Our Parish Visitors work within a strict code of confidentiality so that you may be confident that whatever is shared with them goes no further.

The one exception to this is that Visitors may share the minimum information necessary to obtain support and advice themselves, if necessary, from our clergy or other appropriate person. This would only happen with the persons consent

QUEEN ELIZABETH 11 FIELDS

QUEEN ELIZABETH 11 FIELDS is a Diamond Jubilee initiative to register 2012 areas of recreational land throughout the country in order to preserve their future. The land would be Registered with the" Fields in Trust" (formerly known as the Playing Fields Association) thus protecting the land in *perpetuity*, whilst not affecting the current ownership and management. In addition, it would enable the landowner (Shirenewton Community Council) to apply for grant funding for limited improvements.

The time limit for submitting the application is very tight, therefore, the Community Council has to press ahead quite urgently to get our application registered in time. If any members of the community have any queries or objections to this course of action, can I suggest that you look at the official website www.qe2fields.com and/or ring your community councillor as early as possible.

Anyone who is a fan of The Archers will have heard, in a recent episode, a very good explanation of what QE2 Fields status means for the community. Shirenewton & Mynyddbach are not the only areas in Monmouthshire to be pursuing an application and the entire initiative is being endorsed and supported by Monmouthshire County Council.

SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING, Monday 14th May

This month's meeting was a week later than usual because of the elections held on May 4th. Liz McCombe is now Chair of the council with Bev Moore as Vice Chair. There were lots of extra posts to fill e.g reps for One Voice Wales, the Conservation Area Committee, the Environment Committee and the Rec Association. Ken volunteered to continue being Footpath Officer, one of the band of Merry Men who patrol and protect the paths. I can't remember if anyone volunteered to be the Tree Officer. And then there was the equally puzzling Llanmelin Hill Fort Committee which nobody seemed to know much about. Apparently, it hasn't met for years – if ever. Its remit is lost in the mists of time. One can only assume that the Iron Age settlers got fed up waiting for their problems to be sorted because I don't think they're there now. Maybe someone ought to pass this news on.

Oh yes, and I think one of the new councillors hinted that I should make it plain that my notes on the council meetings are my own wobbly version and that they are not the **Official Minutes**. So I will mention once again that you can find the real McCoy on the church web site and on the notice boards. It was also suggested that someone on the council might like to write a report for the mag. But after a distinct pause it became clear that no one was rushing forward to pick up this wonderful opportunity.

Planning

DC/2012/00195 New Mill. Earlswood

Construction of a garden store. There was a good deal of chat about the size of this store. But if it was to house a tractor it would have to be quite big. But it seems that the numbers didn't add up and the written dimensions didn't fit the dimensions on the plan.

DC/2012/00153 Tredegar Court, Newchurch Earlswood

Subdivision of Tredegar Court into 3 separate dwellings (semidetached barn conversions). There was not enough information about this application but it was difficult to find out more from MCC's Planning Department because MCC's Planning Department are still moving. (But I thought they moved ages ago...) And they seemed to be 'off-line' a lot. There had been indications that there were bats there (that's at Tredegar Court not the planning department) but nobody could see any information about a bat survey. Therefore it was decided to ask for more information.

DC/2012/00214 Old Post Office, Ditch Hill Lane, Shirenewton

Change of defunct post office to residential dwelling. It was decided that these plans greatly improved the old Post Office in the centre of the village. Recommend Approval

DC/2012/00310 4 Tan House Court, Shirenewton

Single storey extension (kitchen) and loft conversion.

There were no issues with this application Recommend Approval

The Village Green Public Enquiry Update

No news. Still waiting.

The Queen Elizabeth 11 Initiative The Rec has been submitted for QE status and there will be an article in this month's mag about this initiative. And the little triangle in Mynnyddbach had also been considered. That's the bit behind the old school. But who owns this piece of land? Is it on the land registry? This would need to be established. Apparently there was an enquiry way, way back in 1960 and that one was held at St Pierre and that enquiry only lasted half a day. This was to try and establish who the land belonged to but then sadly the Enquirer got killed on the motorway and the ownership doesn't seem to be on the land registry but MCC cuts the grass and anyway it's slightly undersized.

The Village Shop Survey Well, the new questionnaires were circulated last month but as only 26% of people responded to this survey it was suggested that this 'poor response' indicated that people were not interested in having a shop. But then other cllrs had discovered on their election door-to-door canvassing that a good number of people were very interested in talking about having a local shop. Meanwhile, Graham Down had looked in to the possibility of finding a local Housing Association willing to take over the 'old shop' but it seems that only one Association would only consider the enterprise and only if it was underwritten by Shirenewton Community Council. Or by rich people in the village. So, after some discussion , it was decided that a couple of the cllrs should explore this route – the

local backers not the underwriting by SCC and that they should approach local business men to see if they would like to put something into the community. **Finance** It takes years and years and years for the local bank to accept councilors becoming signatories with multiple visits by each cllr to present himself to the bank along with proof of identity, proof of residence, proof of existence, DNA, iris recognition, so it was suggested that life was too short for all this palaver. By the time the bank has authorized the mandate, there have usually been new elections. **Best Kept Village** The competition application form now been sent in. Shirenewton spends £100 on this. Mathern allows £3000. It was agreed to increase the Shirenewton budget to £150

Diamond Jubilee Celebrations There was a sudden realization that this jubilee was happening in less than 3 weeks. There were some sharp intakes of breath at this point. Did I discern that the details seemed to be... a little on the hazy side? Well, the beacon will be lit, the fireworks have been ordered, the tickets were sort of talked about but no one seemed to know where the Hog was. Maybe he didn't want a roasting. But I'm sure it will all turn out splendidly on the day but whether for the Hog or not, I really wouldn't know.

And then I had this horrible notion that people see me as the Mrs Snell of Shirenewton. No this is a Shirenewton Community Council event. But rest assured – a happening will happen on the Rec. I recommend you bring a bottle. And a brolly. And if the hog doesn't turn up, a sandwich. Have a look in the rest of this month's mag I expect there will be more info somewhere.



After the competition the ringers were entertained to tea at The Chantry, and well in excess of £100 was raised for Christian Aid, to add to that raise earlier at the Christian Aid lunch. As host tower for The Striking Competition we received expert bands from St Woolos Cathedral and towers with large catchment populations so we were pleased with a second place in the call change section and third in the method section. What next in the ringing calendar?

Well Shirenewton is not on the Olympic Torch route but several of us will be assisting others towers that are, to peal their bells during The Torch's passage. Quickly following on from this is the Diamond Jubilee weekend. The bells in Shirenewton will ring out for the Church Fete on the 2nd June, and ring as usual for Sunday service. On Tuesday 5th June a peal attempt will take place during the afternoon. A "peal" in ringing jargon is a continuous set of changes exceeding 5000. This takes about 2 hours and 45 minutes to complete and will specifically commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee for Shirenewton, and the Queen will be personally informed of this if achieved. Church bells all over the UK will be commemorating this celebration in this way, with peal attempts at all major cathedrals, and within many churches in London including St Paul's, St Martin's in the Field and Westminster Abbey. Christopher Eickhoff will be ringing his first peal for this attempt. So if you are in the village on the afternoon of 5th June and you hear the bells, wish us well – it will be quite an achievement if we attain it

STARGAZING IN JUNE

The planet Saturn can be seen just above the star Spica in the evening sky to the south. On the 28th the waxing Moon is positioned beside Saturn. Mars has a slightly orange colour and is further to the west. On the 26th the Moon is to the left of Mars.

On 6^{th} June, the planet Venus passes in front of the Sun. This "Transit of Venus" is very rare – the next occurrence will be in 2117. Measurements of the transit in the late 16^{th} century allowed astronomers to calculate the distance of the Sun from Earth for the first time. Never look directly at the Sun through binoculars or a telescope, as this will cause blindness.

To the south the constellation of Boötes the Herdsman, has the fourth brightest star in the whole sky, Arcturus. It is a red giant star and the curve of the handle of the Plough points down to it. Arcturus is at a distance of 40 light years, which means it takes light 40 years to cross space from the star to Earth. As light travels approximately 200 thousand miles in 1 second, Arcturus is at quite a distance! Even so it is one of the closest of the bright stars. The name Arcturus is derived from Greek and means "guardian of the bears". Above and to the left of Arcturus can be seen a semi-circle of stars making up Corona Borealis, the Northern Crown.

The W-shape of Cassiopeia lies in a north-easterly direction. Leo the Lion, shaped rather like a reversed question mark, can be seen in the west. Cygnus the Swan lies in the eastern sky. It is one of the most distinctive constellations, often nicknamed the Northern Cross.

Midsummer's Day is on June 20th. This is the summer solstice, the day with the longest period of daylight. In Wales it is called Gŵyl Ifan Ganol Haf (St John's of Midsummer). Great agricultural fairs used to be held at this time, along with merriment and dancing. A bonfire was also kept this night. Its observance finally died out in SE Wales by the end of the 19th century.

SHIRENEWTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The society has had a busy few weeks at our April meeting we had Anne Wareham to give us a talk entitled '*Squatters in the Veddw'*. This talk described the way the area developed, why and how it became the area it is now, the architecture and the professions of the inhabitants, a very interesting talk.

We held a joint visit with Caerwent Historic Trust to visit Allt-y-Bella, a medie-val house near Usk which had been renovated and is now in private ownership. It was a fine, warm morning and we were warmly welcomed and invited into the house for morning coffee (and Welsh cakes), small groups of five toured the house while the rest of us visited the garden which has been designed by the owner who is an eminent garden designer. The pleached pear trees running the whole front of the house forming a screen were in blossom and made a perfect frame for this beautiful house. All our members agreed that it was a very enjoyable visit.

Our next visit was to 'Lasketts' a garden in Hereford owned by Sir Roy Strong. A group of twenty nine left Shirenewton, dressed for anything that the elements could throw at us. With a stop off at Hereford for sustenance we arrived at 'Lasketts' to be welcomed by Sir Roy Strong, who gave us a short history of the garden and how it had developed and then we scattered to the four corners, accompanied by a fine drizzle, to discover the many unusual, eccentric and beautiful aspects of this garden.



No-bake Chocolate Cake for Easter se

Ingredients:

150g (6oz) good quality chocolate, broken into pieces 100g (4oz) unsalted butter 50g (2oz) golden syrup 150g (6oz) sultanas 150g (6oz) ready to eat prunes, chopped 75g (3oz) pistachios 200g (8oz) shortbread, roughly broken Mini chocolate eggs

Method:

Line a 900g (2lb) loaf tin with two layers of Clingfilm, leaving excess hanging over the sides.

Heat the chocolate and butter until melted and smooth.

Stir in the syrup, and remaining ingredients, and carefully fold in the shortbread. Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin, scatter over the mini eggs, leave to set.

Tips:

Either freeze for 2 hours, or refrigerate for at least 5 hours until set . Or simply make the day before and leave in the fridge over night.

GARDENING CORNER

I know that I've said it many times before in different ways, but some 90% of these articles start with reference to the weather, which is a similar percentage to how conversations start – apparently! But I make no excuses for this as the weather impacts so much on what we, as gardeners, do or don't do and ultimately of course it affects the results we achieve. I've learnt over the many years I've been gardenening (and I have photographic proof that puts this at some 56 years now – ves hard to believe I hear you say!) that you have to take whatever nature brings and take it on the chin. One of the key lessons learnt is that you should never get disheartened, no matter how difficult this might appear at times. Some of you may have picked up by now that my day job is a forester and I have now worked for the Forestry Commission for over 34 years. One of the biggest challenges that now faces' us is global warming. As the life span of trees can be incredibly long we have to accept that we must make plans for the future, we can no longer carry on planting the same trees and expect them to survive into the next century. Politicians and man in general, despite the warning signs can't agree what needs to be done to prevent global warming getting worse. I recently sat through a presentation by some of my Forest Research colleagues which was sobering to say the least. They have done a lot of exceptional work on modelling for the future, and, assuming the current trend continues to 2050, our climate / conditions for say Staffordshire is set to become the same as Central France. If anyone has holidayed in this area (in France that is!), they may have picked up that the woodland there is different to what you might find in Staffordshire. The key changes we need to make when growing trees is to select seed to grow young trees from parents growing in central France now. This is fine as our most loved broadleaved trees (such as oak and ash), grow right down to the Mediterranean coast anyway, but it also means that we will have to start growing a lot of other species, probably in mixture to ensure we have a robust woodland going forward. Species such as Californian redwood, Japanese cedar and acacia may all figure in our future woodland cover. Like nature we'll have to get use to these changes. However even in the shorter term, as with gardening we may need to make some changes in how and what we grow.

Already this year we have lost our entire crop of both apricots and nectarines. I'm not sure whether this was down to a particularly cold night, or particularly hot days too early on. Either way all the fruit, which was the size of a pence piece, withered and fell off. Fortunately we made copious amounts of chutney last year from the excess of fruit we had, but we'll miss the incredible fruit picked fresh from the tree. When dwelling on this loss I began to mull over other losses or problems experienced recently and I'm convinced now that things are far worse than ever they have been in the past. As a kid I grew up in London (mind you I used to walk, or later on, cycle to school and in doing so went past green fields — it was the suburbs after all!). Dad had a big garden and an allotment and I had my own 'little patch'. I can never remember problems with any of this — no crop losses, no insect attacks to any great degree. Everything seemed to be in harmony. Not so these days, as whatever we seem to grow gets attacked by

something or other. Maybe dad sprayed everything with noxious chemicals and I never noticed, but certainly can't remember that this was the case. I've noticed recently that several seed companies have starting selling seed using either French or Italian varieties. Sold more along the lines supposedly of 'the taste' I wonder whether perhaps we shouldn't be taking a leaf out of forestry's books (sorry, no pun intended), and to start growing these seeds because they might be more suited to the weather, rather than just the taste. I've bought a few packets of seeds to try, so will see what happens.

Inevitably, because the weather has been so ridiculous so far this year, it has meant some major problems in the garden. The crops in the tunnel (apart from the fruit trees) are doing well, although the change to cold, wet weather has had a bad effect on the tomatoes. They ended up too wet and cold and as a result a lot of their roots rotted off. I've replanted them, and put them in the soil much deeper as they will grow a whole set of new roots – they just don't look to good at the moment. Fortunately the peppers are still in pots in the relative warmth of the greenhouse, so hopefully things will improve at some stage. As with every year I continue to have problems keeping the melons and cucumbers growing without rotting off. I started off with six cucumbers, and I'm now down to three, with one of them not looking good. This happens every year, but so long as I nurse one or two through, we will have enough to feed the salad market here at Barn Farm. I have sown a few extra seeds as an insurance policy, so we'll keep the fingers crossed. I always plant some runner and French bean seed during April with the intention of planting out in mid May. This year is no exception, but it is too cold at night and the beans, which are in individual pots are starting to use each other for support. This is not good news, as they will be a right mess to sort out. The only option is to plant them outside and protect them from any frosts using the good old horticultural fleece. I have grown several new varieties of beans this year as out of all the vegetables, these seem to be the least troublesome. However, rather than grow for the pods, some of the varieties are aimed for drying, so this will allow us to store them more easily and to use in different ways. Over the last two years we experimented by growing French 'Berlotti' beans (although the name sounds a bit Italian doesn't it?). These have been a very welcome addition to casseroles – you just have to remember to take out what you need the night before and leave them soaking in water for 12 or more hours. As a result of increasing the number of bean varieties I have had to turn a bit more ground over to vegetable beds, but we have plenty of ground so this is not a problem. I have one area that was once another tunnel, which was more recently used for growing flower plants in containers, which we took to Framer's Markets or sold at fete's etc. The plants have gone as we no longer have the time to grow them anymore, so the ground has been cleared and currently is being dug over. This has never grown anything directly as such, so hopefully we will have decent crops. The soil itself is clay in nature, but I've barrowed several loads of farm vard manure onto it, so we'll see what happens. Time to go and finish this off.



- 15 July: another chance to visit Leechpool Holdings to see arable flowers growing among the sacrificial crops


