

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Dear Friends,

Late September is the beginning of the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, and is therefore the time of the year when our thoughts turn to Harvest Festivals. It's a time when we thank God for all the gifts He has so lovingly and generously provided. Each of the churches in our Group will have celebrated their Harvest Service by the time this reaches you, but I hope you will have attended one of them and enjoyed the feasts provided.

As we enjoy food and company we are mindful of the great inequalities across the world; the famines and sufferings of so many nations. Every Sunday in our prayers (and daily in our private prayers) we pray for peace so that the prosperity we enjoy and take for granted, can spread to every country. We especially pray for the people of Zimbabwe and Darfur that some urgent action is taken by world leaders to relieve the terrible conditions these people suffer. Our churches support a number of charities in Africa and a good deal of hard work in raising funds is ongoing year round, this is in addition to raising funds to keep our buildings in good order. Some readers may think that the churches are always asking for money, but you can be assured that is shared with those who have less and often have next to nothing. Bishop Dominic has asked that thanks be sent to all those that donated to last year's Lent appeal for the Diocese of the Highveld in South Africa to which we are linked. A grand sum of £33,033 was raised and will be used to extend the children's feeding programme and to invest in some of it to provide income to continue the work.

Children are now back at school and our Sunday Clubs are meeting on Sunday mornings to which children are welcome. The clubs also work hard at fund raising for their chosen charities and I know parents generously help this important work so that children and young people learn to appreciate how fortunate they are in their homes and schools. Thank you and please continue with this vital part of Christian teaching.

Advent begins on the second of December, but before then there will be many event including the Diocesan Conference on 20th October at County Hall. On this occasion all parishes will be presenting to Bishop Dominic their church plans for the next five years, mapping work on which each of our parishes has been engaged during this year. If you want to know

more do come along to the conference , and in any case I hope all church members will attend. It is always possible to pick up good ideas that others have found helpful in building their church membership and in spreading the love of God which we are called to do as Christ's disciples.

Advent is the start of the Church's year, although we may think that September starts our winter programme! It is the time when we start our Bible study meetings on Wednesday evenings at 7.30 p.m. As we approach Advent and Christmas we will be studying the book of the Prophet Malachi was the last of the prophets of Israel for 400 years before the emergence of John the Baptist the last prophet before Jesus. It is the Prophet Malachi who foretells the coming of John the Baptist in the spirit of Elijah to prepare the way for our Lord Jesus Christ. Do come and join us in the warm vestry of Caerwent Church. If we want to bring others to share in the love and knowledge of our Lord Jesus we need to continue to learn and grow in the knowledge of our Christian faith. The Bible is our manual and we need to become fully conversant with it in the same way as followers of other faiths do with their holy books. and runner beans. I do wonder sometimes whether there is anything that will affect courgettes health! I bought a new gardening magazine the other day to see what it was all about. Entitled "Grow Your Own" it is full of vegetable growing features. I was a little tickled to see a book being advertised entitled "1001 Things You Can Do with Courgettes" – brings tears to my eyes just thinking about it!

We are reducing the number of plants that we grow for sale next year as we have decided that fishing, walking and generally relaxing should perhaps start to feature a little more in our itinerary. This is going to create yet more space to work with. I certainly don't intend to revert the area back to grass. Instead I'm going to dig the one side up and convert it into an area specifically for cut flower production for the house or giving away. We have a couple of raised beds that contain alstroemarias, one of mine and the under gardeners favourite flowers. These have been in the ground for probably three if not four years and have now become congested. I intend to dig these up, split them and then replant in this new bed. I also recently purchased a collection of bearded irises from France. This won't be their final home, but they can usefully grow and multiply, whilst I sort out a suitable home in the garden. For the next couple of years I intend to sort through a number of areas with the view to replanting them. One other job I need to get done shortly is to concrete an edge up our drive, and create a grass area between this and the fence. This will be naturalised with hundreds of daffodils and other spring bulbs that will hopefully create a cheerful site for us every time we go up the drive. The bulbs are in the garage waiting for October, so need to get on with this. Must get on. The train has just left Bristol Parkway so need to pack up the laptop ready for Newport.

Judges Comments:

The Village Hall was much improved and together with the well-maintained litter free play area now forms an attractive asset to the community.

Redd Landes with its immaculate lawns with sympathetic shrub and tree planting was a delight to view.

The Churchyard had been cut but would have benefited from additional attention around the perimeter wall, both internally and externally. The area around the Memorial was weedy.

The footpath to the side of the Chantry was overgrown as was the area alongside the Tan House public house; this also included rubbish and glass. Many of the gardens were a pleasure to view.

The Community Council was very pleased to accept a certificate and cheque for

the Best Kept Village Hall. These have been passed to the Recreation Association Committee with thanks to all Committee Members for their hard work.

end, with a walk through door alongside. The panels remain down for most of the day to allow for air circulation, but are easily closed at night-time. I've fixed a small gauge netting to the inside of the frame. This will hopefully stop birds getting to the early strawberries and the cabbage white butterflies to the broccoli and cauliflower's. It will also stop the cats getting in to the vegetable beds and doing what cats do best!

Prior to the cover going on I had started digging a bed all down the one side of the tunnel. This has been covered in manure ready for planting as and when. The tunnel will mean that we will be able to grow a number of crops out of season, benefiting from produce three or four weeks early and by quite a few weeks at the end of the season. I have sown carrots, beetroot, French beans, lettuce leaves and a stir frv mixture in one bed. We have been cutting the two leaf mixtures now for several weeks, but if you don't cut it too short it comes again and allows you to keep cutting over a period of several weeks. I have already sown succession crops to take over when the first give up the ghost, so hopefully we will have enough greens to keep us going until the hardest of frosts. I intend to utilise several of our earlier potato crop and plant these into a number of large flowerpots. Things might be getting a little late now but it's worth a try. Even if we only get a meal on Christmas day and New Years day it will have been worth the time taken to water.

Since the cover has gone on I've also taken the time to repair the damaged frames inside to which I have the fan-trained peaches; nectarines and apricots tied to. Whilst undertaking this job I'm also "summer" pruning this years growth. These stoned fruits, fruit on the previous years new growth so it is essential to take out as much of the older wood, that has carried the current years crop, as you can.

In the main part of the garden I have really written off a lot of the vegetable and flower areas for this year. The under gardener is going around cutting back what flowers she can in order to stop them collapsing and rotting the plants underneath. Most years we would leave this task until the late Spring, but then most years we don't have the plants laying flat in all directions! Much of the vegetable production has either failed or got some disease to finish them off. Exceptions to this are the courgettes, vegetable squashes, parsnips

Gardening Corner

At last, a change in the weather and the opportunity to get the tunnel cover back on the frame. Fortunately I had spent several evenings before the bank holiday finishing off the wooden frame to which the polythene is fixed. The forecast for the Monday looked promising so I made arrangements, booking a little help for the task in hand. The tunnel itself is 23 feet wide and some 60 feet long. As you can imagine the polythene for this is pretty heavy and takes some lifting on its own, without having to heave it over the frame which stands some fifteen feet high on the ridge. The trick is to unroll the plastic first then spread it out along the length of the tunnel. The hoops are 2 inch galvanised tubes and as you can imagine when the sun shines the metal gets very hot and in time soon deteriorates the plastic where the two touch. For this reason it is best to fit "anti hot spot tape" to the hoops. This is an insulated strip stuck to the outside of the hoops that acts as a barrier to the direct heat. It means that the polythene cover will last for at least four and often five years. The stripping also means that the cover can be pulled up over the frame with minimum friction so makes life a lot easier!

Fortunately the day chosen dawned bright and sunny with no wind, absolutely perfect for the task in hand. Unfortunately the under gardener is a little on the short side for helping with this task. This was left to my hedge and tree cutting partner. Five minutes to unroll the plastic, another five to open it out and then fifteen more to drag the cover up and over the frame and the worst of the job was done. The cover was then left for a couple of hours to start warming up in the sun. The trick is to get it soft enough to be able to pull and stretch the cover tight, so that when it cools down it gets tighter still. Stretch it too much and when it cools you can actually tear the plastic because of the pressure that the cover is under. I have found the best way to go about this is to pull the ends tight first, fixing the polythene to the door frames and then work down the sides, pulling the cover tight and fixing down as you go. It is simply fixed to the wooden frame by screwing roof battening down. I've found the best way is to actually wrap the batten inside the polythene, so that it is then impossible to tear. The main task done, it was now time to turn to the doors themselves. I have made a large drop down panel each

THE CHURCH EXTENSION

Last month we reported that the roofing slates were on site and the first slates were being fixed in position. The slating of the roof is now complete along with the ridge tiles. The cast guttering has been fixed to the fascia boards. Some weather-proofing is still to be done at the gable ends where they adjoin the walls. With minor exceptions, the stone cladding has been completed as has the stone work around the windows.



Mr Saysell has been working with the joiners who have measured the window apertures to enable the frames to be manufactured to fit stone clad apertures. Again this joinery work will be in keeping with the rest of the structure. All of this work is being carried out by craftsmen from the surrounding area.

When this next phase of work is complete the scaffolding can be removed and a fuller impression of the extension will be visible.

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Caroline's Cookery Corner

CHICKEN AND SAUSAGE PIE:

This goes down very well in our house eaten cold with salad and pickles. I vary the recipe - sometimes I add leek with the onion, a few cashew nuts, green peppercorns, chopped spinach with the sausage meat, and I like to put a slice of ham on the first layer of sausage meat.

2 tbl. spoons olive oil 1 large slice cooked ham 500 g sausages skinned 2 tsp chopped fresh thyme Dash of Worcestershire sauce 1lb 2oz boneless chicken breasts Large knob of butter
1 onion finely chopped
3 oz dried apricots—chopped
1 tsp Dijon mustard
2 oz chestnuts (canned)
500 g pack ready made
short-crust pastry

Preheat oven to 190 c /gas 5.

Heat a tbsp. oil and a knob of butter and fry the onion until soft. Cool - mix the sausage meat, onion, nuts, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, and apricots together and season. Cut chicken breasts into thin slices, season, and fry in the rest of the oil until just brown and cool. Roll out the pastry and line a 20—23 cm deep loose based tin. Add 1/2 the sausage meat and press down. Add slice of ham then the chicken, finish off with the rest of the sausage meat. Press down and cover with the remaining pastry. Brush with beaten egg or milk. Put the tin in the oven on a baking sheet for 50—60 minutes, then leave to cool completely.

Stargazing in October 2007

The planet Jupiter is very bright and can be seen in the early evening in the southwest.

Mars is rising later in the evening in the southeast, and brightens noticeably through the month.

Venus is the extremely bright Morning Star in the southeast. The less bright Saturn is also in the southeast. Both Venus and Saturn are in the constellation of Leo the Lion, which really does look like a lion.

The Moon can be a useful pointer to the planets. In the evenings of 2^{nd} and 30^{th} October it is close to Mars, on the morning of 7^{th} October the Moon is near Venus and Saturn, whilst on 15^{th} October, the crescent Moon can be seen just below the planet Jupiter.

The constellation of Cygnus the Swan lies pretty much directly above in October. Its stars form a cross – in fact it is sometimes called the Northern Cross. The seven stars of the Plough are to the North and the four stars forming the Great Square of Pegasus lie to the South. The W-shape of Cassiopeia lies fairly high in the sky to the northeast. In Roman mythology Cassiopeia was a queen chained to her throne as a punishment for being boastful.



Sales of fairly traded goods are growing at a very encouraging rate, starting, of course from a very tiny base a few years ago. My own sales are diminishing; for various reasons. The Spar sold a lot of 'my' chocolate, geobars and coffee. I used to sell quite a lot of snacks and chocolate at school, but the government, guite understandably, has banned the sale of confectionery and suchlike in schools. Traidcraft have responded by producing packets of nuts and dried fruit, but my Headmaster, to be on the safe side, has decided that it would be advisable to stop selling altogether. I have just 2 customers in the village who have bought from me regularly over quite a few years. I really hope that vast numbers of people are seeking out fairly traded products themselves. Supermarkets offer a small range. They are not really interested in expanding the market unless, of course, they are responding to demand. But customers simply will not know what is available without organizations such as Traidcraft and other independent stockists

As I have often (too often!) said before: the odd jar of coffee or pack of Christmas cards is just the first step! Have a look at the new catalogue yourself! Ornaments, jewellery, clothes, paper goods and of course FOOD - you will be astonished at the range of goods available.
