

Dear Friends,

A recent newspaper article reported that the sort of weather we have been experiencing this April was seasonal and what in previous years we associated with our British climate as traditional for springtime. However, the article went on to warn that we should not be fooled into thinking that the weather would automatically follow a traditional pattern such as a warm summer with some hot days and a mild autumn, and so on. Nothing can be certain because of the influence of climate change. This set me thinking about the Church's year and the certainty of its seasons.

We have just celebrated Easter, indeed we continue to enjoy the Easter season for six weeks until Pentecost, or Whitsuntide as it is called in some parts. Then we come to Trinity Sunday and begin a new season which continues until Advent. This is followed by Christmas, Epiphany and finally Lent when we prepare once again to celebrate Easter. Unlike the weather the seasons of the Church's year are sure and certain. At one time these Holy days were times when the population had days off work in order to celebrate them with their families; over time 'Holy days' became 'holidays'. Nowadays, holidays are enjoyed all the year and even school holidays are no longer so closely tied to Holy days. Indeed many changes have taken place in this last decade, for example the May Day holiday is on May 5th with Whitsunday/Pentecost on May 11th when previously these were always the same weekend. There are many other examples which demonstrate how this once Christian country has become separated from its traditional roots and values. Does it matter? I believe it matters greatly for we see around us a society which is no longer at ease with its self and where the values and standards we experienced until relatively recently are barely discernable. What can we do about it supposing we want to recreate a happier and more contented society? Politicians from across the political spectrum tell us they know the answers but we know that they often cannot put into place what they say they want. The answers are in the hands of all of us and they are found in the words of Jesus: he taught that we should love God and love our neighbour as much as we love ourselves. What a difference this would make if everyone tried to do this and not only in our own neighbourhood but throughout the world. We would see love and peace hand in hand with good governance and honesty, guns replaced with ploughs and the people fed, we might even see a fairer system of taxation return in our own country!

Finally I have been asked to say why I share the peace greeting at the Eucharist with those present. I would have thought that amongst the Christian fellowship there would be great joy in sharing the peace that Jesus gave us especially when we come to share Holy Communion. I have been told that a few members of our regular congregations 'feel uncomfortable' at my sharing the peace greeting with them and neither do they wish to share the peace greeting with their neighbours around them. Originally the Kiss of Peace was the mutual greeting of the faithful in the Eucharistic Liturgy, as a sign of their love and union. It is first mentioned by St. Justin Martyr in the 2nd century and is probably a usage of the Apostolic period (as we can read in Romans 16:16, Greet each other in Christian love. From the early Greek translates 'Great each other with a sacred kiss' then again 1 Peter 5:14, says, Great each other in Christian love' From the early Greek translates 'Great each other with a kiss of love'. And there are more such examples should you wish to look them up in your Bible. The Kiss of Peace has been found in all the Christian churches throughout the centuries and has been modified over time from a kiss to the present form of hand-shaking although there are many who still exchange a kiss of peace even in the Church in Wales! It is a visible sign that we are the people of whom it can be said, 'How these Christians love one another.' Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you." We know how much he loved us let us boldly acknowledge that love by sharing it openly and generously with one another at every opportunity.

soil up a bit and incorporating a load of well rotted manure, depending on what crops are to follow. The one area for carrots has not been manured as this makes the roots fork, so instead this has been dug, raked and sown after a liberal dressing of blood, fish and bonemeal, one of the best all round organic fertilisers for vegetables or flowers. The beds that have been identified for growing the green vegetables have been manured but not dug. This is because greens preferred a compact soil in which to grow. Light, fluffy soil increases the risk of the plants running to seed, before producing a crop. These beds have also been fitted with various types of supporting framework for something new that I'm trying this year. I have purchased a new product called "Enviromesh". This is a very fine mesh product that allows rain and air through but prevents the smallest of insect pests gaining access to your valuable crop. It will be interesting to see how effective this proves to be. It will make the vegetables expensive for this year but it will last for many years if properly looked after. The real benefit will be tasting your very own home produced vegetables that have not been exposed to chemical input in any shape or format.

The wet weather over the weekend has allowed us to catch up on a number of "indoor" tasks that have needed doing for some time. In the tunnel I had laid some drip feed piping around the strawberries and fruit trees some time ago, but this needed a lot of attention in order to get it up and running properly. This was mainly a case of replacing broken nozzles and pipes. This was quite time consuming but a job well done. It meant that I could leave the system dripping away whilst I went off and did something else. Mean while the under gardener was busy sorting out the potting shed, which was in a sorry state of affairs. I did poke my head inside the shed at one point in the operation, but soon cleared off when I was reprimanded for putting a pile of pot trays in the wrong place! Back to the tunnel me thinks!

going to plant two melons and two water melons in the hot bed to see how they do, whilst the rest will go into the tunnel. It will be interesting to see if there is any difference in the end.

I sowed some sweet pea seed many weeks ago and the resultant plants have been pinched out several times to increase the number of stems for flowering. I planted these out today and hopefully the promise of rain will settle them in. Also planted today was another row of mangetout and sugar snap peas. These have been growing in the greenhouse, in lengths of guttering for a couple of weeks. Whoever thought of growing them like this deserves a medal! It is so easy to scrape a groove in the soil and then just slide the pea plants out of the guttering into the groove created. The only job left was to stick them up. Fortunately I cut a birch tree down a month ago and I saved the branches for the purpose of sticking the peas. They are not the best but do the job well enough. Once these were planted the next couple of rows of broad bean plants joined them. I have lost a number of the autumn sown beans, but the gaps have been filled with those sown earlier this year. With a gradual increase in temperature these have now started to grow strongly and are looking well. They are now flowering well, so hopefully it won't be long before we start to bring some early beans into the kitchen.

Although I am relying on the heat from the propagating bench to warm the rest of the small greenhouse, this still manages to keep the temperature well above freezing during the current cold spell. Many of the plants as a result are looking well but I don't want them to get too lush and drawn up, so to begin with I have moved the plants out and into the cold greenhouse in order to start the process of hardening off. In a few more days they will be moved again, but this time outside to the cold frame for a further week before planting in the raised beds. Not all the plants will leave the greenhouse however as some, mainly French beans and lettuce, with some calabrese will be planted in to the tunnel and greenhouse borders in order to get extra early crops.

I'm still busy getting the raised beds in the vegetable area in order ready for planting up. In most cases it is just a case of loosening the

CHARITY SHOP SHOWSTOPPER

Last week, Earlswood Hall was lucky enough to host the premier of 'SORTED' a new play by local playwright Glynis MacDonald - and what a triumph it proved to be. The show was sold out on all three nights. The audience was treated to a performance that left them crying in their seats - in the nicest possible way.

This new play reveals the confusions and mistakes that arise when a Zoe, a somewhat reluctant recruit joins the volunteers in the back room of the 'World-Aid charity Shop in 'Frimpleigh'. When the shop is threatened with closure, Zoe suggests a fashion show to raise the profile of the shop. But then, when a shotgun goes missing and Babs the shop manager leaps (wrongly) to the conclusion that Zoe and Mr Thigh the Area Manager are having an affair, the fashion show takes place under a sea of wild confusion.

Although this was an amateur dramatic production – put on by Shirenewton Operatic and Dramatic Society (SODS) the cast put on a performance that was worthy of the West End – and I don't mean West End – the tiny hamlet south of Earlswood. The cast – under the masterly direction of Will Smith-Haddon was pacey, polished and assured. All the roles were strongly performances but Ann Llewellyn who played the old and hard of hearing Martha with such brilliance and comic timing, was outstanding. Likewise Neil Chapman, who played the shy and retiring Nelson was absolutely unforgettable strutting his stuff for the catwalk.

The show must have been a challenge for Stage Manager Sue Philipson as the set included hundreds of bags, boxes, books, toys, items of clothing and bric-a-brac. The brilliant set invoked a scene of disorganised chaos as Beryl and Babs wittily played by Jane Smith-Haddon and Glynis MacDonald sparked off each other as the well meaning middle-aged charity shop volunteers who struggle to keep their heads above the rising tide of black bag donations.

The fun was fast and furious throughout and the play ended literally with a bang!

The proceeds from the play, £2500 will go to the Shirenewton Church Extension Fund.

Gardening Corner

Another month gone and still no sign of the weather warming up. To think that this time last year we were experiencing drought and heat never seen in April before and now we are getting snow. Well, maybe not us personally, but its not far away! Nature has responded to some degree in that I'm still waiting for the first sign of the cuckoo, which has normally arrived by now. I'm still waiting for the first house martin here at Barn Farm. This is a bit odd as I saw one flying around the church in Shirenewton nearly two weeks ago. Maybe we have ones that fly to warmer climes and so it takes them longer to get back! They say that, like salmon, they find their way back to their place of birth but I've never discovered whether this is true or not.

Despite the weather things are moving forward in the garden. Although we seem to be getting our fair share of cold east winds at the moment we are lucky here in that we are completely sheltered from these and winds from the north as well. I was working in the garden the other day in a T shirt but across the valley I noticed that the builders currently working at our nearest neighbours all had woolly caps and coats on! A few days of sunshine have really worked their magic on the plants in the propagating areenhouse. The various varieties of tomato plants, cucumbers, aubergines and peppers have all dramatically increased in growth. All these were in small pots or cells, and I am re-potting these into much larger pots at the moment and the plants should now grow on in these up to the point that they are planted out into the borders of either the large greenhouse or tunnel. This won't happen until probably May time and although there will still be a risk of frosts then, any plants will quickly be covered with horticultural fleece to ensure that they don't get damaged. When re-potting many of these varieties it always pays to plant them deeper than they were before. This is because the stems will throw out more roots, which is a very effective way of maximising growth and ultimately the crop.

I've also just re-potted some water melons which are something new that I'm trying. The hot bed that I created is now warming up as it rots down and I think that I will try covering it with soil in the next week or two. I'm



SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING

HELD ON MONDAY 3RD MARCH

P.C. Cowburn's Report for March:-

There were a number of incidents reported that were not of a criminal nature. Including:-

Four instances of House alarms that were all a result of faults; a man sleeping in a car at the Shirenewton picnic site.

A badger sett had been disturbed near Shirenewton

Motor cycle nuisance again reported

Cold caller of what seemed Irish extraction seeking to buy a car.

Minor accident on the B4235 no injuries reported.

Flyer circulated for a suspect charity clothes collection in Shirenewton.

Chepstow Police have now received new equipment for the measurement of speeding traffic. An initial exercise was carried out in Shirenewton on the 7th April within the 30mph zone. The log produced showed that the equipment had been successful in slowing down the traffic. The equipment works by taking a reading of the vehicle speed which flashes up the speed for the motorist to see. A further reading is then taken seconds later. It is intended that this equipment will be used in villages and speeding offenders will be issued with fixed penalty fines.

Planning:

The Folly—Newchurch West: Proposed two storey extension with ground floor kitchen/ lounge and first floor annexe accommodation. Approval recommended.

Brook Cottage—Pandy Mill: Proposed two storey extension for two des, en-suite and new lounge.

Approval recommend subject access and drainage conditions being met.

Briar Hill - Earlswood: Application for certificate of existing lawful use or development for occupation of dwelling in contravention of agricultural occupancy condition.

Approval recommended as ituation has existed for in excess of 10 years.

Land Adjacent to Bwthyn Cadwen Penycaemawr: -

Proposed wind turbine for domestic use.

The Carpenters Arms—Shirenewton:- Extended paved area with a perimeter fence and timber pergola to front elevation.

Lane Alongside the Recreation Field: The issue of the Tarmac surfacing has been raised with the Enforcement Office and is under investigation, along with other similar activities in the area.

The speaker for our March meeting was Chris Barber, who gave us his account of the research he has undertaken for his book on King Arthur. This subject has been of interest to Chris for many years and if anyone has read his book you will know that he has done a considerable amount of research and has come to some new conclusions on this character. He explained his theory about King Arthur, and the connections he has with this area, in particular Llanmelin Hill Fort. To accompany his book he brought along a video to explain his theory and we all agreed it was a very interesting talk.

We have been invited to visit an exhibition in the National Museum of Wales in Cardiff by Elizabeth Walker who heads the Prehistory Department at the museum. We will be visiting the museum on Saturday, 26th April and will be shown around by Elizabeth, who will give us an insight into the origins of the people who inhabited this area. The exhibition will include the Red Lady of Pavaland (who happens to be a man!) who was found in a cave in the Gower Peninsular and usually resides in Oxford and is one of the oldest (and most travelled) skeleton to be found in the U.K.

Once again on Rogation Sunday the 27th April we will be Beating the Bounds of the parish, leading the walk will be Bob O'Keefe and back to the church for a well deserved tea and cake. We hope the weather will be kinder for us that in the past few years. We will let you know in the next issue how we faired. We still have copies of our last publication available, 'Beating the Bounds of the Parish of Shirenewton' and 'Historic Walks in the Parish' at the very reasonable price of £3.50, to obtain your copy please 'phone 641376.

Items of Local concern:-

The Local Shop: - Discussions have been held with the owners and no interest has been shown by any potential buyers in the last 18months in spite of reduction in the asking price. Alternative possibilities are under discussion with various authorities and organisations.

Allotments: - The debate is ongoing Mon. CC having now proposed an area adjoining Blethyn, and passing the debate back to the Community Council whom Mon CC state it is their responsibility.

Play Area:- Issue is under discussion with possible contractor regarding costs. Local school children will supply their needs / wishes on a questionnaire through the school.

Bus Shelter: - Quotes for re-building have been supplied and are waiting approval of insurers to enable work to be carried out.

Caroline's Cookery Corner

My son, Max, has recently returned to the UK after working as a Chalet host in France for the winter. His job involved cooking a 3 course meal for 12 guests, 6 days a week. The meals he prepared were of a good standard and yet straightforward to prepare. The 3 course meal below is comprised of 3 dishes he would have prepared for his guests. These recipes are quality and are quick and easy at the same time.

Starter - Spicy Pumpkin Soup - Serves 6

<u>Ingredients</u>

1tbsp Olive Oil 1g Chilli Paste 300g Onions

1kg Pumpkin 2 Garlic Cloves 4 Medium Potatoes

1.5Ltr Veg Stock 300ml Cream

- Heat the oil in a large saucepan on a medium heat. Dice the onions and crush the garlic and add to the saucepan, gently fry until soft.
- Peel and chop the pumpkin and potatoes and add to the saucepan.
 Fry off for a couple of minuets before adding the other ingredients.
- Bring to the boil and simmer for 25 minutes or until the pumpkin is soft.
- Blend the soup with a food processor and add the cream.
 Season with a pinch of salt and black pepper and serve.

Main Course – Sweet and Spicy apricot Chicken - Serves 2 Ingredients

1tbsp Olive Oil 400g Chicken fillets 1tsp both ground Cumin and Coriander 1 Chicken stock cube 2 Rounded tbsp apricot conserve 80g Dried apricots 100g frozen chopped French green beans 20 Black Olives (approx)

- Heat the oil in a large frying pan, slice the chicken in to strips and add to the pan with the spices. Gently fry the chicken until cooked through.
- Pour 200ml of boiling water over the chicken and crumble in the stock cube. Slice the apricots into small pieces. Add the apricots, apricot conserve, green beans and olives to the pan. Season with salt and pepper and leave to simmer gently for 5 minutes.

Chop the fresh coriander and sprinkle into the pan before serving Ideally serve on a bed of couscous with roasted Mediterranean vegetables.

It seems that now Tesco will stock fairly traded roses again. Look out for them (or ask why there aren't any!). They are beautiful and last well.

They are also stocking fairly traded sugar now. Although we are experiencing financial difficulties here in the UK and the cost of food is rising, we spend significantly less of our income on food than we did a generation ago. In the developing world food can account for 80% or even more of a family's budget. A big increase spells real disaster for them. Fortunately very few of us here will actually go hungry because of it.

STARGAZING IN MAY APRIL '08

The seven stars of the Plough lie overhead in mid-evening. Its classical name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear. In mythology, Callisto, attendant to the goddess Juno was considered more beautiful than her mistress. To protect her from her jealous mistress, Jupiter turned Callisto into a bear. Unfortunately Callisto's son tried to kill the bear whilst he was out hunting, so Jupiter placed the bear in the sky.

The two stars furthest from the handle of the Plough are called the Pointers. Tracing a connecting line from the Pointers leads to Polaris, the North Star. Polaris is called the North Star because it is the closest easily visible star to the point in the sky about which the star patterns rotate. This point changes very gradually with time. In fact, over thousands of years, other stars have been the North Star.

The stars appear fixed with respect to each other, but over long periods of time the star patterns change. The pattern of stars we call the Plough looked very different many years ago, and will look very different in the distant future.

The reddish planet Mars can be seen in the western sky in the evening. It lies close to Castor and Pollux, the two brightest stars in the constellation of Gemini, the Twins. Mars is close to the crescent Moon on 10 May.

Saturn is just below the backwards question-mark of stars that make up the head and mane of the constellation Leo the Lion, in the southwest.

Very bright Jupiter rises in the late evening in the southeast.

Our constellations are formed by connecting stars together. Australia's Aboriginal peoples use the dark areas of sky, absent of stars, to construct outlines of objects. One of these dark areas is called the Emu.
