HARVEST SERVICE AND LUNCH AT SHIRENEWTON

More than 50 people were in St Thomas a Becket Church when the Reverend Nansi Davies began the Harvest Service with prayers; and before she had finished the first prayer the congregation had increased to in excess of 60. Rousing Harvest hymns were followed by a game of 'I Spy' led by one of the younger members of the congregation, Hannekah Owen; and an abbreviated and updated version of the story of Joseph and his interpretation of Pharaoh's dreams foretelling seven years of plenty followed by seven years of famine, told in inimitable style by Jane and Glynis. But the brilliant finale was an innovative show and tell led by Jane, with her young and attractive assistant Glynis, ably supported by old agricultural implements provided by Ernie and Winnie Jones. The congregation had to guess what the implements were used for: there were clippers for sheep's toenails; a bit off an old horse-drawn agricultural mower; a horse brass from the bridle of Ernie's old horse Bright; a cream ladle; sheep shears; a bread crumber; a weed fork; and a poncho for a new-born lamb – which brought many oohs and aahs from the congregation.

The Harvest service was followed by a substantial and delicious Harvest Lunch for 108 diners in Earlswood Hall – more than have attended in recent memory. Meg Driver and Barbara Walters, ably supported by Nerys Wilson and a bevy of volunteers produced meat, salads, rice, vegetarian roulade and coleslaw followed by all sorts of spectacular desserts and cheese and biscuits, Whilst the teas and coffees were served, Dave Cornwell conducted the raffle, which Ernie and Winnie had organised, and at least 20 happy winners collected a prize, and £206.00 was raised. Then began the part that everyone had been waiting for – the auction of the harvest produce. Pumpkins, squashes, fruit, vegetables, bread, cake, marmalade and jam all went under Dave Cornwell's hammer and raised £315.50 so along with the Church service loose collection a total of £642.50 was sent to St David's Foundation Hospice Care. The ticket sales and the bar made a profit of £530.58 which was donated to the church. Well done to all who planned and took part in the Service and Lunch.

Telephone Kiosk- excellent. Tredegar Arms car park clean and tidy & 2 bits of litter. War Memorial excellent. Churchyard - paths to all 5 accesses all clear, no weeds or litter, very nice porch area'

Congratulations to everyone who played their part this year. Many people commented on how lovely Shirenewton looked during the Summer. Despite the awful storms, I think the roads were actually kept even clearer of debris than in past years.

Monday 1st October 2012 - Glynis MacDonald

I was a little late in arriving to the meeting this month which was strange because I so look forward to it. Anyway I was relegated to sitting at the back of the councillors again – the equivalent of the naughty corner. And because of my lowly position and the acoustics and the sotto voce of the murmuring members I didn't catch all of the pertinent detail, so for a full, frank and factual account, go to the official minutes on the Church Web site or the village notice boards.

The Police Report

Sun 16th Sept. There were 2 reports of a man wandering around Earlswood and Shirenewton in a state of inebriation. It turned out he was a 'tagged' gentleman from Newport who had been dumped up there by his friends. As a prank. (Fancydumping someone up in the nether regions of Earlswood - worse punishment that being tagged.)

Thurs 27th Sept The Postman for Bulley Hole Bottom reported that he ran over a dog whilst on his rounds. The dog was taken to the vets. The owners were aware. And the dog.

Fri 28th Sept The Suspicious White Van is back. The registration is AD52 KAA. It was being driven by a man with an Irish accent and he was looking for scrap metal. He had a female and a small child with him.

Planning.

- 1 DC/2012/00125 Seaview Nursery, Earlswood. To demolish/remove existing welfare cabin and increase overall height of approved agricultural building by approx 1m to provide office, rest room, wc and a dry store. The applicant was there and approval was recommended
- 2 DC/2012/00572 Yew Tree Cottage, Usk Road, Shirenewton, Conservatory. There was a lot of discussion over this application and there were grumbles about a new double garage having been built, plus the entrance had been considerably widened and that when it rains the gravel on the new driveway washes down. It was felt that this building work might well have to be the subject of a retrospective planning application. And as quite often happens these days, it was felt that there was not enough detail in the application. And a field trip was in order.
- 3 Two Wind Farms down near the MOD in Caerwent. The Inspector would like to have some written submissions on this one. The MOD were unaware of this application and when they were asked for their views, they said that these wind turbines would be right in the flight path of the Chinooks flying directly from Caerwent to Afghanistan! It was suggested that the MOD should look closely at this application. There was also discussion about environmental concerns. And bats.

The Half Yearly Budget/ Forecast to 31 March 2013.

The councilors were treated to a half yearly report on the budget. There was a bit of grumbling by some of the new councilors as to why various voluntary groups should get small donations of money from the council and questions were asked as to 'how many tax payers want their money going to these groups' (eg the 'local Brownies, Girl Guides, our local halls, churches and chapels etc) and how many atheists there were....

However, it was pointed out that this was the precept that had been agreed at the beginning of the year – and was already fixed. It was merely a report/forecast of the current spending.

The Queen Elizabeth II Initiative. The powers that are in charge of this Initiative are Demanding the Deeds. But once again the knotty problem... Where are the deeds? Then we all sat back and listened to the story of the original contours of the Rec field.

The Village Shop Options

One of the cllrs had had a discussion with the new owner of the Tan House who was not averse to the idea of a shop/PO/pub etc. But the owner has 4 other such projects on the go and so he has had to put the Tan House on the back burner while he concentrates on getting 'The Chain Bridge' outside Usk up and going to cater for the spring time arrival of the caravaners.

Blethyn Close

There is a little bit of newly establish grass on the rucked up land which was made messy by building vehicles. But the fences are still up and the area is still a mess. The 'License' is being extended but no one seemed to know who/how/why about this 'License' and so Debra Hill Howell of MCC will be written to.

Poormans Land and what to do with it. There is still a loss of details as to deeds etc and these might turn up eventually in the MCC archives. Meanwhile we had another interesting story about this land way back in 1967 when...

Registration of a Footpath up to the Iron Fort at Llanmellin. The clogged paths have been logged. Or is that vice versa?

Repair of the Play Area in Shirenewton. The contract has been awarded to Jamie Roberts. Hope the old nag gets a lick of paint.

Remembrance Day. Two wreathes have been ordered one for Earlswood Hall and one for the Shirenewton War Memorial.

The Curry Meeting down at the MOD down at Caerwent will be in November and councilors will be invited. Apparently these meals are excellent.

The Future of the 'Community Field' up at Earlswood. This moved into a series of questions along the lines of 'What shall we do with it?' Sell it? Rent it? Use it? Should it be sold it for a handsome amount of money? Or rented out for a hay crop? Or used it as a Community resource? Should it be grazed? Would the GWT like to manage it? Is there much wildlife up there? Could it be planted with trees? Would the Woodland Trust like to be involved? Could it be for flowers? Would Monmouthshire Meadows be interested? Could it be used for allotments? Or sold to fund a shop in Shirenewton? It was agreed that the council was still in the 'info' gathering stage. And that it will be put on next month's agenda.

The Skateboard Project. It was reported back that the Recreation Association felt that there was no room on the Rec for a skateboard park. Maybe there is a place in Mynnyddbach? There were also concerns raised about the insurance, the increase in cars and floodlighting at night. I have also written in my notes that the area could be 'festooned with shoes' (What?) It was pointed out that there are sites in Caldecott, Bulwark and Wollaston and so children could go there.

STARGAZING

The seven stars of the Plough lie to the North in the evening. It is also known as the Great Bear or Ursa Major. Ursa Major was one of the constellations listed by the 2nd century AD Egyptian astronomer Ptolemy. The constellation of Ursa Major has been seen as a bear by many civilizations. In Greek mythology, Zeus, the king of the gods, falls in love with a young woman named Callisto. Hera, Zeus' jealous wife, transforms the beautiful Callisto into a bear and places her in the heavens.

The cross of Cygnus is high in the western sky. The "W" of Cassiopeia lies nearly overhead in the Milky Way.

The Milky Way is a faint band of light visible on clear dark nights. It is the combined light of an enormous number of stars that make up our galaxy. There are approximately 200 billion galaxies in the Universe. Each galaxy contains very approximately 200 billion stars. So that's very approximately a mind-boggling 40,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 stars in the Universe.

The bright planet Jupiter is in the evening sky to the East. The Full Moon and Jupiter are close together on the 1st and the 28th of November.

Jupiter can also be seen in the early morning sky in the West. The even brighter planet Venus is to the West in the morning. Towards the end of the month Saturn rises in the South-East to join Venus. You may also be able to see the fainter planet Mercury just below Venus at the end of the month. On the 11th the Crescent Moon is to the right of Venus.

Venus is sometimes called Earth's "sister planet" owing to their similar size and bulk composition. However, it is very different to Earth in other respects. Venus is shrouded by a thick layer of cloud. The atmospheric pressure at the planet's surface is nearly 100 times that of Earth's, and it has a surface temperature of nearly 500°C. All in all it's a pretty unfriendly place!

FAIRTRADE NEWS

A recent edition of The Extra Mile magazine published by Traidcraft had an interesting article describing how new fairtrade products are developed. Traidcraft had been working with CIPAC a beekeeping cooperative in Guatemala. On a visit to see how the



success of this project was developing the sourcing team discovered that many of the beekeepers also grew coffee beans. Almost half the population of Guatemala live below the poverty line and so Traidcraft began work to develop a new high quality coffee product.

The arabica beans grow at high altitude. The coffee 'cherries' are collected, by hand, and transported in huge sacks down steep and dangerous slopes. The skin is scraped from these cherries and the remaining pith is removed. The beans are dried in the sun. It is staggering to note that it takes 20 metric tonnes of cherries to produce just one metric tonne of freeze dried instant coffee. The remote location and poor roads make moving the crop extremely hard. Producers were at the mercy of local traders who, at best, offered little support to the producers.

Traidcraft has helped producers increase their yields, decrease the impact on the environment and develop a better infrastructure. A major advantage has been the fact that a new coffee processing plant can process the beans close to source. This is very significant. Many developing countries lose out when it comes to processing - richer countries have traditionally reaped the benefits of adding value. This new plant keeps a large proportion of the money invested in the local communities.

This decaffeinated coffee has scored highly in blind tastings, even against traditional caffeinated brands! Why not give it a try!

Christmas is coming! Do consider buying fairly traded gifts and products!

October; when the sun shines the autumn colours glow, the wind blows and falling leafs spread a multi-coloured carpet disguising the ground beneath. Our speaker at our meeting on the 11th October enthralled us with the flora and fauna to be found on the island of Gotland during two summers, far better than the one we've just had. Mr Graham Wren went on two occasions with a small group to record the Gotland wild life. Spending summer on a very flat Baltic island looked very appealing but their journey took 48 hours by ferries and road, no hotel at the end camping was the order of the day, with many long hours spent in hides waiting for the right picture.



Graham showed us some of the beautiful photographs of birds and their nests which had been captured by all that effort and a few of the just missed shots. Gotland is a place for orchids and we were amazed at the variety but even more so at the sheer numbers. Most of the birds recorded were waders and since their nests are on the ground great care was needed when moving around. Somehow the birds seem to cope with the grazing Danish Red cattle and Gotland sheep. The island is made mainly of limestone, much of the ground is rocky with marshes around lakes and stony beaches lapped by the Baltic, which is not really tidal but can be very stormy. Gotland appeared to be very a peaceful summer destination, but apparently there is one noisy period when thousands of motor bikes descend and roar around the roads at the yearly gala.

We all enjoyed seeing Graham's pictures and it made us realise how much effort goes into the wildlife programs and books we sometimes dismiss as just nice pretty pictures.

Our next meeting is on the 8th November with a talk by Fiona Ashley on 'Libraries for Life'.



Carrot and ginger soup.

Ingredients.

2 tsp olive oil

1 small onion, peeled and chopped

1 small garlic clove, peeled and crushed

1/2 level tsp ground ginger powder

8 oz (225g) carrots, peeled and chopped

1 pint (600ml) vegetable stock

½ inch (1cm) piece root ginger, peeled and finely grated Seasoning

1 tsp lemon juice

Chives and strands of lemon to garnish

Method.

- **1** Heat the oil in a large saucepan. Gently cook the onion and garlic for 3-4 minutes.
- **2** Stir in the ground ginger and cook for 1 minutes to release the flavour.
- 3 Add the carrots, fresh ginger and stock. Simmer gently for 15 minutes.
- 4 Remove from the heat, cool slightly. Blend until smooth. Season.
- **5** Stir in lemon juice. Garnish with chives and strands of lemon.
- Serve with croutons, melba toast or crusty bread.

Spatchcocked Poussins With Garlic Sage Butter

Ingredients.

For the herb butter

3 garlic cloves

2 oz (50g) butter, softened

1 tbsp freshly snipped chives

1 tsp freshly chopped sage

1 small lemon, grated and juiced

Seasoning

For the Poussins.

2 spatchcock poussins 2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil Garnish Chives and sage leaves.

Method

1Simmer the garlic cloves in a little water for 5 minutes. Drain. Cool slightly, pound until smooth. Beat in the butter, chopped chives, sage, Lemon zest and juice. Season.

- 2 Using your fingertips, gently loosen the skin from each poussin breast by sliding your hand between the skin and the flesh. Push one half of the herb butter under the skin, spreading evenly over the breast and the top of the thighs. Pull the neck skin gently to tighten the skin over the breast and tuck under the bird. Repeat with the remaining poussin.
- 3 Thread two wooden skewers crossways through each poussin, from one wing through the opposite leg, to keep the poussin flat.
- 4 Brush with the olive oil and season.
- 5 Arrange the poussins on a foiled rack and grill for 25 minutes, turning occasionally, until golden and crisp and the juices runs clear when the thigh is pierced with a sharp knife or skewer. (Position the rack about 12.5 cm/5 inches from the heat source or the skin will brown before the birds are cooked through).
- 6 Garnish with chives and sage leaves.

Serve with seasonal vegetables, rice or salad.

Oranges with Rosewater and toasted almonds.

Ingredients
2 oranges, peeled
½ tsp rosewater
Pinch of cinnamon
1 tsp toasted almonds.
Dusting of icing sugar

Method

- 1 On a low heat. Dry roast flaked almonds in a frying pan for 5 minutes. Cool.
- 2 Cut the oranges into thin slices.
- 3 Divide between two small plates.
- 4 Sprinkle with the rosewater and cinnamon.
- 5 Chill.
- 6 Before serving sprinkle with a little icing sugar and toasted almonds.

GARDENING CORNER

The last month has not been the greatest. Sadly I lost my father and gardening / beekeeping mentor at the beginning of the month, so no longer have anyone to share and solve problems with. When drafting a eulogy for his funeral service, I was reminded of many gardening tales derived from our shared experiences which no doubt I will relay at some time or other.

We had a few days leave this month as well, some spent visiting National Trust properties in the Cotswolds and Warwickshire, whilst others were spent taking stock and catching up on a few things in the garden. With the ground outside still soaking wet it was off to the tunnel initially. I had left the crop of French beans to dry off and these were pulled and the pods picked off for 'haricot beans'. At the same time all the weeds were cleared out and most, apart from the tenacious ones, were added to the ever expanding compost heap. This left the ground clear for the next crop, which comprised of spring cabbage and broccoli plants, already arown for the purpose. I didn't bother digging the bed over as such and when removing the beans I had tried to break off the roots and leave them in the ground intact. The reasons for these actions were to ensure the soil remained firm, and the bean roots, as they capture nitrogen, would then break down and feed the young brassica plants, which demand high levels of nitrogen (for leaf production). If the soil is too loose it tends to make the brassica's 'blow' rather than form tight heads. I did sprinkle copious amounts of blood, fish and bone as usual, and hopefully this will give the plants the other minerals they require. I did have some young cauliflower plants as well, but experience to date is that these do not grow very well indoors. The dampness seems to make the heads rot very easily. So instead I had to wait for the beds outside to dry off a little, before planting them, but ground preparation was much the same, although in this case they replaced an earlier crop of sweet corn. The corn had not done too well (not surprisingly with the bad weather), so I'd left the actual cobs to mature, rather than pick them earlier. These will then feed the garden birds during the winter months. Whilst in the tunnel I picked all the 'red hot' chilli peppers ready for drying off and using in the kitchen. The peppers themselves will be threaded onto strong fishing line and then hung in the rear conservatory to air dry. The intention is to pull the pepper plants (as well as another bed of sweet peppers when they finish fruiting) and clear the beds before manuring and then planting with strawberries. I got fed up this year with either the bad weather rotting the berries or squirrels eating them before we could make use of them. So the intention is to plant the beds under the apricot and nectarine trees, so the fruits will grow and ripen before the fruit trees grow too much. With this in mind I have taken a lot of strawberry runners from a particularly good variety (one called Marshmallow) and potted them up. These are now growing in the larger greenhouse and should be ready for planting out as soon as the peppers are removed. Hopefully this will ensure that we get a good crop of strawberries in early to mid May and might even get some in the freezer, which we haven't done for many years.

With the outside beds drying off as well I also managed to get several weeded and one planted up with next year's garlic crop. I saved some of the best cloves

from this year's crop, breaking these down into their individual bulblets for planting some 8 centimetres deep (about 3 inches). There is still time to give garlic a go if you are minded to, but make sure you buy bulbs for planting, rather than use one you have left in the kitchen! The results will be ten times better.

The seed catalogues started to arrive several weeks ago. I'm trying a new supplier this year as the prices were very competitive. Last year I spent more than £200 on various seeds, seed potatoes and onion sets, whilst this year the cost was around £150 for much the same. This seems a lot of money, but in the overall scene of things we are probably self sufficient in vegetables for probably ten months of the year, and you definitely can't compare the taste of fresh pulled vegetables with those purchased from the shops. Plus of course they are unlikely to have any chemical residues. I was minded of this earlier this week as I happened to be driving through the Fen country with work. Driving through acre upon acre of cauliflowers, cabbages, broccoli and Brussel sprouts I mused as to how much chemical was used in order to keep them caterpillar / insect free for blemish free harvesting.

I've noted for several years that you can purchase plants of various vegetables that have been grafted onto hardy rootstocks which resist rotting. As I lose no end of cucumber and melon plants through these diseases I've decided to give these grafted plants a go for next year. I'll let you know whether they are any better and worth the money.

A nice warm day saw me spending most of it going through the bees and getting them ready for winter. This involved checking what stores they had ready for the cold months, putting mouse guards across the front of each hive, providing some form of treatment to help the bees fight off varoa mite, and removing any supers that they would not be able to see to during the winter. Bees cluster together around the queen during cold weather and it is important to have food supplies readily available to them without having to move too far. I have seen colonies in the past literally starve to death because they have been unwilling or unable to move six inches to reach food supplies. The first few hives were all fine and jobs done, the hives were closed down. The guards prevent mice getting into the hive itself, as they like nothing better than having some friendly bees to keep them warm, and also enjoy munching their way through the frames and eating up the valuable honey supplies. The wire mesh was left around the outside of the hives to keep the pest of a green woodpecker at bay. The next two hives were swarms collected this year, but weren't doing too well with very limited food supplies. I had some spare frames full of honey, so I removed some empty frames and replaced them with the full ones. Hopefully this will keep them going. For some reason one of my best hives had decided just to clear off, so I cleared this up and put the parts away in store. Must be that I hadn't spoken to them enough last time and felt unloved! A big blow but I don't know what you can do to prevent this happening. All the other hives were fine, so that was a job well done. Still must dash. I need to get the peppers threaded up ready for drying. Happy gardening until next month. Steve and Felicity Hunt.


