SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL NOTES

Notes from the Community Council Meeting Monday 4th March 2013 - Glynis MacDonald

There were almost more members of the public than there were councillors at this month's meeting. They were there to discuss planning matters.

There was no police report. And as PC Thorpe was unable to be at the meeting the discussion as to the 'Cold Calling Control Zones' which has been carried forward from December couldn't take place. As it happens, the cold weather continues

Planning.

1. DC/2012/01033 Four Acre Fields, Great House Farm

Agricultural shed.

Quite a few people had attended this month's meeting because of this planning application. They objected to the size of the proposed barn which they felt was far too large for the small plot of land and so therefore totally inappropriate. They also objected to the siting of the shed which would sit on the skyline and have a detrimental effect on the outlook and that the lovely drive would be spoilt by this big building.

The applicant on the other hand said that he needed a shed that big to put his implements inside to stop them from rusting and also he wishes to house his water tank inside which would stop it from freezing in the winter. He stated that others in the area are developing their properties and that he wished to do the same.

At the end of a very long discussion the council recommended that the application be refused.

At this point most of the members of the public left.

2. DC/2013/00089 8 Clearview, Shirenewton

Demolish garage and conservatory. Build new garage, two storey rear extension and porch.

There was nothing really contentious about this application other than the plans suggested that the garage was going to be built over a sewer which is a No-no. The applicant said that she was aware of this problem with the plans and that it was being addressed.

Approval was Recommend except the sewer problem was to be mentioned. The last remaining member of public left the building.

3. DC/2013/00064 'The Granary', Shirenewton

Single storey side extension.

There were no problems with this planning application and therefore Approval was Recommended. Although someone said that a 'pitched roof would look nicer'

4. DC/2013/00127 GaerIllwyd Farm

Change of use of redundant agricultural building into a dwelling. This planning application had been made before and although SCC had recommended approval last time, MCC turned it down. The application has been re- issued but it seemed as though the present plans differed little from the previous plans.

Anyway, approval was recommended.

A retrospective planning application had been made but it hadn't made it through the system for this month. So there's something to look forward to in April.

Grant Applications

Local groups had been advised that there was a small sum of money up for bids. The sum in question was £300 and as ever the demand was high. Too high. So there followed a discussion as to whether some groups should be granted their wishes whilst other not. Or should everyone get a proportion of what they'd applied for. Or should those who'd asked for only a little amount of money get what they'd asked for, whilst those who'd asked for larger amounts be docked a couple of bob. It was sorted out in the end but my short hand skills were not quick enough to note down who got what.

Items of interest

There was to have been a meeting to discuss the local commemoration of <u>World</u> <u>War 1</u> but because of snow, this meeting did not take place.

There was a discussion about the Welsh Assembly Government's kind offer to local authorities to help them financially in setting up and increasing their profiles via websites. But it was suggested that MCC wasn't quite there yet in terms of helping or even redistributing this money which might amount to a possible £500. It was agreed that setting up a website was one thing and this in itself would involved a pile of problems e.g what would it look like, would there be a universal model to follow, who would be the lucky person to set this up. But the other problem would be the continual updating of the local website - and who would do this? The Council agreed they were very lucky to have the monthly minutes put up on the Church Web site...

It was decided to put the progress of this issue on the monthly agenda.

A Response to 'The Single Integrated Plan Consultation' with MCC .

There didn't seem to be much of a response as apparently it is a document which is very good for insomnia. And no one had managed to get to the end of it. It was suggested that a response could be made - but only after it had been read.

Once purchased and safe for the village various plans could be made to put it to use. A local library, an information corner, guided walks – although it wouldn't take very long to walk round it...

But the box does need to be brought up to scratch – or rather that the scratches got rid of. It was noted that Devauden had painted their telephone box in a quite unattractive shade of pink but it was suggested that perhaps this was the undercover undercoat ready for the iconic red paint.

It was now very cold indeed in the Rec and the shillings had run out ages ago. It was suggested that a mobile gas heater should be purchased for the council meetings. I liked that idea.

In the interests of parity it was suggested that the council could hold some of their meetings up at Earlswood Hall but it was decided 'No'

There was some terribly interesting correspondence but my lap top had died, or gone to sleep or had frozen so you'll just have to manage without.

WE WUS BRUNG UP PROPER !!

Congratulations to those born in the 1940's, 50's, 60's

First, we survived being born to mothers who smoked and/or drank Sherry while they carried us and lived in houses made of asbestos...

They took aspirin, ate blue cheese, bread and dripping, raw egg products, loads of bacon and processed meat, tuna from a can, and didn't get tested for diabetes or cervical cancer. Then after that trauma, our baby cots were covered with bright coloured lead-based paints.

We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors or cabinets and when we rode our bikes, we had no helmets or shoes, not to mention, the risks we took hitchhiking. As children, we would ride in cars with no seat belts or air bags.

We drank water from the garden hose and NOT from a bottle. Take away food was limited to fish and chips, no pizza shops, McDonalds , KFC, Subway or Nandos. Even though all the shops closed at 6.00pm and didn't open on a Sunday, somehow we didn't starve to death! We shared one soft drink with four friends, from one bottle and NO ONE actually died from this.

We could collect old drink bottles and cash them in at the corner store and buy Toffees, Gobstoppers and Bubble Gum.

We ate cupcakes, white bread and real butter, milk from the cow, and drank soft drinks with sugar in it, but we weren't overweight because.. We were always out playing.

We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to reach us all day. And we were O.K. We would spend hours building our go-carts out of old prams and then ride down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. We built tree houses and dens and played in river beds with matchbox cars.

We did not have Playstations, Nintendo Wii , X-boxes, no video games at all, no 999 channels on SKY, no video/dvd films, or colour TV, no mobile phones, no personal computers, no Internet or Internet chat rooms......WE HAD FRIENDS and we went outside and found them!

We fell out of trees, got cut, broke bones and teeth and there were no Lawsuits from these accidents.

Only girls had pierced ears! You could only buy Easter Eggs and Hot Cross Buns at Easter time.... We were given air guns and catapults for our 10th birthdays.

We rode bikes or walked to a friend's house and knocked on the door or rang the bell, or just yelled for them! Mum didn't have to go to work to help dad make ends meet because we didn't need to keep up with the Jones's!

Not everyone made the rugby/football/cricket/netball team. Those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment. Imagine that!! Getting into the team was based on MERIT.

Our teachers used to hit us with canes and gym shoes and throw the blackboard rubber at us if they thought we weren't concentrating ..

We can string sentences together and spell and have proper conversations because of a good, solid three R's education. Our parents would tell us to ask a stranger to help us cross the road. The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of. They actually sided with the law!

SHIRENEWTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

We had standing room only at our January meeting that took place at the Huntsman Hotel, Shirenewton. The speaker for the evening was Dr Caroline Pudney who had directed the archaeological dig at Llanmelin in November 2012. She had promised to return and inform us of the outcome of their investigation. Everybody involved in the dig was very enthusiastic about the site, CADW had instigated the investigation with the help of professional archaeologist, members of our society and soldiers recovering from their injuries while on active service.

The iron age site surrendered many finds, a huge amount of pottery, animal bones, a quorn stone and quite a special Roman nail scraper. As Llanmelin is such a big site this initial dig has only just scratched the surface (literally) of this very interesting hill fort. They intend to return, finances permitting to further unravel the mysteries of Llanmelin Hill Fort

An enjoyable evening was spent at our annual dinner, the after dinner speaker was Gordon McDonald who gave us an account of the project to move the millennium bluestone from the Preseli's to Stonehenge. How ironage man managed it, I don't know! Many thanks to the Huntsman Hotel for an excellent meal, enjoyed by everyone.

FAIRTRADE NEWS

As I understand it, (if I do at all!) tax avoidance by large companies is simply best practice, enabling shareholders to gain maximum profit, which is of course the whole point of the system.



Over time incremental advances have been made to improve the system, all initially generally rejected by those enjoying the profits. Sending tiny children up chimneys was obviously tremendously cost effective.

The fact that many people are currently in moral High Dudgeon (a favourite destination of mine!) is perhaps understandable, but until there is a legal requirement for a more moral approach I do not see that we can, or indeed should expect anything different.

Starbucks, Amazon and Apple have already hit the headlines but it is perhaps worth looking at another company's tax avoidance strategies.

In the recent Actionaid magazine there are details about Associated British Foods (Silver Spoon sugar, Twinings and Kingsmill) and its subsidiary Zambia Sugar Plc. Despite recent record annual revenues and profits, between 2008 and 2010 Zambia Sugar paid NO corporation tax. Overall from 2007-12 it paid corporation tax at a rate of just 0.5% of its profits. One of the company's cane cutters (making a better income than some, earning US\$440 a month) pays income tax at 25% on all earnings above Zambia's personal tax threshold. The lady working 7 long days a week on her market stall makes about US\$4 profit on a good day and pays about 20 US cents in business tax EVERY DAY

Multinational companies have for far too long regarded tax as a drain on their performance and profitability- their 'bottom line'- and an inconvenient cost of doing business they will go to convoluted lengths to avoid. But for those living in countries where multinational companies make and sell their products and from where they derive their profits, there is another 'bottom line' - the ability of families to feed themselves, send their children to school and to keep them healthy.

GARDENING CORNER

The weather continues to dominate work in the garden as always. As gardeners we face many challenges, most are surmountable by either persevering or just accepting the failure or whatever the problem might have been and basically starting all over again! Like farmers and their crops, this usually isn't a problem as most things we grow, apart from things like fruit and asparagus, tend to be annual crops and if you lose one year, hopefully you will recover and gain the next. Last year was disastrous for beekeepers after what was a promising start. The weather went downhill from April onwards and the bees struggled as a result. Forecasts were for heavy losses of colonies over the winter. I haven't heard from any other beekeepers at present, but our bees here at Barn Farm have been devastated. I started the winter with 10 hives and currently am down to just two. I am feeding these in the hope that they will keep going until we eventually get some decent weather, but it is not looking hopeful. This time last year we were enjoying 70 degree temperatures and the bees were out working like mad. The ten hives represented years of work, not just one, and will take years of work to try and recover. All I can hope for is that there are a few swarms about this coming year that no-one else wants. However I suspect that I won't be the only one to have suffered such losses, and as a result I'm sure swarms will be like gold dust. If any of you see one this coming year – give me a call! What I can't understand is that three of the hives I lost were my biggest and best, and I had nurtured them for over ten years. They weren't short of food either as both the brood chamber and next level of super had ample supplies. It was if the bees were unable or unwilling to move along the frames to find it. It is very distressing to see these little workers dead in their thousands, but like the weather we can do very little about it. What it does mean is that the precious supplies of honey we saved last year will now be even more precious.

It is also noticeable outside that there are few bumble bees about at present. I haven't seen one as yet which is a potential disaster as I rely on the early bumbles to pollinate our apricots and nectarine trees in the tunnel. These are in full flower at the moment, so unless a few bumbles appear in the next day or two we will have to try and do our best with soft paint brushes in order to secure a crop of some sort.

But life has to go on and things are really starting to pick up in the greenhouses now. The hot bench has been on for some weeks now and the initial sowing of tomatoes and peppers has resulted in most of them now being potted on into larger pots, and hopefully on their way. I sowed some early broad beans and peas which soon germinated. I moved these away from the hot bench to ensure that they didn't get too drawn up. I decided to plant these outside in a raised bed the other day.

The weather was nice and showing signs of improving, which is when it went down to -4 degrees overnight. Both beans and peas are OK in cold weather, but as they hadn't been fully hardened off I decided to cover them with horticultural fleece over night. This seems to have had the desired result and are not showing any signs of check – at the moment! Because the ground is still very wet and cold I decided to plant the onion sets and shallots into pots in the cold greenhouse. Hopefully this will give them enough protection to start them into growth and will be ready for planting out when it starts to warm up. The onions have really romped away, but as yet the shallots are not showing a lot of interest in doing what they should!

Back on the hot bench I have sown a number of flower seeds this year. In recent years the flower garden has had to take a back seat, as lack of time and poor weather has meant that I have prioritised the vegetable garden. Generally the flower beds are now in a bit of a state as a result of the neglect with numerous ash trees and brambles even taking hold. The intention is to try and get these cleared off and sorted out. I will need some 'cheap' flowers to fill the holes in, hence sowing the seeds. There is one area that I never really got planted up and established as a true part of the garden. This grown really wild so I have decided to leave it for the time being, so I can see what plants push their way through, and then dig these up and use them elsewhere. I'll probably just strim it then and return to just rough grass. The assistant head gardener keeps reminding me that we have plenty elsewhere so don't really need the ground cultivated. Plus we are getting older and struggle to do everything that is needed. Whereas we were probably slaves to the garden when we opened it for charity, we are now agreed that we should garden for pleasure – just for a change!

Over the next couple of weeks the level of seed sowing will increase rapidly, as the bulk of the salad crops will be going in. I will need to make room on the hot bench for this happen, so some of the other early crops will have to go out, either to harden off or for planting. These will include the early calabrese, which are currently in single pots and will be looking to get planted out into one of the raised beds in the tunnel. The first sweet peas are also well established now and desperate to be planted out.

In the tunnel I intend to increase the height of the raised beds so that I can add a greater depth of manure. At the moment the soil spills over the edge and into the paths, which doesn't help. As soon as this job is done and the manure added, I will be able to plant the calabrese I mentioned and also get the strawberries planted. The strawberries are in large pots in the tunnel at the moment and are starting to grow on now that it is warming up slightly under the cover. The sooner they are planted then the more likely they are to produce some strawberry fruits, hopefully well away from the thieving squirrels. But for now, happy gardening until next month.

STARGAZING

The constellation of Leo the Lion lies to the South.

Unlike most constellations, Leo really can be pictured as its namesake. His mane is made up of a backwards-shaped question mark with the bright star Regulus forming his front paw. Off to the left are three stars which make up the lion's hindquarters.



The seven stars of the Plough lie pretty much overhead. It is one of the "circumpolar" constellations that are always above our horizon. Its classical name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear.

The bright planet Jupiter is in the evening sky to the west and to the upper right of the constellation of Orion. On the 14th, the crescent Moon is close to Jupiter, forming an interesting group with the red star Aldebaran and the Pleiades star cluster, particularly when viewed through binoculars. Saturn is in the south-east in the south-east with the Full Moon sitting just below the planet on the 25th.

On clear nights, when the Moon is new and seen as a fine crescent, the rest of the Moon can often be seen as a very dark grey against the black sky. Whilst the bright crescent is directly illuminated by the Sun, the rest of the Moon is in its own shadow. The shadow is dark grey rather than black because of "Earthshine", where light reflected from Earth illuminates the Moon very faintly.



Nerys's Natty Nosh

The Welsh settlement in Argentina began in 1865 and occurred mainly along the coast of Chubut province in the far southern region of Patagonia, Argentina. They were hard pressed for food and supplies. The women pooled their meagre pantry ingredients (nuts, candied fruit, molasses, spices, alcohol), and came up with this recipe for a fruitcake reminiscent of home, one that would also keep well for months. As they settled in and prospered, this recipe remained a favourite, and is still served today in the Welsh teahouses in the region. My Uncle Robin and Aunty Eirlys visited Patagonia (Y Wladfa) and met many of the families of the welsh settlers who to this day are fluent in

Welsh and Spanish. **Torta Negras Galesa.**

Ingredients.

1cup walnuts, almonds or hazelnuts, or a mix of all three

1 cup raisins

1/2 cup chopped candied fruit peel (optional)

1/4 cup chopped maraschino cherries (optional)

1 cup rum

1 cup butter, softened

5 eggs, **separated**

2 tablespoon molasses sugar

3 tablespoon honey

1 tablespoon cinnamon

1 tablespoon mixed spice

2 1/2 cups self raising flour

Topping

1 ½ cups icing sugar

3 to 4 tablespoons fresh orange juice

Method

1 Roughly chop the nuts. Soak the nuts, raisins and candied fruit in the rum overnight. Drain the nuts and fruit and reserve the rum.

2 Preheat the oven to 350F, 180 C, Gas Mark 4.

3Cream the butter with the brown sugar.

4 Gradually beat in the five egg yolks, molasses and honey.

5 Sift the flour with the cinnamon, mixed spice and add to the cake batter, altering with the reserved rum. Stir in nuts, raisins and fruit.

6 In a separate, clean bowl, beat the egg **whites** until stiff peaks form. Fold egg whites gently into the batter. Pour the batter into a 9x5 inch bread tin, or into a 10 inch diameter by 2 inch cake tin

7 Bake for 45 minutes, then check the cake. A skewer inserted in the centre should come out clean. If the cake is not done, return to the oven and check every 10 minutes until the skewer comes out clean.

8 Make the icing, place 1½ cups of icing sugar in a bowl. Mix in the orange juice 1 tablespoon at a time, until the desired consistency is reached. The icing should be slightly runny, drizzle over the cake.

The Wales I know is the land of home cooking and the Welsh really cook from the heart, using simple local, readily available ingredients. One of the most enduring traditions in Wales is the weekly bake, items like Bara Brith, Teisen lap, Teisen Sinamon and Teisen Mel eaten as family teatime favourites.

My mother's parents lived on a sheep farm on the foot of Snowdon. As a child, during the long summer holidays I would stay on the farm with my nain and taid. My preferred childhood treat was my nain's freshly baked Pice . Soft and warm with a hint of spice. Always washed down with a cup of tea in the best china cup. What magnificent memories I will always treasure of the sweet and kind-hearted nature of my nain.

Welsh Takes (Pice Ar Y Maen)

Ingredients

8 ozs self-raising flour

2 ozs margarine or butter

2 ozs lard

3 ozs sugar

2 ozs currants

1/4 teaspoonful mixed spice

1 egg beaten + a little milk if the mixture is dry

Method

- 1 Rub fat into flour.
- 2 Add the dry ingredients.
- 3 Add the egg and mix gently with a fork.
- **4** Continue mixing and add a **little** milk if required until a ball is formed. The mixture should resemble that of short crust pastry.
- **5** Roll out, cut the dough into rounds and bake on a **low** heat on a griddle or frying pan.
- **6** They take about three to four minutes on each side.
- **7** Sprinkle with castor sugar.

Tips

Use a thick base frying pan or griddle. Warm the frying pan or griddle for a few minutes before cooking. Use a **little** lard or suet on a piece of kitchen paper to grease the frying pan or griddle. This will stop the cakes from sticking. Welsh:-Teisen -cake, mel - honey, nain-grandmother, taid-grandfather.


