

They are trained and supported to offer a listening ear and time to chat with those in particular need -- the housebound, the sick, the bereaved, or those facing some other kind of crisis. They are also there to welcome new people into the village and help them to integrate into the community more quickly.



They are not professional counsellors, carers or social workers, but ordinary people who are willing to be alongside you when you most need it. Their service is free to those of all faiths and none, with no strings attached.

Confidentiality

Our Parish Visitors work within a strict code of confidentiality so that you may be confident that whatever is shared with them goes no further.

The one exception to this is that Visitors may share the minimum information necessary to obtain support and advice themselves, if necessary, from our clergy or other appropriate person. This would only happen with the persons consent

FAIRTRADE NEWS

I hope I have seen many of you at my fairtrade stall at this year's fete! (You may have even purchased something!). I thought I might give a resume of Traidcraft's most recent bulletin. Apparently there are currently 6000 registered fair traders (including me) and retailers. We have achieved £8.14 million of sales this year. This is of course only one of the fair trade initiatives in UK, but a considerably important one. Our sales are lower than in the previous year but they have not suffered the major downturn of some other retailers.

However the stark reality is that Traidcraft actually purchased almost 20% less from producers in 2011/2012 than in the previous financial year. We know that many people in the UK and elsewhere are having to tighten their belts, but in the developing world the margins are so much narrower. Here, nowadays, we still spend a relatively small percentage of our income on food, even though prices have risen recently. My parents and grandparents spent a much larger proportion of their income on food - for many people there was relatively little cash left over for indulgences like holidays, visits to restaurants, new clothes etc. In my parents' house I know the gift of pyjamas or a sweater for Christmas was more a necessary requirement than an extra. The current steep rises in the price of basic foodstuffs in the developing world have an almost unimaginably devastating impact. More than ever the Fairtrade movement needs to grow. Our critics maintain it's not the only answer. We know that. But we know it can be a significant help to our producers. At least it's a start! Marion McAdam 641 316 msm316@gmail.com

SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING,

From the Unofficial and Unpaid SCC Note Taker – Glynis MacDonald

The council now sits in a horse shoe to face all the people who come along to the meetings. I find myself at the rear end of the horseshoe so to speak and I'm afraid I don't always hear very clearly what is going on. Well that's my excuse. Police Report

PC Thorpe was unable to attend the meeting and there was nothing to report on the crime front which hopefully is a good sign.

Planning

1. DC/2012/00153 Tredegar Court, Newchurch Court, Earlswood

Subdivision of Tredegar Court into 3 separate dwellings (semidetached barn conversions). To consider the division of the curtilage, parking and access only.

There was a long discussion over this planning application and in particular the possibility of a substantial increase in traffic emerging onto the main road at a point which is considered to be 'hairy'. One cllr pointed out that there have been many plans for Tredegar Court (a creche, a caravan park, conversions and now subdivisions). If these plans all came to fruition, the volume of traffic could be a huge issue. There was also a lengthy discussion about the pulling in of Refuse and Recycling Lorries. And the size of the splay. Then there was another lengthy discussion as to where the barn actually was. If you go through the arch in the middle, it's on the left. Or the right. I settled down to long evening...

Approval was finally Recommend with the condition that if the crèche comes into being, the access will have to be improved.

2. DC/2012/00305 The Uplands, Earlswood

Detached residential garage and store.

The question was raised, 'What is a residential garage'? Anyway I believe this one has a store downstairs, a work shop upstairs and a circular window. The applicant was asked why it was so far from the house and he replied that it couldn't put the garage next to the house because there are outbuildings there.

Approval was Recommended

3. DC/2012/00449 Home Farm, Shirenewton

Agricultural Notification of new agricultural building.

New agricultural buildings do not need planning permission but the owner has to give notification. On the other hand there are rules for what an agricultural

building is. If it's just to store machinery in then that is OK but if it is to facilitate and service contractors' machinery

that's a different matter. Theoretically this application could be in the wrong planning category. Is this a shed to keep stuff in or is this a shed for mending stuff? Sadly the applicant wasn't there to answer the questions the council had.

Shirenewton School

MCC Cllr Graham Down asked where the planning application for Shirenewton School was? It ought to have been before the council for discussion. Plans have been made for the long awaited extended carpark and improvements to the school's entrance/exit. This proposal has been going on forever. it has been highlighted in the Ofsted Reports and H&S Reports. (It was considered crucial when my children went to Shirenewton School and James is now 28) The planning signs are already attached to the school gate posts but annoyingly, the application had not come through to SCC. Graham pointed out that planning permission was needed asap so that the work can take place during the 6 weeks summer holiday and not to cause mayhem during term-time and he wondered if there was a way for the council to comment speedily. The application was actually submitted in April but it seems that it can't be registered until reports have been made about the trees and things like that. And MCC do intend for the work to be carried out during the school holidays when there are no children about as the contractors and workers have all had to be CRB checked.... (?)

Village Green Public Enquiry Update.

The Council were assured that they would receive the results of the enquiry with 6-8 weeks. It is now 11 weeks on and nothing has been heard. You will have to continue to wait with bated breath.

Queen Elizabeth 11 Initiative Update.

Things are progressing. The cllrs were shown a picture of the plaque that will be erected.

The Village Shop

26% of the village responded to the Community Council's latest survey. So although the results of the survey or the nature of those responses were not discussed at the meeting, the cllrs thought that maybe it was time to draw a line under this particular project. Unfortunately Cllr Moles was not at the meeting to outline what progress he had made in contacting wealthy people in the village who might like to support a shop enterprise. The cllrs also agreed that a response will need to be made to MHA who had been approached in regard to a Community

Council (or wealthy local backers) supported shop project. It was decided to set up a sub committee to discuss any plans that might spring up from local people.

Recreation Hall Lease

This went on for ages. I've cut it down to the bare minimum. Leases-solicitors-reports-legalease-ownership-rent-constitutions-documents-peppercorns-renewable - 20 years or 22 years or 7 years and another 7 years or 25 years - herewith and thereon... Please feel free to make of it what you will.

Best Kept Village Competition 2012

Judging will take place in the month of June. The judges have been requested to take account of the Tan House and the Old Post Office. Or rather not to take account of. The Cllrs wished to thank all the people who have worked hard planting, brushing sweeping and weeding.

Traffic Calming Measures

It was acknowledged that sleeping policemen and rumble trips were not popular in the village or with local farmers. It was suggested that the 30mph signs could be moved a little closer into the village to slow traffic down. There were also discussions that the speed limit through the village should be reduced to 20 mph. And there was the possibility of a village share in one of those light-up signs. And also the possibility of copying Caerwent's 5 bar gate idea on the A48 but ours would be a 7barred gate and painted white so that it stands out. So to speak.

Feed Back on the Jubilee Event

This was a very successful evening, the weather was good and about 250-300 people watched the lighting of the Beacon and the brilliant Firework Display. Huge thanks go to our clerk, Hilary Counsell and to Cllr Lynne Prosser. Thanks also to Charles Eickhoff and Bill Clerk who arranged the excellent Firework Display.

Councillor for Mynynbach?

As yet no applicants

Bus Timetables.

Damien Weekes of MCC has been chased up and hopefully Bus Timetables will eventually reach the bus shelters in Earlswood and West End.

Code of Conduct Training.

MCC have been a little lax in organising 'Codes of Conduct' courses for new and recently elected cllrs. It was wondered if the council should organise its own course. Some councillors wondered if they needed to go on such a course.

Duration of Community Council Meetings

It was suggested that sometimes the monthly meeting can be a little... lengthy. (Surely not?) . It was suggested (again) that cllrs should look at planning applications on line before the meeting, to cut down on the discussion. And that perhaps a time limit could be imposed on how long the meetings should go on (and on...) for there were issues and problems of course and these were fully discussed. At length.

Temporary Access over Blethyn Close grounds.

Heavy site vehicles can't get along the little lane and so have been granted Temporary Access to drive over the grassland at Blethyn Close. This isn't very popular as it is grunging up the ground and making a muddy mess. It is to be hoped that the contractors put right the spoilt land.

Nick Ramsey had written to the council to ask if it would like him to attend and to give a talk on how the Welsh Assembly works. There was a discernable lack of enthusiasm around the table and it was decided to give that one a miss.

Caerwent MOD have had a change of heart and will continue to allow motor rallies to take place on the base.

The Piece of Community Land up at Earlswood

The council spent what seemed a very, very long time on what to do with this 5½ acre field. What should be done with the grass? Should it be cut? When should it be cut? Who should cut it? How much would they sell it for? Should they get a contractor? Should they sell it? Should they rent it? What should be the rent be? Should they go to an agent? Should it be advertised? Would that be too late for the grass? Forget the EU crisis – what about this field?

And finally an apology.

Regardless of any livestock, the community field up at Earlswood is known as The Poorland – and not as I suggested in last month's magazine, The Pooland.

STARGAZING IN JUNE

Later in the evening the Summer Triangle is overhead. This is a prominent triangle formed by the bright stars Altair, to the South of the triangle, Vega, closest to the Western horizon, and Deneb, to the East. Deneb forms the tail of the cross-shaped constellation Cygnus, the Swan. From our perspective the 3 stars have similar brightness. However they lie at different distances from Earth. Deneb is an extremely luminous star at 1400 light years from Earth whilst Vega and Altair are less luminous and are both much closer to Earth at a distance of about 20 light years. The familiar seven stars of Ursa Major, the Great Bear or Plough, are to be seen in the north-west, with the "W" of Cassiopeia climbing into the north-eastern sky.

The planet Saturn is low in the evening sky to the south-west above the bright star Spica. On the 25th they form a triangle with the 7-day old Moon. Yellowish Mars is lower in the sky and to the right of Saturn. It is joined by the Moon on the 24th. For early birds, Venus is low on the horizon with Jupiter above it. The crescent Moon sits close by on the 15th.

Over forty years ago, on July 20, 1969, the Apollo 11 Lunar Lander descended to the surface of the Moon and Neil Armstrong became the first man to set foot on the Moon.

I was up all night wondering where the Sun had gone... then it dawned on me. Dave Thomas



A Day . What Tounts?

Fruit and vegetables don't have to be fresh to count as a portion.

They don't have to be eaten on their own, they can be part of a dish.

Eat a wide variety of fruit and vegetables but remember potatoes don't count; they belong to the starch family.

The following count towards your 5 A DAY:

Fresh fruit and vegetables.

Frozen fruit and vegetables.

Tinned or canned fruit and vegetables. Buy the ones tinned in natural juice or water, with no added sugar or salt.

Dried fruit, such as currants, raisins, blueberries, cranberries, dates, sultanas, mango, pawpaw, pineapple and figs.

Fruit and vegetables cooked in dishes such as soups, stews or pasta dishes.

A glass (150ml) of unsweetened 100% fruit or vegetable juice.

Smoothies containing all of the edible fibre from the fruit or vegetable.

Beans and pulses. These only count as one portion a day, no matter how many you eat. That's because they contain fewer nutrients than other fruits and vegetables.

Fruit and vegetables found in convenience foods. Some ready-made foods are high in salt, sugar and fat, so only have them occasionally or in small amounts.

It was introduced to California in the late nineteenth century. The warm, dry climate is suitable for a healthy and plentiful crop. It's a nutritional superstar among fruits, being very rich in antioxidants and vitamins C and E. Packed with soluble fibre, which has cholesterol-removing properties, and insoluble fibre, which helps maintain healthy bowels.

The detoxifying properties of mangoes mean they are good for cleansing the kidney and blood and can help improve skin texture.

Mango and Tomato Salsa Serves 4-6

An accompaniment for meat, fish or vegetarian dishes. Excellent served at barbecues or as a dip with tortilla chips.

Ingredients.

- 6 medium ripe tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 large mango, halved stoned, peeled and diced
- 2 tablespoon fresh coriander
- Salt and pepper

Method

- 1 Place the tomatoes in a large bowl. Cover with boiling water and leave to stand for 1 minute, then lift out. Using a knife, pierce the skin and peel it off. Cut the tomatoes into quarters, then cut out the central core and seeds. Chop the remaining flesh and place in a large bowl.
- 2 Heat the oil in a frying pan. Add the onions and fry gently until softened.
- **3** Add to the bowl of tomatoes with the mango and coriander.
- **4** Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- **5** Serve cold.

Tips

- **1** If you buy unripe mangoes, put them in a paper bag in a dark place and they will ripen within a few days.
- **2** Eat ripe mangoes raw for maximum vitamin C content, or eat with yogurt or in a salad.
- **3** Mangoes go well with prawns and cold rice salad with a spicy dressing.



GARDENING CORNER

When I was a mere lad of 6 or 7 years of age I used to regularly go and help my dad on his allotment. We had a double sized one and I had a little patch to 'mess around' with all of my own. We also had a very large garden, typical of 1950's suburbia. We lived in London, although as I may have said before, my walk to school took me past green field that had real cows grazing in them! So a far cry from the London we think of today. It seemed at the time that everyone gardened, and mostly everyone grew vegetables and fruit. Thinking back I suppose that this was most likely, more out of necessity than anything else, as times were still hard. I suppose mum did buy vegetables, but I can't remember. I do remember dad calling into the allotment on his way back from work and bringing the vegetables for dinner that night. What we ate was always 'fresh', meaning in the raw state or from a tin as we didn't have a freezer even if they had been invented for domestic use by then! During the seventies and eighties gardening seemed to have gone out of fashion, life was good and people were enjoying themselves. A couple of generations grew up without the need to garden. If they had land which needed managing they simply hired a gardener, with the result that gardening skills disappeared, but this meant that youngsters weren't able to learn the necessary skills either, so there has been a huge gap and a lot of lost knowledge along the way. My day job has shown the same trends in that for the last thirty plus years I have worked with landowners, mostly farmers, working with them to manage their own woodlands. This is the same situation in that these days there are very few farmers that know how to manage their woods. They usually end up being used as a sheltered spot in which to feed stock in the winter. This can do untold damage to the ground flora and the soil structure, withhold them realising. Go back a couple of generations and their grandfathers would have actively managed their woods as part of the farm business. The woods will have been managed to provide fuel for the house, material to build fences (cleft oak stakes for example) and the under-story (usually hazel around here) was cut young and made into hurdles for temporary sheep pens and the like. Obviously the larger timber was used to build the barns and out buildings and other 'waste wood' or excess was often turned into charcoal and sold locally either to the village blacksmith or to local industry (around here this tended to be iron smelting for nails or wire – as in the Angiddy valley above Tintern). Flora and fauna thrived, which is one reason why we have so many bluebell and daffodil woods in our area (the soil helps of course!).

In recent years I have seen both trends reverse as, especially farmers' wives and their children have shown an interest in woodland management and there has been a resurgence in courses available to train many in the valuable skills that we have sadly lost. Gardening is the same with more and more people showing an interest in vegetable growing. Some of this is out of necessity as current times are tough for many, but also because those that have tried have realised just how much better the food can taste, fresh from garden to plate.

This was brought home to me last night when we sat down to dinner. The new potatoes, calabrese, baby carrots and broad beans had been plucked from the garden less than forty minutes before and cooked immediately. Boy, were they good!

However those new to gardening do so when times are challenging to say the least. There are so many more pests and diseases to knock you down when you least expect, and the vagaries of today's weather can often be enough to turn people off for ever, as crops either rot in front of your eyes or die because you can't water them. Every year I write about failures and successes and this year has been no exception. The key I have discovered is to accept defeat gracefully and not to put all your eggs in the same basket. I've talked previously about growing seed from French or Italian seed companies and I'm closely monitoring what happens. The one key thing I've definitely hit on is to grow as much variety of vegetables as your plot will allow, as it doesn't matter what the weather does, you will always have some things that survive and thrive.

I mentioned a few months ago that we lost all our peaches and nectarines, which is almost true. I heavily pruned all the trees the other day and discovered one peach hanging on for dear life. Hardly a success admitted, but the cool weather and excess rain has meant the strawberries have bulked up well (now all we want is some sunny weather to ripen them), as have the blueberries and jostaberries, so you get my drift- something else will come along and you need to make the most of the harvest. Vegetable wise, I'm struggling to get carrots to germinate and grow, yet I've got the best parsnips I think ever, and the calabrese in the tunnel has been coming out of our ears! Thank heaven for the freezer I say.

Unfortunately the flower garden has suffered badly as the ground has been too wet to get on the beds to weed and sort them out generally, but they will have to wait until there is a change in the weather.

The bees have faced a challenging time too. The early warm weather (yes seems hard to believe that we have had any doesn't it) really set them off well, and bee numbers increased rapidly, as ready supplies of pollen were available. Then with numbers high we've had a period where there has been no decent weather for the bees to get out and fly. What food had been stored in the hive was quickly used to sustain the colony and things weren't looking good. Fortunately I avoided having to feed as a spell of warm weather came along to allow them out and to start foraging again. Whenever it is warm I keep an eye on the apiary as this is the most likely time for bees to swarm. Sure enough I looked a couple of Saturdays ago to find a huge swarm had alighted on one of the apple trees. I had left an empty hive with all its frames etc. in the apiary as this will often encourage a 'loose swarm' to take up residence. However this was a big swarm which I couldn't afford to lose, so I prepared the hive before collecting the swarm. This one couldn't have been any easier as they had alighted onto a small branch which had sagged down under the weight of bees. I grabbed the branch just above the swarm and with a pair of secateurs cut the branch off, carried it over to the empty hive and then gave one quick shake, so that all the bees fell off into the hive - job done! I fed then for a few days with sugar syrup, which would allow them to settle in and to start building up the wax frames ready for life to begin in earnest. I need to look at all the colonies again, but waiting for that elusive nice weather to come along again.


