## Dear Friends,

As you know the date of Easter changes each year and as I have mentioned in an earlier letter, this year it is particularly early which means Lent is also early. Ash Wednesday, which is the first day of Lent, is on February 6<sup>th</sup> and we begin our Lenten pilgrimage with the imposition of Ashes at a service of Holy Communion at Caerwent Church at 7.30p.m. I do hope many of you will join me as we prepare to journey together towards our Faster Celebrations.

To help us on our journey we will be studying The Lord's Prayer with the York Course about this wonderful prayer that Jesus taught his disciples. Because most of us know it off by heart perhaps we do not give much time or thought to what each of the sentences mean for each of us in our daily lives. The Course will give us the opportunity to share with the speakers on the Course some refreshment of the deeper meanings. The Right Reverend David Hope, recently retired Archbishop of York, introduces the speakers who are, Canon Margaret Sentamu (wife of the present Archbishop of York), Dr. Kenneth Stevenson, Bishop of Portsmouth, Dr. David Wilkinson, Principal of St. John's College, Durham and Dr. Elaine Storkey, broadcaster and lecturer. There will be five sessions beginning on Wednesday, February 13<sup>th</sup> at 7.30p.m. at Caerwent Church, each contains a 14 minute radio-style starter for group discussion, with Simon Stanley putting questions to the three main speakers. Each session ends with reflections by Dr. Elaine Storkey followed by open discussion. Over the years, the York Courses have proved a huge success with groups throughout the world and deservedly so. In addition to the speakers supporting booklets will be available. I look forward to seeing many of you.

Each year Bishop Dominic sends his Pastoral Letter to be read to congregations at each service on the Sunday before Lent, 3<sup>rd</sup> February this year, and if anyone who is unable to attend one of the four services in the Group that Sunday and would like a copy, please ask your Churchwarden for one. Last year the Bishop asked parishes to give up a meal one day each week during Lent and send the money saved to help the people of the Highveld Diocese in South Africa to which our Diocese of Monmouth is linked. Last year the Bishop received £25,000 from the parishes and £10,000 from individual donations. The Caerwent Group of Parishes contributed £75.50. Perhaps we can improve on that this year although I recognise that each of our parishes is supporting other very good causes with generous donations.

A child in one of our Sunday Clubs asked what does Lent mean and why is it important that we should be involved. A very good question. From earliest times, the Church has observed Lent as a time when we can pause in our busy lives to reflect on how we are progressing in our Christian lives, time to think about how we are living out the promises made at our baptism. It's an opportunity to 'turn around' our lives and to get back on track with being the people God wants us to be. We are on this earth for a short time and perhaps, like me, you may feel that the older we get the faster the time seems to fly. So are we prepared for eternal life which Jesus promised and won for us with his death and resurrection? Our Lent Bible study course will help us to become the Easter people ready to celebrate the great festival on Easter Day.

Finally, a warm thank you to everyone who has so generously given a donation towards a gift in memory of Hugh Trenchard which amounted to £700. The PCC's have decided to pay for two pieces of framed art work chosen by Gill which she will be able to take with her and a cheque. Work is progressing with the preparation of our Group Parish Profile in readiness for placing an advertisement to bring us a new Priest in Charge so please continue to pray that God will call a priest to come and join us to lead us as we continue to build God's Kingdom in our parishes.

had to push the wheelbarrow uphill when loaded - not the best of directions! It had to be done this way though as I have decided to experiment with the cold frame that lies alongside the propagating house. In the past this has also been used for raising and hardening off plants (getting plants raised in the houses used to the colder air outside!). Instead I'm going to copy what the Victorians did by creating a "hotbed". This has involved digging out all the soil in half of the cold frame (hence the need to push up hill as I had a handy place to put it all). Instead of soil the area dug will be filled in completely with almost fresh horse manure to a depth of approximately a metre. This will heat up as it starts to decompose. I'll add a little more as it starts to rot down, but after about a month the manure will be covered in about six inches of soil, into which will be planted a variety of seeds. The heat from the composting manure will encourage very quick germination and encourage the crops to grow in no time at all, and should provide some really early pickings - even before the tunnel. When the bed begins to cool down, the first crops will be picked and replaced in early May by melons and courgettes, which should continue to crop until November. The soil will then be removed and the compost spread on the remainder of the vegetable patch, to be replaced with new, fresh manure and the process started all over again. The Victorians used to grow pineapples in this way, long before global warming was an issue, but I don't think I'll give them a try just yet! Still must get on I need to start chasing those horses – the under gardener has her shovel and bucket at the ready!

I planted some broad bean seeds in pots over Christmas and I noticed this weekend that they are just starting to germinate. They are on the bench in the small propagating greenhouse, but this remains unheated for the time being. I won't be putting the hot bench on probably for another three to four weeks. Although meant for warming up seed trays and encouraging the seeds to germinate, the ambient heat from this bench also helps to keep the general temperature up in the rest of the greenhouse. This allows me to start sowing less hardy crops such as tomatoes, melons and cucumbers that need a long growing season to achieve their best results, but which need some extra warmth. The beans are to be planted next in line to the potatoes as an experiment. I raised and planted some broad bean plants out in one of the raised beds at the end of November, and it will be interesting to see which survives best and provides the earliest crop. Once the hot bench goes on I'll start to sow a few varieties of lettuce. These will be ready to plant in the tunnel about middle of March and should provide some useful leaves by end of April. I'll also be sowing some "pick and come again" leaves straight into the tunnel bed. I tried these for the first time last year and they proved a great success. I have both an Italian and a French mix, so it will be nice to compare the different flavours of each. I will also put some French dwarf bean seeds in pots at the same time as the lettuce. These will be left to grow on in pots for a time in the greenhouse whilst they get bigger and the days get longer, before they too are planted in the tunnel for the earliest crop going. If we get any cold nights they will be covered over with horticultural fleece as the slightest wiff of cold weather will make them curl up and die in pretty short order.

Over the Christmas break I managed to finish off the new area alongside the driveway. This had to be filled up with soil to a depth of some half a metre, along a new retaining wall. This area is being planted with varieties of spring bulbs and once it gets a bit warmer will be levelled off and sown with grass seed. The first half I did in November is looking well and the first bulbs are showing already. I took the gamble and sowed grass as well and it just goes to show generally how mild this winter has been so far as it has germinated well. The later planted bulbs may not come to anything, but they only have two choices! Filling this area in with soil was hard work as I had

A great result! Thanks to all the hard work from the Sunday Club and to all those who came along and supported them and the Tigers Club. The pot of bulbs that I bought are showing signs that spring might be on the way.

## **Gardening Corner**

For the second time in less than a year I have ended up getting stuck in floods whilst on my travels. The first was back in July, when I ended up sleeping in the car in the middle lane of the M5 overnight. This time wasn't quite so bad as I was on the train, but it still took me six hours to get back from Reading! Whilst sitting on the coach being transported back to Newport station, I had the time to look out of the window and reflect on the year gone and wonder what the year ahead might bring in the way of good fortune or otherwise for the gardener. I guess the ground will dry out eventually, if not, perhaps we'll have to think about planting rice instead of potatoes! Its at times like this I'm so glad that we have two sizeable greenhouses as well as the large polytunnel. Inside all three it is nice and dry no matter what the weather throws at us. This does allow me to plan ahead and to carry on with the work whilst other, less fortunate gardeners must sit and watch and wait for the weather to improve before they can start to take action.

This year I have great plans to use the tunnel and greenhouses more effectively. I am currently digging up one side of the tunnel for its entire length. This will give me a bed some 2.5 metres wide and approximately 17 metres long. This has never been dug and planted before, having spent its entire life to date as a covered border for raising potted plants on. I'm building a timber side on the one edge of the bed as the garden slopes away. This will enable me to get it a little more level and is also allowing me to incorporate plenty of organic matter as well, so adding considerably to the depth of the bed. Within the next couple of weeks I will be planting a few early potatoes. These should be ready for early May, allowing a following crop of summer salads. This is most likely to be peppers or similar such crop. It wouldn't be advisable to plant tomatoes as these are the same family as spuds and so it would make them more prone to disease. I will also be sowing two or three rows of early carrots. These will provide the sweetest, most tender roots ever. I sowed several rows back in October and we have enough carrots left for probably two more meals. It was extremely satisfying to be eating home-grown baby carrots and Brussels sprouts for our Christmas meal fresh picked from the garden. Not many food miles involved in that meal!

Twin Oaks, Shirenewton. Modification to existing plans for erection of two new dwellings.



## **Items of Local Concern**

- Options for the shop will be discussed in more detail at the next meeting.
- Allotments. The National Allotments Association have opposing views to MCC and believe that the land is covered by the various Allotment Acts. So this issue is still unresolved.
- Grass cutting MCC have said they will no longer cut the grass at the Rec & Mynyddbach unless the community council pays for it to be cut. There is something of a stand-off between SCC & MCC as the councillors feel this is being imposed without any consultation with the communities affected. Whilst this debate continues the councillors did want to make it clear that the grass will be cut, the issue is who will pay for it.
- Replacement of the rocking horse in the recreation field playground. It will cost over £4,000 to replace with similar horse. Decision on this was deferred until after a visit to the school by a play leader who will ascertain what the local children would like to replace the horse.
- Best Kept Village 2008 entry will if councillors can rally support from the wider community through a village wide meeting in early March.
- Interruption of water supply, generators are on their way but may take a little time to commission once on site.

Community Council Website, the clerk suggested councillors take a look at a free site currently being used by Mathern, this raised wider discussion as to what SCC wants to achieve from their own website which can't be covered by the existing pages within the church website. Consensus view was that the church site meets the needs of the council at present but that the content should be reviewed and possibly extended.

## PARISH MAG UPDATE ON CHURCH EXTENSION FUND CHURCH EXTENSION FUND-RAISING

The church extension shell is now virtually complete and we have begun fitting it out. Please take a look at it – I'm sure you'll be impressed both by the sympathetic design and by the quality of the workmanship that has gone into it.

Fitting out entails heating, lighting, electricity, plastering and flooring as well as installing the kitchen and two toilets. Needless to say, this all comes at a price and at the last fund raising meeting, we thought we should provide an update on our funding.

To date we have raised £160,000 plus obtained a personal loan of £25,000. This is just sufficient to pay for the shell and associated fees (but not the retention on the contract). Fitting out will cost us around another £30,000. We decided to go ahead as soon as we could do the work rather than waiting until we had raised this money to avoid the risk of a substantial delay. We will pay for this by another loan which means that on current projections, we will complete the church extension with loans of around £60,000 to be repaid.

The £160,000 raised to date has come from personal donations as well as organised events like the village golf day, sponsored bike rides and proceeds from the church fete. We have obtained limited grants and also registered the church as an environmental body to get monies from the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme!

We are looking forward to planning the events that can take place in the extension – ideas so far include Cubs, art classes, dance classes, lecture evenings, lunch clubs and many others. Please let us know your ideas – we will solicit these more formally as the fitting out progresses.

A recent innovation has been the launch of a "Friends of Shirenewton Church" scheme. For an annual fee of £100 you get to support an important village amenity as well as the opportunity to attend an annual event. Put a note in your diaries – the first of these is being planned for March 14<sup>th</sup> at Caepwcella courtesy of Mike Peirce. Details on how to join the Friend's scheme are on the church website – <a href="https://www.shirenewtonchurch.com">www.shirenewtonchurch.com</a> – or please phone me for an application form. Your support for this scheme would be very welcome – we want to use the extension for a raft of activities and the quicker we can pay off



The traditional walk up to Grey Hill to observe the winter solstice took us along a different route than our usual track, this year we approached from the south side which we all agreed was a gentler climb, but once our seventeen members (and two dogs) arrived at the summit the sun rose at 8.12 am but unfortunately behind a large bank of clouds! We were consoled with an excellent breakfast at the Woodland Tavern.

On Tuesday, the 29th January we will be holding our annual quiz at the Huntsman Hotel at 7.30, everyone welcome.

On Tuesday, 26th February at the Huntsman Hotel at 7.30 their will be a talk entitled 'The Early Prehistory of South Wales' given by Elizabeth Walker (from the National Museum of Wales, Cardiff) who is an authority on this subject, who has for the last two years been studying the area around Shirenewton and made some interesting findings. This will be an interesting talk and we are very lucky to have such an eminent speaker.

## Caroline's Cookery Corner

I like to take a salad into work with me every day summer and winter. Easy to take in a plastic container they offer more variety than a sandwich.

Pear and cottage cheese is a favourite , on a bed of watercress pile a peeled, diced firm pear, cover with cottage cheese and top with mayonnaise. I like to top it with mustard and cress or chives and add a diced tomato and red onion around the edge.

Left over chicken can be mixed with chopped celery apple a few split almonds , halved grapes and mayonnaise. I have to admit I sometimes buy those individual microwave rice packs for a quick salad. Brown rice, flaked smoked mackerel chopped hard boiled eggs, chopped celery and spring onions mixed with French dressing and a dollop of horseradish sauce makes a filling salad.

I think I have mentioned before that peeled and finely sliced brussel sprouts make a good salad base. Mix the sprouts with grated carrot, sliced radish, red onion, apple celery and halved grapes and mix all with French dressing. I usually make my dressing with raspberry vinegar for a fruitier salad.

Crispy chopped bacon, hard boiled egg, lettuce, red onion, celery, cooked beetroot tomato and cubes of cheese can be tossed in French dressing or mayonnaise.

Cooked pasta mixed with tuna, red pepper, black olives, red onion and celery can be mixed with french dressing or mayonnaise

Max used to take a salad of microwave pilau rice mixed with chicken, onion, tomato cucumber grapes and mayonnaise, with a touch of mango chutney added.

My children used to take a salad roll to school. Cut the top off a crusty roll (about the size of a coin), carefully take out the all the inside with your fingers taking care not to split the sides . These can be filled with practically anything not to soggy. I used to fill with diced cheese, or chicken, tomato (without the seeds) bacon lettuce cucumber, spring onion and mayonnaise.

Bulgur, which only needs soaking in hot water, makes a good alternative base. I mix it with sliced radish, red onion, celery, and grapes, a handful of seeds (pumpkin—sunflower, etc.) and french dressing for a really crunchy salad.

Also like to grow my own shoots on the kitchen window sill; beetroot and radish are my favourites, but there are many to choose from and add variety to any salad.

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## **FAIRTRADE NEWS**

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT is almost upon us: 25 February - 9 March! Perhaps this is a good opportunity to summarize the importance of Fairtrade. The Fairtrade Foundation is an independent body which awards the FAIRTRADE mark to products which meet international standards. These include guaranteeing a stable and fair price, so that producers can plan. Workers' basic employment rights are guaranteed and producers are encouraged to care for and improve the environment so that long term development is sustainable. The Fairtrade price includes a premium which is set aside for farmers and workers to spend on social and environmental projects: these decisions are taken democratically by committees of elected farmers and workers, men and women.

Here are just a few examples:

Sugar cane growers in Malawi have used the premium to drill boreholes. Women and children no longer have to collect water from the crocodile infested Shire River.

By cutting weeds, instead of using herbicides, 1,900 organic coffee farmers in Sumatra are helping to protect local endangered species, including the Sumatran tiger.

A group of 133 banana farmers in Colombia have set up an environmental protection programme that includes reforestation, a community rubbish collection service and a plastic waste recycling scheme.

During FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT there will be stalls and various local activities. Dates and details are yet to be confirmed.

## Stargazing in February '08

The Southern evening sky is dominated by the glorious constellation of Orion the Hunter. Four bright stars represent his shoulders and legs whilst a further three form his belt. Sirius, the sky's brightest star lies to the lower left of Orion. It is also called the "Dog Star" and appears particularly bright because it happens to lie nearby compared with other stars, at a distance of 9 light years – the distance travelled by light in a period of 9 years. This can be compared with the bright blue-white star at Orion's right leg called Rigel. This is an extremely powerful star but at great distance, and is at least 60,000 times more luminous than the Sun.

The reddish planet Mars lies to the south above Orion. It is becoming less bright through the month as it moves away from earth in its orbit around the sun.

Yellowish Saturn can be seen to the south, in the evening sky, just below the constellation of Leo, which actually looks rather like a lion facing to the right.

Venus continues to be brilliant in the morning sky.

On 1<sup>st</sup> February, its well worth looking south at the early morning sky as Jupiter can be seen very close to Venus. Even better, the crescent moon appears near Venus and Jupiter on the morning of 4th February. On 15<sup>th</sup> February, the moon lies near Mars, whilst on 21<sup>st</sup> February the moon is close to Saturn.

The seven stars making up the Plough can be seen in the north-east, whilst the W-shape of Cassiopeia is to the north-west.



Story 1: I have a trip to Miami in February for a conference. The conference hotel was quoting me over \$300 per night + tax. By using the travel section on the shopping portal and I used the various hotel search sites to book exactly the same hotel at just over \$200 per night all in! I'm staying three nights so a saving of about \$300 and a commission to the church!

Story 2: Browsing with my wife the other night trying research and book a summer holiday. We searched Google and clicked on an interesting link promising a video of the location of interest. A new window opened and the video appeared blank, the sound track was clearly not the promised video of the location but something altogether more unsavoury and a message popped up inviting me to install some software to watch the video. I immediately recognised the classic 'codec' scam. A codec is a file compressor which is required to play some non-standard video formats.

If I had clicked to install I could well have installed a variety of nuisance or malicious programs. This is a well known issue with the main targets being, of course, teenagers. Some rogue codecs plague users with pop-up adverts, while others invisibly install keyloggers that try to grab confidential data. BE WARNED - my policy is never to install these codecs - if it doesn't work with a standard Windows & Mac programs you are well advised to treat with caution.

I've updated the virus "Be a Whizz" section of the church website to include the latest 'A list' recommendation for Security Suites and add some useful (free) utilities.
