

Confidentiality

Our Parish Visitors work within a strict code of confidentiality so that you may be confident that whatever is shared with them goes no further.

The one exception to this is that Visitors may share the minimum information necessary to obtain support and advice themselves, if necessary, from our clergy or other appropriate person. This would only happen with the persons consent

SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING Monday 2nd April 2012

There were about 20 members of the public at the April meeting. Three speakers had asked to address the council.

One resident spoke out and said that she was deeply disappointed that Shirenewton Community Council had at last month's meeting voted against the proposed Shop at the Rec. She pointed out that many people desperately want a local shop, that a village shop makes for a better community, that it was understood that the Rec had been the most viable option and that the generous Lottery Grant which had been extremely likely was now lost. The huge attendance at the TA and the resulting questionnaire had shown that an overwhelming number of people had been in favour of a shop at the Rec. So with all these positive factors, she was very disappointed that the council had turned it down.

Another resident informed the council that the MOD were now unlikely to be hosting the Motor Sports events down at Caerwent and he thought this a shame as it brought in local money to the area.

The third resident asked if he could have all the copies of the SCC minutes going back to 2007

Police Report

This is a colour co-ordinated report . Red, white blue and grey plus a moss green rabbit.

7/3A rogue trader offered to do a drive way with a load of tarmac and quoted £300 for the job but then when it was finished charged £800. Planning

1 DC/2011/01149 Plot adjacent Oakley House Shirenewton.

Modifications to approved planning permission.

It was noted that this application was originally turned down by SCC but MCC had allowed it. There then followed a discussion as to whether this building was 3 or 4 storeys high. Anyway the Application Approved But With Observations

2 DC/2012/00098 The Old Rectory, Shirenewton

Listed building consent, rear single storey garden room.

No objections – the application was approved.

Village Green Enquiry

This took place on Mon 26th and Tuesday 27th March up at Earlswood Hall. Members of the public were invited to give evidence to the Enquiry in front of an Inspector as the how the land at Blethyn Close had been used in the past in regards of recreation and allotments. MCC had employed a Barrister on their side and Carole Jones had represented SCC. The members of SCC wish to put on record their Thanks to those who had given evidence and to Carole Jones for what turned out to be quite an ordeal. The Inspector's Report will be published sometime time May/June.

Graham Down has also pencilled in a question to MCC enquiring how much it's cost them (and us as taxpayers) to hire a top QC....

Queen Elizabeth II Initiative

This is a scheme to register Open Lands and Green Spaces so that they will remain open land and green spaces for the people. There was some confusion as to how/where/when/what was involved but I'm also muddled as to what I heard at the Community Council and what I picked up on The Archers. (They are also confused but I think they were going to reluctantly ask for land from the rich landowning Brian Aldred...) An application will be put in but if there are objections this can be withdrawn.

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THE VILLAGE SHOP PROPOSAL.

A letter of thanks will be sent to those villagers on the SMILE committee thanking them for their hard work over the last five years to get a shop up and running in the village. However, there then followed some rather acrimonious discussion as to whether there had – or had not been - a lack of communication between the three parties (SMILE, SCC and the Rec Association) A lot of the members of the public joined in the debate at this point and feelings ran high. It was suggested that despite the questionnaires completed at the TA the feelings from the village as to a local shop were not properly represented by SMILE. One member of the public suggested that a shop in the village wouldn't work. Another asked for proper business plans to be put forward based upon, I think, a hypothetical site being available.

I have to say, that it really wasn't very nice at this point in the meeting. I've written 'All very unpleasant' in my notes. Anyway, after a lot of heated discussion it was decided to put a questionnaire together. And to ask people what they would like... So there will soon be yet another opportunity for you to say what you'd like as regards to a local shop.

Diamond Jubilee Celebrations

And so to a more cheery subject, the Queen's Jubilee. There will be a Hog Roast, (order your food up front and it will be cheaper) a Firework Display, some bell ringing, Classic Cars, the Lighting of the Beacon by our young people and in general, having a good time on the Rec

We then heard the good news that Shirenewton had been considered for a Reward for Road Safety. Closely followed by the bad news was that we didn't get it.

Nothing much else to report. Anyway these notes have gone on long enough. Next month's meeting is the Annual Meeting on Monday 14th May, 2012 at 7.30. This will be after the local elections so I think there will be some new faces on the block. Or should that be heads?

BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION 2012

Can you help?

The Community Council has entered Shirenewton in the competition again this year. The application form was late arriving so it doesn't give us much time to rally the troops.

Judging will take place between 1st - 31st June and marks are given for the appearance and condition of the village, village hall and playing field, war memorial, churchyard, bus shelters and surroundings. The condition of hedges, fences, walls and verges is also taken into account, as well as the tidiness of flower and vegetable gardens, outhouses and sheds. Bonus marks are given for the general appearance of the village, noting the absence of litter and refuse dumps. BUT, marks are deducted for any unsightly areas.

Last year Shirenewton scored well on the approach to the village on the Crick road, the village hall and playing field and Caepercella. It was noted that some attention and tlc was needed to the wall around the churchyard, the war memorial and the Tan House pub site. The judge's comments were 'Overall good effort, attractive village'.

Do you think we can do better than that this year? Of course we can. It will mean everyone in the village helping, not only with their own gardens, plant pots and hanging baskets, but also by being aware of their surroundings and taking care of the public parts of the village - the entrances to the village, weeding and clearing verges and footpaths.

Shirenewton has been entered in this competition for several years and scores well because residents are proud of their attractive village and take care of its environment. Let's make a special effort in this special year of 2012 and aim to walk away with the Best Kept Village prizes.

CHURCH FINANCES

Everyone in the community will be aware that there is a constant need to raise funds to maintain the Church and ensure that it stays open for regular Sunday worship for the congregation, as well as marriages, baptisms and funerals for anyone who wishes to hold these services in Church. In an economic climate where Churches are regularly closing and becoming redundant, or being kept open on a care and maintenance basis, we are very fortunate and privileged to have our own Church and our own regular service schedule.

At the Annual Vestry Meeting the PCC Treasurer presented the annual financial report. The Church finances are divided between restricted and unrestricted funds in accordance with the format introduced by the Church in Wales a couple of years ago. Our restricted funds are largely used to provide for future maintenance of the Church.

Unrestricted funds receive income from planned giving, collections, donations and legacies; and tax refunds and grants, and these are used to support the annual activities of the Church. These funds are spent on the parish share, the priest's expenses, maintenance of services, and mission giving.. Restricted funds receive income from fundraising activities and are restricted because they can only be used for the purposes for which they are raised. For us, this is generally to provide for future maintenance of the Church fabric.

The Church started the financial year with a balance of £160 in unrestricted funds and £5,320 in restricted funds, which was not a healthy position. The year ended with a balance of £6,756 in unrestricted funds and £19,027 in restricted funds, which was much healthier, although the Church does need to build up the unrestricted funds a little more.

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There was an income of £33,854 into the restricted funds including about £13,000 from collections, £5,000 from tax refunds and £9,000 from fund raising. The fund raising total includes income from the Church fete, Parish magazine sales and rental of the Church room. Organisations connected with the Church, such as the Mothers' Union and youth organisations, pay a nominal charge for using the Church room.

The expenditure out of the unrestricted funds was about £27,250; this included the parish share of £13,000 and £9,400 on maintenance of the Church. This maintenance figure includes £4,742 for heat and light; £716 for insurance; £1,000 for Churchyard maintenance; and £2,900 for Church maintenance.

There was an income of £22,000 into the unrestricted fund, which included income from the 200 Club as well as the activities of the Shirenewton Charity Committee. The Shirenewton Charity Committee contributed £1,200 to charities during the year as well as £2,450 for exceptional Church maintenance. Another £2,000 was donated to charities from the unrestricted fund largely as a result of Sunday Club activities and the special services they helped to organise. Most of the Shirenewton Charity Committee income has come from outside the village through events such as the annual golf day and other sponsorship.

In general, collections just about cover the Parish share; and fund raising activities just about cover other church costs; and tax refunds help to rebuild the balance on the account.

The proceeds of this year's Church fete will again go into the unrestricted account to help keep the fund at a sensible level and to ensure that we can pay our bills in 2012.

The Church strives to be available for all in the community as and when they need it. It costs around £27,000 a year just to keep it going and whilst most of that is funded by regular worshippers, events like the fete help keep the Church open and available to all. The PCC hopes this will continue and they are building up a fund for future maintenance to prevent financial problems if there is a sudden and urgent need for funds for emergency repairs which could not be met and which would threaten the PCC's ability to keep the Church open.

SHIRENEWTON VILLAGE SHOP

Sadly, I have recently seen how this issue is being emotively addressed which has reflected badly and unfairly on historical village conventions. These conventions i.e. the Shirenewton Community Council and the Recreation Association are properly constituted bodies that have performed their functions over prolonged periods for the benefit of the village community. The former have kept the precept down and I might add in the present economic climate, admirably so, by comparison with other like councils. The latter have managed and maintained a village facility that is the envy of many other villages. These things just don't happen without the commitment, management and hard work of certain individuals who continue to do their best.

These individuals exercise their functions within properly constituted bodies and listen to local concerns. In recent months I along with many other locals have attended several Community Council Meetings where the village shop has been discussed.

Apart from two councilors involved in promoting the village shop enterprise, there has been an absence of SMILE representation. The issues of the shop have been debated and the request to have the shop sited at the Recreational grounds has been aired. The Community Council has made clear in these meetings they are not against a Village Shop per se, but felt the Recreation site was unsuitable for several reasons. For example, under the Community Councils duty of care, the potential for increased conflict between foot passengers and vehicular traffic was likely to result. And, apparently other alternative sites appear not to have been investigated properly. The proposition for siting the shop at the Recreational grounds was defeated; 2 for, 6 against with 2 abstentions - democracy!

In responding to question 2 in the previous article in the Parish magazine: Why has this issue come to a head now?

Having attended recent community council meetings this became quite obvious to me; because the SMILE group has failed to engage properly with the Community Council and until very recently have not involved the Recreation Association. And, there have been mixed messages, mis-information and concern about this Village Shop venture:

From the SMILE results of the survey at the Tredegar Arms pub the 'overwhelming majority' they refer to (190 respondents) represents less than a third of the Shirenewton population.

I understand the Community Council did not have sight of the survey questionnaire, prior to its use or otherwise agree to it. This despite the concern over the existing covenant at the Recreation ground, an issue that had not been resolved properly prior to surveying the community. Furthermore, villagers surveyed were not given the Community Council's or Recreation Association's views or reservations about the shop site location at the Recreation.

The scale of the proposed plans to accommodate a shop and coffee bar by relocating present facilities was of much concern and likely to jeopardise existing provision.

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It's difficult to see how the Community Council could commit to something without <u>proper enquiry</u> into village need, viability and management functions of this enterprise without being able to see a 'valid business case' which to date has never been produced!

The Community Council cannot exercise its responsible functions for, or against this SMILE enterprise without greater transparency and communication which to date has been sadly missing and that quite frankly is why we are in the position we are.

The article in the parish magazine is unfair and a misguided attempt to blame the properly constituted bodies in the village and make them the scapegoats for the inadequacies and shortcomings of SMILE.

For me whilst a shop maybe 'desirable'- and I use this term because we've managed without one for many years - there are more pressing and 'essential' issues for this community. For example, *Traffic Calming* through the village for a 20MPH zone, before a child or local person is killed. I have recently requested under the Freedom of Information Act for certain information which I will furnish to the Community Council for their constructive deliberations in how to progress this issue. The Community Council has also worked very hard recently in their fight for Village Green status at the Mynyddbach Inquiry. These for me are time consuming issues of significant importance as opposed to the shop enterprise.

Having said this, it is a fact that the Community Council has through the local County Council representative Councilor Down, caused enquiry to be made with two local housing associations to see if it's possible to find a commercially viable way of bringing Shirenewton shop back into use at the old shop premises. (see Councilor Down's election campaign leaflet) This alternative should be pursued and if you want to know more about it ask the SMILE or Community Council members!

There are local ward elections coming up and the electorate may have to tease out the motives of potential candidates as to why they may be standing. In essence, do they have the wider village interests at heart with primary objectives that ensure they will not be sidetracked with secondary issues?

I hold the view that citizenship and the fabric of our society dictates democracy through established conventions and to abuse these principles by endeavouring to circumvent these institutions, is divisive and damaging.

Finally, at the last Community Council meeting it was decided that the Council would engage properly in a questionnaire to all residents in pursuing the viability of a Village Shop, and in accordance with democratic processes.

THE VILLAGE SHOP; THE FACTS

In the article in the April issue of this magazine, few of the answers to the questions posed were factual, the main were pure conjecture. These are the factual answers to the questions posed, taken from records of public meetings.

Firstly, in July 2007, Shirenewton Community Council (SCC) set up a working party, comprising Cllrs Saysell, Eickhoff, Crundwell and Harvey, "to look at examples of Community shops" and this is the only remit given to any persons to investigate in any way the feasibility of re-establishing a shop in Shirenewton Village Council minute July 2007 No 2016.

During the subsequent four years, two members of this working party left the council, and hence the working party, and were not replaced for whatever reason Consequently, SCC minutes indicate that Cllr Eickoff carried on the good work of this group on his own SCC minutes record that the following options were investigated as to their potential to facilitate.

A village shop

- · Reopen the old shop
- Both the Carpenters Arms and the Tredegar Arms were considered on a like basis SCC Minute 2269
- The setting up of a temporary facility (Portakabin) on a temporary site SCC Minute 2354 - Building a new shop on land owned by Shirenewton and Mynyddbach Fields Association Ltd (SMAL) SCC Minute 2365
- Incorporate a shop in land adjacent to Clear View, opposite old shop, which
 was under consideration for housing development, and rent it as a Community
 shop SCC Minute 2479
- Take over the Tan House public house and incorporate a shop in these premises SCC Minute 2635
- Incorporate a shop into the facilities on the Recreation Field SCC Minute 2678
 The minute numbers identify the chronological order in which proposed sites
 for a village shop were presented to SCC meetings. The reason the shop issue,
 "came to a head" at the SCC meeting in Feb 2012, was that the last option
 presented to the council only two meetings earlier had been progressed through a
 public consultation exercise which was the first that the majority of councillors
 knew that it was being advanced as though it was a proposal that had been
 adopted by the council. The same situation applied to the Recreation Association,
 the only knowledge any of its members had of this proposal was a visit by Mr
 Mathew Smith to the chairman's home in Nov 2011, to give him a computer
 presentation of a like proposal and seek his personal view on it

It is untrue to claim that the Recreation Field is the most suitable site for a village shop because it is publicly owned, no land purchase required, allows the shop to be a new build project, as established grant support for community projects and a suitable location. Another site put up to the council but not progressed to a conclusion, was the SAMFAL site, which has all the above attributes, and is in fact a better location, being central between the two communities with four footpaths accessing it radiating to the whole village.

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Furthermore, it has an established, much better vehicle access, could incorporate a visitor centre for school parties and the like making use of this nature park facility, has established commercial status as it has registered Ltd status identification and the visitor centre facilitating education visits would expand possible grant support. Regarding grants, SCC Minutes 2678 is the only record in the minutes of it supporting a provisional grant application for a shop project. This was made to the BBC in Dec 2009, was signed by Cllrs Eede and Eickhoff and was turned down by the BBC, March 2010 Minute 2441. The only other minutes which refer to such a grant application are, Oct 2011 No 2678 and Jan 2012 No 2695, agreeing for SMILE to pursue grant funding, no mention of applications.

Minutes record that the SCC has not changed its mind about a village shop and shows that it has always supported efforts to re-establish a viable shop if this is possible it has opposed this being on the recreation Field because public opinion, expressed at its meetings, was against this proposal. To this end, at its last meeting it set up to carry out a referendum of the whole community to establish its views on all the aspects of establishing a community shop in the village in the future.

The existing situation regarding the ownership and operation of the field was set up in circa 1974, in compliance with the covenant put on the field by Mr Percy Liddell and under the guidance of Mr John Gilbert, such that it prevented it being used for any commercial purpose. Subsequent records SCC of meetings minutes and the Recreation Association AGM minutes ensures that anyone interested in this community facility knows of this present situation. There never has been and is not currently, any commercial operation being carried out on the field. The Shirenewton Playgroup is a registered charity and rents the hall facility on the same basis as all the other users, in fact they are a major source of income to the Recreation Association. As SMILE has pursued the legality of the covenant on the field, with a view to getting it lifted or at least changed to accommodate a village shop there, the SCC has in its possession a letter from Twomlow Solicitors and Associates giving their perspective on this issue, March minute 2714

Development on the field by the building of a shop there as a commercial enterprise could indicate to the local Planning Authority that the community accepts the field as available for further commercial development. As such, they could pass it for housing or the like and generate an income for the council, something they have done with other playing fields in the county.

From the April SCC meeting, if the community as a whole wants a shop, providing it is a financially viable proposition, an acceptable site can be found etc, agreed it would continue the village shop study. To get the communities opinion on these points a referendum was set up to establish data on all the points and issues relating to the feasibility of a village shop. If this referendum concludes, with good community participation, the SCC will be obliged to move ahead with village shop project. If this happens, hopefully a lot of the good work done by Cllr Eickoff and his helpers can be used to bring a village shop to fruition.

Nerys's Natty Nosh Weetabix Cake Serves: 8

Recipe from Eirwen Wilson



2 Weetabix

1 cup dried fruit

3/4 cup muscavado sugar

1 cup milk

1 cup -mixed chopped nuts and chopped cherries

6oz self raising flour

1 large egg, or 2 small eggs beaten

Method

- 1 Mix together the Weetabix, sugar, dried fruit and milk in large bowl.
- 2. Leave overnight.
- 3. Add flour and beaten egg. If the mixture is a little dry add a little milk. Put into greased and floured (or lined with liner) 2lb loaf tin.
- 4. Cook at 180c or gas mark 4 for approximately one hour, until skewer comes out clean. Cool on wire rack.

Tips

I have made this cake several times and I'm delighted with the results. It's incredibly easy to make, it's moist and keeps well in an airtight container in the fridge.

Freezes well.

It's adaptable, use it as a pudding, or serve with a cup of tea.

Vary the ingredients:-

Dried fruits;- sultanas, blueberries, cranberries, currents, papaya, pineapple, or strawberries.

Essences:-Add essences to the milk e.g. Vanilla, chocolate, or almond.

Spices:-Add spices to the flour e.g. cinnamon, nutmeg or mixed spice.

Make it into a double chocolate cake:-Follow the above method with the following ingredients

2 Weetabix

1 cup -cooking chocolate drops and chopped nuts

34 cup muscavado sugar

1 cup milk or Soya milk

1 cup dried fruit

5oz self raising flour

1 oz cocoa

1 large egg, beaten add a little milk if required.

FAIRTRADE NEWS

Traidcraft's spring bulletin highlights smallholder farmers who produce rubber in south eastern Sri Lanka.

'It was hugely inspiring to see how the 300 members of the Firstlight co-operative are growing in confidence as they begin to feel the benefits of fair trade.



As well as receiving a guaranteed price for their rubber the farmers also receive free training and as a result their yields are improving. Inoka told me that her rubber yields improved by 30%.

It was fantastic to see the difference that fair trade is making to the community too. I visited a pre-school where fair trade premiums have paid for classroom improvements, books and playground equipment.

Fair trade often creates opportunities for natural entrepreneurs like Kumari. Seeing the potential offered by growing rubber - but also the difficulty in getting hold of saplings - Kumari decided to start her own nursery. She now has several thousand rubber tree saplings which she will sell to other farmers and help spread the benefits across the region.'

Traidcraft sells 3 types of rubber gloves: lightweight washing up gloves, tougher gardening gloves and general heavyweight outdoor gloves.

Another new product is coir garden compost. The compost is made from coconut husk fibres which used to be dumped in huge 'slag heaps' around the 'coconut triangle' region north of Colombo. This is an eco-friendly alternative to peat-based composts. It has fantastic water retention and improves the soil. One block (650gms) makes 9 litres of compost. The blocks cost £2 50 from Traidcraft.

And with the barbecue season approaching (!) don't forget the fairly traded charcoal and disposable barbecues available from the trusty Co-op! Do contact me for more info.

STARGAZING

There are three planets on view in the evening sky this month. The very bright planet Venus is in the west. Saturn is to the south-east and is to the left of the star Spica. Saturn is the brighter of the two. On the 4th the almost full Moon is just below Saturn and Spica. Higher in the sky to the south, Mars is to the left of the star Regulus. On the 1st, the Moon lies just below and to the left of Mars.

The seven stars of the Plough lie overhead in mid-evening. Its classical name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear. In mythology, Callisto, attendant to the goddess Juno was considered more beautiful than her mistress. To protect her from her jealous mistress, Jupiter turned Callisto into a bear. Unfortunately Callisto's son tried to kill the bear whilst he was out hunting, so Jupiter placed the bear in the sky.

The two stars furthest from the handle of the Plough are called the Pointers. Tracing a connecting line from the Pointers leads to Polaris, the North Star. Polaris is called the North Star because it is the closest easily visible star to the point in the sky about which the star patterns rotate. This point changes very gradually with time. In fact, over thousands of years, other stars have been the North Star.

The stars appear fixed with respect to each other, but over long periods of time the star patterns change. The pattern of stars we call the Plough looked very different many years ago, and will look very different in the distant future.

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

THE BELLS, THE BELLS.

APRIL 2012

Our recent recruitment drive has resulted in Richie Tout returning to the band after an absence of 10 years and in addition his daughter Eleanor joining the band.



Eleanor plus a young ringer from Mathern are currently undergoing intensive training in bell handling, and Richie is having a refresher course in change ringing.

Some of you reading this may recall an episode of *Midsummer Murders* in which there were multiple deaths of bell ringers leading up to an event called a "Striking Competition". What, I hear you ask, is a Striking Competition. As in most human endeavours if there is a skill attained then there is a desire to test the skill level against others to judge relative expertise – a competition. Ringing is no different to classical team sports, music, dance, literature, horticulture, viniculture, cider making, ploughing and all other skilled human activities - so that a Striking Competition is the comparison of the skill level of bands of ringers from different churches. The basis of the competition is a set piece of ringing which is judged by independent examiners, who at the time have no knowledge of the identity of the band ringing. In practice bands assemble at a predetermined church on a specific day and draw lots as to the order in which the bands perform. The independent examiners, who are appointed from outside the locality, are positioned so they cannot observe the bands entering and leaving the ringing chamber, so have no knowledge as to the origin and identity of each band until the order is revealed after judging has occurred. Once the competition begins the bands in turn enter the ringing chamber, ring a short practice piece lasting 3 minutes and then with a predetermined signal to the examiners (usually 4 strikes of the lightest bell) begin the ringing to be judged, which usually lasts for about 5 minutes. Once completed the band leaves the ringing chamber and the process begins with the next band. Now why am I telling you all this?

The 2012 Striking Competition of the Monmouth Branch of the Llandaff & Monmouth Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers is being held at Shirenewton on May 19th 2012 commencing at 4.30 pm. There are 2 sections, the first of call changes competing for the Audrey Bruton Trophy, and the second of method ringing competing for the Gordon Wilkinson Trophy. So if you are around please drop in to see what is going on and hopefully you will hear some good quality ringing. It should be just like the episode of *Midsummer Murders* but hopefully without the violent deaths involved Mike Penney

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GARDENING CORNER

I never remember from one month to the next exactly what I wrote last time. so I have to have a guick recap each time to make sure that I don't repeat myself. I'm pretty sure that I repeat myself from year to year, but hopefully your memories are equal to mine and whatever I write always appears to be a revelation to you! I note that I was talking about the unusually warm weather and here we are now suffering unusually cold weather. The poor plants can't keep up with these extremes, although I have to admit with the recent bit of rain we have had most things are looking spectacularly green and healthy. There have been a few hiccups on the way. The early potatoes had shot out sooner than I expected, so the hard frost the other night gave them a wee bit of a trim, as the fresh growth turned a not very healthy black colour. The tops have recovered to some degree so hopefully they won't suffer any check. The salad potatoes have yet to appear so no problems in their direction. The bumble bees had done a good job in the tunnel and it looked as though we were due a good apricot and nectarine crop later in the year. Sadly the apricots, which had reached the size of a pea must also have been caught by the same frost as the bulk of the crop now lies wrinkled on the ground. Yet another year of disappointment when it comes to the apricots, but hopefully the nectarines will have fared better as there is no sign of the young fruits dropping off at the moment, so fingers crossed that they survive.

With the weather being a bit of a mixed bag, I change work plans depending on what is happening. If it's raining I work inside the greenhouses or tunnel and if its dry I work outside. I have now finished preparing the bulk of the vegetable beds and this morning dug the bean trenches before filling them with manure, ready for the runner beans. I have got some nice plants growing in the greenhouse, but it is far too cold for them to go outside yet. Hopefully it will warm up enough soon, but in the meantime I can get the sticks put up and tied together so that we are ready for the change. I may have to pot the plants into slightly bigger pots if it stays cold, but at least that way they don't suffer any check. Once planted I always protect them with horticultural fleece, as I have found in recent years that they get sun burnt far too easily, and the fleece will protect the young plants from not just the sun, but also from any cold nights. Just one layer of fleece will protect down to -1 or -2 degrees, so enough protection generally for this time of year. Both the greenhouses are now brimming with plants and I could do with getting some outside. Fortunately some of them are hardy annuals and perennial flowers, so they can take a bit of cold without any problems, so as space is at a premium, some of these will have to go outside to harden off. The tomato and pepper plants really started to get drawn up with the warm weather, but with the change to colder conditions they have now slowed down. They are looking healthy and really need to be potted on to the next size pots in order to keep them growing on. When they are, they will also need some sticks so that they can be tied up, before they start to fall down. They will need to be in pots for at least the next month before they are planted into the borders in the tunnel. In the meantime I have place their 'growing rings on the ground, so that I can see roughly where they will be planted. In between I am planting some calabrese, which, because it grows so quickly, will provide a crop before the tomatoes begin to grow too large. I will pick the heads whilst still relatively young and then freeze ready for making broccoli gratin or

something similar. This is purely a catch crop, making the most of the ground, so I don't worry too much about growing large heads that only require one for a meal. I have also planted several succession crops of salad leaves in the tunnel as well. Some we have been picking for two or three weeks, so when these are finished I will use the ground for planting the sweet peppers. Sometimes when the weather goes cold it upsets all these plans, but that's the risk you take. I have some large bags that are filled with compost (these are some three or four times bigger than purpose made shop bought grow bags and as a result are so much better. There are 9 down one side of the tunnel, where there is not enough room for a vegetable bed. These have been growing lettuces, leaves and spring onions so far, but once these finish, they will be removed, the compost topped up, and then replaced with melons, cucumbers and courgettes. These are also growing in pots at the moment. One or two have died as a result of 'damping off' but the rest will hopefully survive. I have just sown the other half of the packet to ensure we spread harvesting as long as possible and also means that we don't put all our eggs in one basket at the same time.

Outside in the vegetable beds the garlic has come through the winter and is looking well. We are still picking purple sprouting and had our first crop of asparagus for Sunday dinner – and lovely it was too. In between showers I planted the main crop potatoes from seed saved from last year. We are still eating our own potatoes and at this rate it looks as though we may well go completely through the year without having bought any. We have a few earlies in one greenhouse which may just fill the gap if necessary. The peas and beans are being nibbled by bean beetle, but as these only munch around the outside edge I don't get too excited and certainly don't bother to spray against them. One lot of peas suffered in the same frost as the apricots, which was surprising as these are normally quite hardy. They have recovered a bit since, so hopefully they will still crop all be it not as good as expected. I only ever grow sugar snap or mangetout peas for stir fries – Bird's Eye grow 'normal peas' on my behalf!

I'm concerned about the bees as on the coldest days they are not flying. Numbers will be building up no as the gueen senses that it is time to get the colony expanding, so with more mouths to feed and no decent flying conditions, they run the risk of starving. I would like to open up the hives and give them some supplementary, but the cold north wind is still keen, so I am reluctant to lift the lids off as yet. When they are flying they are bringing in plenty of pollen, which is a sure sign that there are young larvae in the brood chamber. Normally the bees rely on wild flowers and trees around here, but I noted that there is some oilseed rape just outside Shirenewton, which is just within the three mile flying distance, so this may be a big help in ensuring the bees survive this cold spell. I'll need to keep an eye on them when it warms up though as rape honey is very quick in setting and needs removing as soon as possible. Well the sun has come out again and Sunday lunch has sunk a bit so time to get on. Also the assistant head gardener has sat down reading a book so time to make her feel guilty! Happy gardening until next month. Steve and Felicity Hunt.

- 15 July: another chance to visit Leechpool Holdings to see arable flowers growing among the sacrificial crops


