbing French beans and also the dwarf variety as well. These really do not like a sniff of cold weather and will soon get covered in horticultural fleece if even a cooler night is predicted!

Elsewhere in the vegetable garden I managed to sow the bulk of the carrot seed and beetroot just before the rain came. Hopefully this will mean a bumper year for germination, but over the last few years this seems to have been very erratic, although I can't really understand why? The first sowing of parsnips has produced just about enough plants for a crop, but I certainly won't need to thin them out! I have bought another packet of seed and this will get sown this weekend. It is almost too late for this, but they will only have two chances! The green plants (Brussel sprouts, broccoli, cabbage and cauliflowers) have all been placed in the cold frame to harden off a little before planting. These will go into the raised beds this weekend and be covered over with some fine netting at the same time. Hopefully this will keep the cabbage white butterflies away until the produce can be picked.

Unfortunately I have a feeling that this year is going to be a bad one for pests and diseases! Already the roses and lupins have been covered in greenfly, but fortunately the mild weather has encouraged the ladybirds as well. These are voracious predators of greenfly and the young mop up this pest in quick order. The aquilegias have been well and truly attacked by the sawfly caterpillars, with a few plants being stripped of every leaf before the birds found the bounty! clearing away!

THE CHURCH EXTENSION

Work continues on the building of the Church Hall and toilets.

The construction of the internal walls for toilets and kitchen area are now very nearly complete., and work has now started on the process of laying the first courses of stone cladding for the exterior walls. This will result in the exterior of the new building blending in with the overall structure of the existing Church. The stone being used has come from local quarries enabling stone of the same type to be used. With the newly dressed stone being slightly lighter in colour, but with weathering, will in a short time blend to same colour as the existing building. It is estimated that some 40 ton of stone will be needed, all to be hand dressed.

Gardening Corner

Well the cuckoo eventually arrived, although it wasn't until the 22nd of April before we heard his distinctive call. Nearly a week and a half later than usual, which was surprising given just how unseasonably warm the weather has been. It's only in the last few days that his calling has become a regular sound in the woodland opposite Barn farm. I say surprising because many of our usual garden birds, the ones that act as surrogate mothers for the cuckoo chick, have been nesting for some time and many have already had their first hatch of youngsters. That cuckoo may just have to wait a bit longer for a second clutch of eggs! The artificial nests for the house martins have been a distinct success. Scout birds were already flying low around me whilst I was trying to fix the nests to the walls. Within a couple of days all eight were taken. Two of them are very close to our bedroom window. I love waking up in the mornings to the sound of these little birds 'talking' to each other before they fly the nest for their breakfast.

Well as predicted the weather did eventually break and lo and behold we seem to have had continuous rain ever since! Of course things are never right! The ground is now well and truly digable again but unfortunately too wet to get on it in most places. The good side is that at least I have been able to get on and plant up some of the bare areas in the borders. The main flowerbeds have really responded to the warm soil and rainfall with the growth in the last week or so being phenomenal. Of course this means that many of the flowers are getting well advanced, with some varieties coming out well before their official flowering period. Fortunately for us here the garden is only open twice this year, once at the end of May and then middle of June. Hopefully this will mean that visitors will catch it right for sheer 'flower power'. Our last opening in July 2006 was starting to lose its impact as the hot dry weather was really starting to bite by then and many flowers were shutting down early. We did get a late flush, with many varieties still flowering in November, which was good for us, but not the visitors!

In the greenhouse the under gardener has been busy re-potting many of our herbaceous plants that we sell and has also kept on top of the many vegetable plants. The tomatoes have all responded well to being put into



Caroline's Cookery Corner

Before we moved to the village we used to live in Pangbourne where I had various , sometimes very interesting cooking jobs

The first recipe was from one of the "Large houses" I worked in—very easy—the second was for a "Home cooking" Freezer farm shop.

Easy haddock with mushrooms & cream.

A couple of pieces of fresh haddock - 1/4 chopped onion 8 sliced mushrooms - 1/2 pint double cream - Butter

Fry the onion, 8 sliced mushroom in butter, turning gently until soft. Spread a quarter of the mix over an oven-proof dish, add the haddock, cover with remaining mix, pour over the cream and bake in a moderate oven until cooked.

Fish Crumble

This quantity is enough for a party, it can be made in advance and frozen.

| 2lb. White haddock | 2lb smoked haddock | | 1lb prawns |
|---------------------|---------------------|-----------|-----------------|
| 4zos mushrooms | a little white wine | | 2 pints of milk |
| 1 tsp Dijon mustard | flour | | margarine |
| 1 1/2—2 lb onions | parsley, | bay leaf, | pinch of mace |

The Crumble

12 oz. flour 6 oz margarine 3 oz grated Cheddar

2 oz grated Parmesan.

Finely chop the onion & fry until golden.

Cook the fish in milk with sliced onion, bay &mace. Cool, drain (reserve) and skin, bone and flake. Make a roux with wine, flour, margarine & reserved strained milk—add mustard, parsley & onions. Gently mix in the fish and put into an oven-proof dish.

Mix the crumble, place on top of the mix, and bake in a moderate oven.

Police Report

- 1. Four accidents on the Usk Road including one involving a stolen car and two involving motor bikes.
- 2. Suspicious people hanging around the school grounds were arrested over a crime committed in Tintern.
- 3. The Rave PC Mason could not give too many details as its subjudiciary with several arrests made and equipment confiscated. But he did say it was the biggest rave in the country broken up by Police (eventually!), who only went in when the fires started. It was a particularly well-organised, international event, with the venue not known except by organisers until the last minute, so very difficult for the police to prepare for. However the police in South Wales are looking more widely at local responses to major incidents of this nature. The Council will be writing to the Chief Constable outlining local concerns about the rave and it's handling.

Stiles on the golf course have, for the most part, been replaced by gates. Water disconnection – Dwr Cymru do intend to install a generator to take over when the power fails but are still in discussion with the Forestry over fuel storage in the area.

Tan House planning application seems to have stalled. No one is chasing the MCC for a response.

Llanmelin Hill Fort has been purchased by the Welsh Assembly and there are plans for a car park in the area. There will be a management committee drawn from Caerwent and Shirenewton councils.

A member of the public attending the meeting asked for signs to be erected between Gaerllwyd and Shirenewton warning motorists that there may be horses on the road.

And finally someone has apparently been removing Community Council notices and minutes from the notice boards, particularly in Earlswood. If you need a copy they are available from the church website.

Next meeting will be on June 4th at 7.30 p.m.

All adverts on the site are the same as the church shopping portal and contribute to the Church and any cash we get from advertising will go to the Church. STARGAZING IN JUNE 2007

The conspicuous constellation of the Plough lies high in the evening sky to the northwest. The two stars at the ploughshare end are called the Pointers, and are so-called because they point to Polaris, the North Star. Polaris is one of the stars in the constellation of Ursa Minor which looks like a smaller, fainter copy of the Plough.

The W-shape of Cassiopeia lies in a north-easterly direction. Leo the Lion, shaped rather like a reversed question mark, can be seen in the west. Cygnus the Swan lies in the eastern sky. It is one of the most distinctive constellations, often nicknamed the Northern Cross.

Venus is the brilliant Evening Star in the north-west. At the end of June the planet Saturn is moving close to Venus. Jupiter rises later in the evening. On the 6th June, Jupiter is at "Opposition", where it is closest to Earth and so at its brightest. The Crescent Moon and Venus are close together on the 18th June and should make a fine sight.

The great Italian scientist Galileo used his telescope or what was then called an "optic tube" to map the Moon, and estimated the height of its mountains to be roughly 5 miles. This is surprisingly accurate considering his measurements were made 400 years ago.

On the $21^{\rm st}$ June the Earth's axis is tilted towards the Sun to its greatest extent and the Sun reaches its highest position in the sky at noon. This is the longest day or summer solstice in the Northern Hemisphere.
