

### SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL

### Meeting of 7th.March 2005

9 members of the Council were joined by County Councillor Graham Down.

The Chair began the meeting by reading out a letter from Cllr.Martin Sutherland who is resigning because of work commitments. This creates a vacancy for the Ward of Shirenewton which should be filled by cooption in the near future. Anyone wishing to be considered should contact the Chair or Clerk as soon as possible.

**Matters Arising** from the minutes of the previous meeting.

**Shirenewton Golf Club.** It seems there is a possibility that the Golf Course could be retained. This could now lead to an application from the owner of the Course for permission to build a new Golf Clubhouse!

**The Squeeze Belly Gates** have been constructed and are ready for installation as soon as this can be arranged.

The defective **Solar Light System** near the Churchyard steps is to be inspected by an expert. It may well be repaired by the time we get those long, light summer evenings.

Following a meeting between members of both Shirenewton and Caerwent Community Councils and their visit to *The Bicca Common* efforts are being made to locate the appropriate records of the Common, particularly those relating to the creation of that particular Common.

**Website**. It is expected that the official minutes of a number of recent Community Council meetings will soon be posted on a specific section of the Shirenewton Church website. Members also felt it would be useful if a list of recent Planning Applications were posted indicating our response to them and the eventual outcome.

**The Village Plan.** A meeting of the sub-committee set up to take the matter forward is set for 21st. March.

The *Green Wedge* between Mynyddbach and Shirenewton is due to be auctioned in three lots on 12<sup>th</sup>. April 2005. Potential purchasers should familiarise themselves with any limitations regarding the use of the land before the sale.

### Planning Matters

A number of Applications were presented for consideration. These included:-

**Paddocks, Weylod Lane**, amended garage plans – again refusal recommended

**Hollybushes, LLwyncelyn Lane**, construction of new dwelling – refusal recommended

**Twin Oaks, Shirenewton**, construction of two new dwellings – refusal recommended

**Crick Road**, removal and replacement of portion of hedgerow – a retrospective Application for which approval was recommended

The Coach House, Great House Farm, Newchurch West,

construction of store shed - refusal recommended

**Red House Barn, Shirenewton**, proposed extension – refusal recommended

**Weylod Lane**, construction of new dwelling – decision deferred until the next meeting.

A number of decisions have been received from the County Planning Department.

It seems the Application to erect a new dwelling on a plot **adjacent to the Churchyard** has been refused but an appeal is likely. Interested parties are advised to send any responses to the Building Inspector before the appeal date which is yet to be fixed.

Other decisions from the Planning Department included permission for a barn conversion at *Oxpool Cottage, Earlswood*, a first floor extension at *Beechgrove, Earlswood*, a new *Water Booster Station* at The Batwell and confirmation of permission to create 10 dwellings at *Shirenewton Golf Clubhouse*.

#### Matters of Local Concern

Members are still concerned about the activities along the **Penycaemawr to Goytre Cross road.** Serious damage has and is being caused to the Highway, hedgerows are being removed and various buildings are being erected, some of which appear to block public footpaths. Again, we will ask that the area be visited by Officers from the Planning Department.

The defective letterbox has now been removed from **School Hill, Mynyddbach.** A letter will be sent to the Post Office requesting that this much needed facility be replaced as soon as possible. It was also noted that letterboxes in the area are often overloaded suggesting there should be more of them or they are not being emptied regularly. The Post Office will be asked for their comments.

Complaints have been received concerning the removal of much of the line of conifers below the properties adjacent to the Village Shop. It seems this action was in contravention of the initial Planning Approval. Concern was expressed about the speed of traffic travelling past the junction at *Clearview* in *Shirenewton*. Pedestrians, many of whom are children, are finding this a very dangerous part of the highway to cross.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be on Monday 4<sup>th</sup>April.



## SHIRENEWTON BELL RINGERS THE BELLS, THE BELLS.......

Saturday 19th February saw the Monmouth Branch Annual Ringing Course, a large event with more than 50 people involved which lasts for the whole day.

Everyone meets at Magor where it is based, at 9.30am. They have a cup of tea or coffee meet their tutor and have a theory session then the groups go out to various local towers for practice on the bells. Lunch is back at Magor and consists of gigantic 3ft pizzas cut into individual portions. The groups then go out to different local towers for further practice on the bells. The whole thing rounds up again back at Magor with tea and the presentation of certificates.

As a student you can study a range of things through basic bell handling, raising and lowering in peal, through to basic 5 bell methods.

Glynis Macdonald and Bob Millar attended as pupils on the Grandsire Doubles course. Bob followed this up on Sunday 13th March with a quarter peal. Band; 1. Claire Eickhoff; 2. Sally Utting; 3. Bob Millar; 4.Pip Penney; 5. Mike Penney (conductor) 6. Charles Eickhoff. This was also rung to celebrate the twelfth birthday of Claire on the treble, it was her second quarter peal.

### STARGAZING IN APRIL

The constellation of Leo the Lion lies to the South. Unlike most constellations, Leo really can be pictured as its namesake. His mane is made up of a backwards-shaped question mark with the bright star Regulus forming his front paw. Off to the left are three stars, which make up the lion's hindquarters.

The seven stars of the Plough lie pretty much overhead. It is one of the "circumpolar" constellations that are always above our horizon. Its classical

name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear.

American slaves in the southern States were taught a song in childhood. The first verse runs:

When the Sun comes back And the first quail calls Follow the Drinking Gourd For the old man is a-waiting for to carry you to freedom If you follow the Drinking Gourd

The song gave a time, after the December solstice, when the Sun begins to climb higher into the northern sky and the calls of migratory quail can be heard in the southern United States, and a direction – the Drinking Gourd is the Plough and lies to the North. This gave slaves the vital information which allowed them to escape to the North and to freedom.

In the evening Saturn lies to the South West below and to the right of the bright stars Castor and Pollux, in the constellation Gemini. Saturn is yellowish in colour. Earlier in the year the spacecraft Cassini released the probe Huyghens which landed on Saturn's moon Titan. The images beamed back to Earth reveal strangely familiar hills, valleys and cliffs. Titan is the only moon in the Solar System with an atmosphere, but Titan's is very different to that of Earth, consisting of methane and ammonia. It is of particular interest since the present conditions on Titan are believed to be similar to those on the surface of primeval Earth before life began.

The very bright planet Jupiter, which is in the constellation Virgo, is in the South East.

### **Cookery Corner**

### Chunky Chocolate Nut Flapjacks

1 oz desiccated coconut

6 oz butter cut into pieces

2 oz light muscovado sugar

5 tbsp syrup

4 oz Brazil nuts or cashews cut into large chunks

2 oz almonds - cut 8 oz oats 3 oz dark chocolate cut into large chunks

Butter a 9" square tin, and line.

Mix oats and coconut

Melt butter, sugar and syrup until dissolved. Remove from the heatand add the oat mix. Spoon into the tin and press down evenly. Scatter over the nuts and press down lightly. Stick chunks of chocolate between the nuts. Bake at 180°C for 25 – 30 minutes until pale golden.

Mark while still warm, but leave in the tin until cold.

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### **Gardening Corner**

Now then, where was I, Oh yes pruning trees. This is not an art form but does depend a lot on science and if you get it right it looks right! Get it wrong and it can look awful. When I say science, it helps to have a little understanding of biology in order to understand how trees respond when they have their branches cut off! I first started working with trees some thirty two years ago and many of the lessons learnt then have stood the test of time. Advice such as "a tree that has been pruned should look exactly as if it hasn't" or "it takes just as long to do a job badly as to do it well". All good advice from the under gardeners dad all those years ago, and sadly advice that has been long lost. The second pearl of wisdom is

self-explanatory, but the first takes a little bit more to understand. There is as I mentioned last time many examples locally of jobs that have been done poorly. It seems that many peoples idea of pruning a tree is to just cut the branches off (appropriately named topping or lopping) and leaving it to recover and re-grow into a well balanced and attractive looking tree. Wrong! It may well reduce the height and width in one fell swoop, but once done it will never look the same again. True there are some trees that can respond to similar treatment, but this is known as pollarding and is best restricted to only those few species of trees that respond to this type of treatment. Species such as limes, horse chestnuts and London planes and to a lesser extent beech, ash and hornbeam for example. Apart from ash how many of you have these in your garden! This is the sort of treatment that you expect to find practised with street trees and requires regular interventions, like every three or four years. What should be undertaken to reduce height and spread is a package of crown reduction and thinning. When this has been done properly it is very difficult to tell that a tree has The height of the tree is reduced by cutting main received attention. branches back to a suitable sized side branch. Ideally this should be about one-third the diameter of the main stem. This reduces the likelihood of the tree throwing a mass of young branches that will nearly always grow straight and true, like the archers' arrow! There is nothing worse than a tree that has branches characterised by age being spoilt with a mass of The crown should also be thinned by removing approximately one third of the main branches in order to maintain an open canopy. This allows light and air into the remaining branches allowing all the leaves to work well, reducing dieback and maintaining the health of the tree. All these cuts must not be flush to the stem, but slightly proud to allow the repairing tissue, that is at the base of each branch, to seal over the wound. Whatever you do don't seal the cuts with wound sealant. This actually seals moisture in the cut and encourages rot. Allow the cuts to dry naturally and they will seal over much sooner. Timely cutting is also essential. It is no good cutting a branch that is 25 centimetres across and expecting it to heal over. In ten years time maybe! There is a rule (and no I can't remember what it is called) of one third, two thirds. The same applies when landscaping forest areas. If you fell one third and leave two thirds things are always in proportion and look natural, hence the crown thinning rule. Another no no is to leave a peg 7 centimetres long or more. These will either die back and encourage rot, or will shoot out like the proverbial bush, neither of which is desirable. When felling a tree the ideal is to cut it as close to the ground as possible unless you want the stump for a feature that is to support a clematis or similar climber. Conifers will not re-grow (unless it is Californian redwood or western red cedar) but broadleaves will. so if you don't want them to grow again the cut surface should be treated with a weed-killer. I always paint neat Round-up onto the living tissue, but

you might only be able to purchase brushwood killer or root out. Either will do, and the latter is meant to help the stump to rot away quicker but I have never used this to test if this is true!

So, if in doubt employ a tree surgeon and ideally one that comes recommended. To coin a saying, "Many come calling, but few should be chosen"!! All right, I know that isn't how it goes, but it sounds like good advice.

Right lecture over what's happening in the garden? Well at long last the soil has dried enough to allow me to make a start tidying up. Ernie tells me that we have only had an inch of rain compared to the usual five for last month. The trouble is we have had so little sunshine that the soil hasn't responded as it should and is still very cold. Too cold in fact at Barn Farm to start with the first outdoor sowings. I have got the first broad beans and French beans germinated in pots, so these will be placed in the cold frame this week to harden off, although the latter will be destined for the greenhouse border as mentioned last month. Similarly the first lettuce are now well up and running. Most of the flower seeds and other vegetables are pushing through the compost on the hot bench. The under gardener is now attacking these with gusto and busy pricking the seedlings out into individual cells. She grumbles a bit because it is still cold on the feet and hands but I just remind her that the fresh air is good for the complexion. Yes you're right, that fell on stony ground, which is very similar to the conditions where the next (and maybe final) water feature is about to go. I intend to hire a Jack hammer over Easter in order to dig the hole out. I've tried to dig it with a pickaxe and spade, but I've decided that I'm getting far too old for such hard work. I Know that I need to lose weight but come on, there are limits! So for now I'll stay cuddly and try not to bust anything that I shouldn't! Gosh, well I must go. The Editor only allows me two pages, so I've out stayed my welcome already. Next month things really get busy coinciding with the arrival of the first cuckoo.

So happy gardening until then.
