

Dear Friends,

I've a confession to make, much to my shame. I didn't do my bit last month to help people who desperately needed it.

Each month, I put together a page for print in the Caerwent and Shirenewton community magazines. It has become my custom to include at least one web address to which the reader can go and donate money or time or resources and help make a real difference to real people who need our support. I think this is vitally important—and all the more so right now—because even in a time when we all look at our bank balance and wonder how we're going to manage several years' worth of coming austerity—well, I do, at least; your mileage may vary—we are nonetheless remarkably well off in modern western society. It will, of course, be easy for people at this moment in history to turn inwards and stop giving because we feel the pinch of recession and budget cuts. I fully understand the impulse. But, however easy it would be, it would still be wrong. Here's why: let me urge you to look at the following website: www.globalrichlist.com . It allows you to input your annual income, after which it will tell you where you rank amongst the world's wealth. Turns out: anyone making £20,000 per annum is in the top 5% of global wealth. If you make £10,000, you're in the top 12%; if you make £5000, you're in the top 14%. And if you make just £1000 per annum, you are still—amazingly—in the top 20%; 80% of the world's population makes less than you, if you earn only £1000 per

Now ... that's context. What I'm ashamed of is this: last month, as the deadline hit, I couldn't think of a single news issue to promote. So I sent my article without the customary charitable link. 24 hours later—*i.e.*, 24 hours too late—I suddenly realised that there had been flooding in Pakistan for several weeks—people have lost homes and livelihoods—and I had simply turned it off in my head. *Why could I not remember?* "Charity fatigue", as we euphemistically call our western cynicism? Lack of identification with a place and people that we in the west neither know nor understand very well? Just simply too tired to think straight that day? I do not know. Maybe a little of all three. They're not mutually exclusive for any of us.

But what I *do* know is that, this day, I am called to repent of my culpable negligence and respond to God's call to bring justice and mercy where I have the power to do so. So that's what I'm doing. Right now. Link's just below; please use it.

#### **DOG POO PATROL**

Most people will have read the requests from the Community Council and the Recreation Association in this Parish Magazine for dog owners to act responsibly and pick up their dog's poo.

This would appear to be working well - so thank you to all who have complied with this request.

However it appears that for some owners there is a need for a second stage reminder - Once you have picked up the poo and put it in a bag, could you please take the bag home or find a waste bin and not leave it on the ground (or hanging in trees)

The 'dog poo patrol' has reported 8 discarded bags lying on the ground beside the raised wooden walkway by the boggy ground. Approach the walkway opposite Kirrin House and there are 7 on the left side and 1 on the other side, a little way in on the right, close to the hedge. Obviously if allowed to go unchecked this situation will get totally out of hand.

Although the dog owner has complied with part of their responsibility i.e. cleared up after the dog, they have omitted to grasp their full responsibility of placing the bag in the bin at home or any other suitable bin whose contents are disposed of regularly.







The church website continues to attract lots of visitors with a total of 416 visits in August delivering 1,728 page views which is 4.15 pages per visit and an average time of 3mins 30 secs on the site per visit. 53% of visitors are 'new'. Our top traffic source is, not surprisingly, Google searches. The top search is 'Shirenewton Church' which delivered 62 visits, followed by 'Shirenewton' (12 searches), 'church fundraising' (11 visits), 'Shirenewton shopping' (5 visits) and 'Shirenewton Community Council (4 visits). These stats are for the church website itself. We keep separate stats for the shopping portal. It delivered 3,796 page views in August. There are currently 268 shops in 34 categories. The newest listings are: myTravelCash, Club Med, Play.com, Spanair, Garden Bargains, Celtic Manor Resort, lowcosttravelextras.com, lowcostholidays.com, boxfresh & Flybe. Don't forget that the shopping portal also has many 'high street' names such as: Amazon, Argos, Asda, BHS, comet, Dell, Halfords, House of Fraser, JD Sports, John Lewis, La Senza, Laura Ashley, Marks & Spencer, Sainsburys, Staples, Tesco, Toys R us, & Waterstones. ### STARGAZING IN OCTOBER '10

The planet Jupiter is a brilliant object in the evening sky to the South-East this month. On the 19<sup>th</sup> the Moon is just to the right of Jupiter. On the 5<sup>th</sup> the crescent Moon is just below the bright star Regulus to the East in the early morning sky. The constellation of Cygnus the Swan lies pretty much directly above. It is in the shape of a cross – in fact it is sometimes called the Northern Cross. According to legend, Jupiter the king of the Gods changed himself into a swan when he wanted to visit Leda, the wife of the King of Sparta. In memory of the episode, he placed a swan in the sky. <a href="Deneb">Deneb</a>, the brightest star in the constellation, is at the tail of the swan, whilst <a href="Albireo">Albireo</a> forms the "head" of the Swan. Albireo is worth looking at through a small telescope. It consists of 2 separate stars, one gold in colour, the other blue.

The seven stars of the Plough are to the North and the four stars forming the Great Square of Pegasus lie to the South.

Edward Lowe, a Victorian gentleman scientist lived at Shirenewton Hall from 1880 until his death in 1900. His memorial tablet in Shirenewton Church shows he was a fellow of a number of scientific societies including the Royal Astronomical Society. Although particularly well known for his interest in botany, he published papers on a wide variety of subjects, including meteors, sunspots, and the observations he made during the total eclipse of the Sun in 1860 at Santander.



# Nerus's Natty Nosh

The festive meringue may have been invented by Herbert Sachse, chef of the hotel Esplanade in Perth, Western Australia, to celebrate the visit of the great Russian ballerina Anna Pavlova (1881-1931) who toured Australia and New Zealand twice in the 1920. The white meringue is said to be a tribute to her swan costume, worn during the famous dance of the Dying Swan.

# **Pavlova -** Serves 6

### Ingredients.

4 eaa whites 3/4 tsp cream of tartar 8oz (200q) castor sugar 1tsp white vinegar 1tsp vanilla essence 2 tsp corn flour 1/2 pint (300 ml) chilled double cream 60z ( 150q) fruit



#### Method

- 1 Preheat the oven, 140C, 275F, Gas Mark 1.
- **2** Line a large round baking tin with non-stick parchment paper.
- 3 Whisk the egg whites with the cream of tartar until they are stiff and form peaks.
- 4 Gradually whisk in the vanilla essence, vinegar, corn flour and castor sugar, adding a teaspoon at a time, then whisk.
- 5 Spoon or pipe the meringue onto the baking parchment making a large circular shape.
- 6 Bake for 11/4 hours. Turn the oven off and leave the meringue for a few minutes in the oven.
- 7 When the meringue is completely cold, whisk the chilled cream carefully until peaks form.
- 8 Fold the cream into the centre of the meringue then add the fruit.
- **9** Store in the refrigerator until needed.

As always we had the most wonderful day, the food was perfect, the wine flowed freely and the hosts were welcoming and attentive to the core. Sadly our friend, Clive passed away this August; we will miss him dearly. Anthea, Clive's sister, had prepared the most delicious Pavlova for the barbecue and this is her recipe.

### Anthea's Tip

- 1 Always make sure the bowl used for whisking the meringue is spotlessly clean, any grease will prevent the eggs from holding any air.
- To Freeze: pack the meringue, excluding the cream and fruit, carefully in container, seal and label. Use within 3 months. To serve: put on a plate and thaw for half an hour. Enjoy!



### GARDENING CORNER

I'm writing this early as we will be away on our holidays when this months' article is due. By the time you read it we will in fact be back in harness and no doubt picking up where we left off in the garden. At the moment the bulk of our work is being spent in the vegetable garden, investing the time into next years cropping plan. From last months episode you will have gathered that I'm moving things around, making some fundamental changes to the crops we are growing. The strawberry plants that went in last month are now getting well established and so we'll keep our fingers crossed for a bumper crop next year. We love strawberries, but over the last few years the cropping levels have just fallen away. I hadn't noticed this fact, and the assistant head gardener was too nice to have pointed out that our production of strawberries had dwindled to almost zero. Hopefully next year this will change. The one bed that had become diseased will now be cleared, dug and manured. I'll then sprinkle some of my favourite fertiliser, blood, fish and bone, over the soil and mix this in ready for the next crop, over-wintering garlic. I've saved three of the best bulbs of two different varieties from this year's harvest. These will be broken up into the individual cloves, before planting them just below the soil surface. I think many people still think of garlic being a warm climate crop, and there's no doubt that they thrive in a good summer. However these days we grow many varieties that have been bred specifically for our climate, and many don't realise that the cloves need a spell of cold weather in order for them to grow at their best. So planting in the Autumn is the ideal time. I've now planted the late sown greens and they seem to be responding to the warm soil and wet weather we are experiencing at the moment. I'm still concerned that I might be too late, but they only have two choices! I've kept some back, mainly broccoli and cauliflowers, and these will be planted into the border in the greenhouse. Hopefully these will provide a crop several weeks earlier than those planted outside. I grew shallots for the first time this year and have had a mixed crop. I grew two varieties, both recommended by French chefs! The one lot has grown into guite small bulbs, but these are meant to be the best for cooking, with very intense flavour. I'm torn at the moment whether to pickle them, or to retain for cooking, mainly in casseroles. I'll leave them to dry off first and then make a decision. If pickling is the route, there is still time to get them bottled and have them ready for Christmas. The other variety has faired much

better, and these are also drying in the greenhouse. These are much better size wise, and I'm looking forward to having them roasted in the meat dish on Sundays over the coming months. Like the garlic, I intend to select some for producing next years' crop. Traditionally, shallots should be planted on the shortest day, and harvested on the longest. Trends change and shallots tend to be planted earlier these days. Hopefully the weather will be fine in the first weeks of October, and I will get the bulbs planted into the soil. I find this allows them to get rooted before the first frosts are able to push the bulbs back out of the soil again.

One and a half areas of the raised beds have been planted with asparagus over the last three or four years. These are now getting established and this week I'll be weeding and making sure the beds are covered in a thick mulch of manure ready for the Winter. The plants themselves have now grown quite tall and turned into the familiar asparagus "fern" that is so often used in wedding button holes. Once the fern starts to die back for the winter, these will be pruned back to about four inches above the ground in order to make sure that the asparagus beetle can't take up residence. These would result in the crop being spoilt if they do build up in any numbers. I still have one bed full of potatoes that need harvesting before we go on holiday. The variety has been bred specifically for its resistance to potato blight and the foliage even now is looking very well. They are due to be harvested, but many of the earlier ones had slight slug damage, so I'm keeping my fingers crossed that these are resistant to slugs as well, otherwise they won't keep for very long!

We're hoping to start tidying up some of the flower beds if the weather stays kind. We have a lot of wallflower and sweet William plants that we grew earlier on and that are now ready to plant out, for flowering in the Spring. As we tidy, we'll plant. I've also invested in some new penstemon plants. The garden at Barn Farm was famous for its selection of these at one time, but over the years ealworm took its toll and last Winter just about finished them off. In order to prevent them getting the worm again you should leave a gap of at least two years before planting again, so they have had plenty of time for this to hopefully not be a problem for a few more years. Penstemon can be easily propagated from cuttings as well, so they are good for building up n umbers in a short period of time. Anyone that knows them will also know that they flower non stop all summer long, a real star of the cottage garden border.

Fruit wise I really do need to sort out our fruit cage as it is in a right mess. The last two Winters have wrecked the frame, and I need to sort this out, before sorting the planting out. The raspberries have suffered in recent years as well, so I will probably need to dig all these out and save the best of the canes, and replacing with new ones where we haven't got enough. In our field where we keep the bees, we have established quite an orchard over the years with apples pears and cherries. Apart from one year, we have never actually had a cherry crop as either they haven't produced any, or when they have the birds have clobbered them before they were ripe enough to pick. There are about 8 large cherry trees, so its been decided that they have to go. I'll cut them down in the autumn and poison the stumps. I have already ordered 5 new apple varieties and 5 new pears. I've selected ones with different cropping and storage times to those we already have, so hopefully we can extend the eating time. Talking of which, we were picking apples the other evening to eat and for also making into apple pies for freezing. The assistant noticed a lot of wasps around the bee hives and on closer inspection we discovered several holes in the older hives where the wasps were gaining access and then robbing the honey. They were also storming the front entrances, and the bees were involved in a daily struggle to keep them out. Drastic action was required, so the smoker was lit, spare hive parts were sought and I headed for the battle zone. With the old hives it was simply a case of finding the damaged parts and replacing them with new bits. All the old type "WBC" hives had mouse guards fitted ready across the doors to stop these rodents getting access in the colder weather. The gaps had been widened to allow the high bee numbers in the Summer, easy access. So these were closed right down, to the bare minimum, allowing the bees to guard the small gaps much easier. The national hives, just have a small slot as an entrance. The mouse guards in this case are perforated metal strips, with the holes big enough for bees but not mice! They also have a solid part as well so these have been pinned across the entrance, again reducing the size of gap needing defending. The wasps started flying around in circles not knowing where or what to do, so hopefully now they will find easier pickings elsewhere and leave my bees alone! Still must get on, time to go and dig those potatoes up. So happy gardening until next month.
