

#### SHIRENEWTON PARISH VISITORS

We have a team of five Parish Visitors who are members of the Church of St Thomas á Beckets congregation. They are trained and supported to offer a listening ear and time to chat with those in particular need -- the housebound, the sick, the bereaved, or those facing some other kind of crisis. They are also there to welcome new people into the village and help them to integrate into the community more quickly. They are not professional counsellors, carers or social workers, but ordinary people who are willing to be alongside you when you most need it. Their service is free to those of all faiths and none, with no strings attached.

#### Confidentiality

Our Parish Visitors work within a strict code of confidentiality so that you may be confident that whatever is shared with them goes no further. The one exception to this is that Visitors may share the minimum information necessary to obtain support and advice themselves, if necessary, from our clergy or other appropriate person. This would only happen with the persons consent

#### **FACULTY FOR AN AUMBRY**

The PCC has applied for a faculty to install an aumbry in the Church. An aumbry is a secure place used to store consecrated bread and wine. It allows the parish priest to bless the bread and wine ahead of a service and then for a lay Eucharistic minister to administer the communion without a priest present. The priest can also use it to store consecrated bread and wine between services so it can be administered to the sick and the homebound in the Parish.

#### SHIRENEWTON TENNIS ASSOCIATION

In 1988 with the tennis court and surrounding fencing in a bad state of repair, a small group of villagers came together, concerned to try to keep the tennis court open. A small committee was formed and subsequently Shirenewton Tennis Association came into being in the same year.

For 25 years the original core committee of Judy Eede (Chairlady) Ursula Singleton (Secretary), Liz Harvey (committee member) and Phil Brabon (Treasurer) have remained in place and during that time we have carried out continued improvements and maintained the court to ensure that the facility was and is available for the whole village. To enable us to maintain the court we have charged a fee each year for access to the court, with the lock being changed annually usually around early May.

Since we took over responsibility in 1988 we have paid a rental fee to Shirenewton Recreation Association from our income generated from the sale of keys to the court, as well as maintaining and repairing the court to its present standard.

Our membership fee for access to the court has remained constant for the past 5 years but we have been faced with increased rent to the Recreation Association again this year and reluctantly have had to increase the **annual fee to £35 with effect from 1.5.2013**.

New membership keys for 2013 will therefore cost £35 and may be obtain from Phil Brabon at Newton Lodge opposite the Tredegar Arms or by telephoning 01291 641376.

#### SHIRENEWTON WI

April and we are into longer days, but this year only a very slow creep into Spring. Two visitors joined us for our meeting who we warmly welcomed. Our president 'Jenny Bonner' told us that we have two new members. Last month Diana and Auriol went to the Quoits competition and formed a team with two members from Caerleon WI, the four ladies were very surprised when they won. Each team member was presented with a basket of primroses after the match and at the ACM at Newport High on the 27<sup>th</sup> March a cup was presented, which has gone to Caerleon and will be with Shirenewton later in the year.

Our speaker for April was Olwen Weevers, who came to talk to us about her coloured sheep and the lovely items she makes from their wool.

Olwen told us that she used to live at House Number 1 at the Cotswold Water Park, where she kept ducks and geese and then acquired two sheep as lambs. Olwen wanted to do something with the wool especially when she acquired more sheep and so went to learn how to spin and weave and make felt. Olwen also knitted and her original Ryeland sheep produced yarn that was great for knitting. The area around where they lived started to be developed and filled in with houses, so they decided to look for somewhere with more land and less development. They found a small farm at Cross Ash with 26 acres and so were able to have more sheep of varying breeds to provide diversity of fleece and colours. Many breeds of sheep have coloured versions, but these are not wanted in commercial flocks. Olwen has had Shetlands, Manx, Loctens, Wenslydales, Blue Faced Leicesters, Romneys, and rare Corridale sheep.

Olwen told us that she became very interested in making yarn and making felt, at onetime having obtained a felting machine she processed fleece into felt for other people from their wool as well as making and selling her own. However, after becoming unwell, Olwen had to give up doing this. There is another type of felt making, called needle felt, where the wool is felted dry. It is possible to book time with a machine and this is how Olwen makes large pieces of felt now, but small items can be hand needle felted using the special barbed needles and Olwen brought several examples and gave a demonstration. Olwen brought a large variety of items for us to see and feel, ranging from fleece to bags and felt animals.

Olwen is Chairwoman of the British Coloured Sheep Breeders Association and has some of her craft items on display at the 'Made in Monmouthshire' exhibition at Abergavenny Museum.

We were all very taken with the yarn, felt and range of items Olwen produces.

Our next meeting is on May 9<sup>th</sup> and is our AGM.

#### SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Extracts from the minutes of the meeting held on 8 April 2013

#### Planning applications considered

1. DC/2013/00197 Yew Tree Cottage, Mynyddbach

Proposed extension to the side and rear of property to house guest bedroom/sun lounge, relocation of existing bathroom.

This Council recommends approval. Members noted that a neighbour had requested a stone wall rather than render on the extension as it will be visible to them and we were informed that the applicant was agreeable to this.

#### 2. DC/2013/00231 Shirenewton Village Shop

Change of Use Planning Permission. Proposed change of use of redundant shop premises into residential use and incorporating with existing maisonette at first and second floor level to form single dwelling.

This Council recommends refusal. Members felt that the shop should be retained as a community facility in line with the UDP, reference Policy CF2, items 14.3.1 / 2 / 3 / 4 all apply. Also the representations made against change of use in 2007 still apply. This is the only commercial shop facility in Shirenewton and change of use would potentially lose this facility for good. The nearest shops are in Chepstow, a travelling distance of some 12 miles round trip. Public transport from Shirenewton to Chepstow is sparse. This Council formed a Working Group in May 2012 to follow up options that arise and confirm that there is positive activity among residents for a shop in the community.

**3. Tredegar Farm Caravan Park** - County Councillor Down reported that the Inspector's decision had been made and the Appeal dismissed.

#### Cold Calling Control Zones

PC Jones explained the background to this initiative and advised that it has been successfully taken up at St Arvans, Bulwark, Thornwell and recently at Mathern. It acts as a deterrent to 'cold calling' traders offering unwanted goods and services. Residents need to be canvassed and there has to be a minimum of 70% interest from the community. There is a cost implication for signage at the entrances to the village, but the police would be prepared to fund a possible 2 out of 5 required signs. Signs would be at a cost of around £70 each.

It was resolved to pursue this initiative for Shirenewton and Mynyddbach initially as they have the greatest concentration of homes. C Cllr G Down's offer to deliver the first batch of leaflets was gratefully accepted.

#### Dog waste bags and litter bins.

Following discussion, C Cllr Down confirmed that dog waste bags can be put into litter bins for collection. He further confirmed that he has requested an additional/ bigger bin for the Tan House area. It was suggested that this be a lidded bin and that the current one be relocated behind the church as there is also a problem with the disposal of dog waste bags in that area. It was reported that the bins are not being emptied regularly. Clerk to contact Mon CC.

#### Best Kept Village Competition 2013.

Council agreed to enter the competition again this year. Cllr Jones to request sponsorships and to write an article for the next issue of the Parish News. Clerk to submit the application.

#### Items of local concern

It was reported that the anti-slip surface at Huntsman Hill has still not been renewed. Clerk to contact Highways.

Council was advised that the street lighting in Blethyn Close now dims at 11pm. Progress has been made on repair of potholes at Earlswood and the road is currently being prepared for maintenance to take place over the next 2 months. Fly tipping was reported on the road from Wentwood Mill to the crossroads. There is still no timetable in the bus shelter at West End - Clerk to pursue with Mon CC.

Council agreed to man a stall at the fete this year on 8.6.13. Those agreeing to help were Cllrs Prosser, Moles, I Moore, B Moore and the Clerk. Cllr B Moore agreed to be the link person. C Cllr Down confirmed that he will also attend.

Queen Elizabeth II Field - The Clerk has received notification from the Land Registry that the registration of the field has now been completed.

Date of next meetings: The Annual Meeting of the Council will be held on Monday 13 May 2013 at 7.30pm at Shirenewton Recreation Hall followed by the ordinary meeting.

#### 'Only Notes' from the Shirenewton Community Council Meeting Monday 8<sup>th</sup> April 2013 - Glynis MacDonald

One member of the public attended. And me. Oh, which reminds me that I was reminded to remind my reader that I'm just a member of the public too - writing up the ...err...interesting bits of the community council monthly meetings. So correction. Two members of the public attended.

#### Police Report.

PC Louise Thorpe couldn't make the meeting this month but PC Andy was here instead.

There hasn't been much local crime to report on – which is good news. There was an OWL report (what does OWL stand for again?) saying that the police had had two reports of the theft of heating oil on the Usk Road in the Shirenewton area. And one councillor reported that she had received three phone calls about travellers parked up in Prysgau Bach.

- 1 / 4 A group of youths had started a camp fire up in Fedw Woods but the Fire Brigade was called and extinguished their fun.
- 4/ 4 A non-injury house fire in Itton thought to be started by an electrical fault A house was burgled in St Arvans. In Chepstow and Bulwark, handbags and hubcaps were stolen, vehicles were sprayed with noxious substances and shoplifters were apprehended The police also issued a warning about a scam email about "wanting to charge you £100 for illegally downloading music from Cheshire police" (? Downloading music from Cheshire police? Oh well) And finally OWL breaking news a shed was broken into in Grosmont.

As Andy was at the meeting, the council was able to discuss the issue of 'Cold Calling Control Zones' – as carried over from December of last year. He explained that to set the Zone up, it will need three visits to the prospective area. One visit to drop the letters into all the households explaining the plans. The second visit to collect the responses.

And the third visit to drop off the necessary bumff and the 'Go Away, This is a Cold Caller Control Zone' stickers.

Mind you, at least 70% of all of the contacted households will need to agree to the scheme if it is to go ahead.

The scheme will also involve putting up 'Go Away, You Cold Caller' signs on the major roads coming into the area. But this prompted the next set of questions. Which area? And which roads? And how many signs will be needed? After some interesting discussions Shirenewton was chosen as the test area but then after some more interesting discussions, Mynnyddbach was also included. But not Earlswood. Or Newchurch.

Various questions popped upduring the discussion, for example:- 'What happens if some people don't like putting 'This is a Cold Caller Control Zone' stickers up by their door? and 'What exactly is a cold caller? and 'Could canvassing candidates be classed as cold callers?

Anyway once all that was sorted out, it was agreed to go ahead with the first letter drop.

#### Planning

#### DC/2013/00197 Yew Tree Cottage, Mynyddbach

'Proposed extension to the side and rear of property to house guest bedroom/sun lounge, relocation of existing bathroom.'

At this point there was a quite extraordinary and lengthy discussion as to where this particular Yew Tree Cottage was, and whether there were other Yew Tree Cottages in the area. Little breakout conversations then ensued all around the table which seemed to be about 'Yew Tree Cottages I have Known' all of which was eventually deemed as irrelevant.

Approval was then quickly Recommended. Hopefully for the right Yew Tree Cottage.

#### DC/2013/00231 Shirenewton Village Shop

'Change of Use Planning Permission. Proposed change of use of redundant Shop premises into residential use and incorporating with existing maisonette at first and second floor level to form single dwelling.'

Apparently, the new plans for change of use were little altered from the first application - and basically the councilors agreed that their original objections still stood. Historically, the original plans to build houses on that plot of land was agreed on the proviso that there was also a shop. The first owners of the new shop had been very successful and there was the potential for a successful shop to be there now. If only...

Also it was really quite strange that a bid for £260,000 wasn't taken into consideration and that it finally went for £230,000 at auction.

One cllr asked whether a shop really was wanted in the area – and whether it could be a viable concern but it was agreed that people were still very interested in having a local shop. A member of the Local Shop Sub Committee then gave an update of progress of (or lack of) the Tan House. Regular readers may remember – if their memories go back that far - that there was a possibility of a shop at the Tan House. Apparently the new owner had said he was keen on this idea but as he is concentrating on his other properties in Grosmont and at The Chainbridge, developments at the Tan House are...on hold.

Anyway, going back to planning - Refusal for Change of Use was Recommended by a majority.

The other piece of news is that the owners plan's for a caravan park at Tredegar farm have been dismissed by MCC.

#### **Small Grants from Shirenewton Community Council**

Here is a breakdown of the way that the grant money was divvied up. Shirenewton Guides, Shirenewton PCC, St Peters Church and Shirenewton WI all received £50 each, Shirenewton Brownies received £40 and Earlswood Chapel and Shirenewton Local History Soc both received £30 Also it was agreed that 5 out of the 10 cllrs should be authorized to sign SCC cheques because it was thought that 10 signatories might confuse the bank.

#### Model Standing Orders - 3 suggestions to consider

Nothing much of interest here other than the cllrs should agree to resolve to received stuff by something called the email system – that no member should accept gifts as a cllr and finally - a suggestion that council meetings should not go on longer than 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  hours. Yay! But it was agreed that sometimes things were too important to put a time curb on any discussions. Sigh.

#### To discuss local commemoration of World War 1.

The original meeting was snowed off – and plans for this will now be coming out at the end of April. This year.

#### Update on the Village Telephone Kiosk

Well Devauden's telephone kiosk isn't going to remain that ghastly salmon pink. No, that is the undercoat, ready for the traditional red. And whereas we are planning for a shop and/or a micro brewery and/or a library and /or a notice board in our kiosk, Devauden are apparently planning a village defibrillator. This raised a few eyebrows. Was the person with the suspected heart attack to drag themselves along to the kiosk and apply the electrodes? No – there are 20 people in Devauden with Cards. And they don't need training. I think I'd prefer to drag myself to a mini micro brewery.

Anyway many thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Tayton because the telephone box is actually on their patch and they have been most helpful in helping the council acquire the kiosk.

#### To discuss increasing the Council's profile and website

MCC is holding a seminar in Usk at the end of the month to help and advise local councils setting up web sites. And the Welsh Assembly is funding each council to the tune of a fat £500. And following on from that, came the Council's Stonking Idea. To raise Shirenewton Council's profile to you, the local people, it was suggested that the Minutes should be published in the parish mag!!! Brill or wot! The councilors thought this was a great idea. Obviously it could only be the draft Minutes not the real McCoy

– For that you'd have to continue to wait patiently for them to be ratified by the next month's council meeting and then go on line to read the Real Thing. And so dear reader, as you can see, you are in for a real treat.

But this proposal has repercussions. You won't want to read about the council meetings twice in one edition of the parish rag. There's only so much excitement a village can have. So, I raised my hand and asked whether this meant I was now to be made redundant? (I did add – with a large pay off?) There was polite laughter – but no answer. I had no time to consider my position as the council meeting continued apace and so I put all thoughts of constructive dismissal to one side as I continued in my duty to bring The News To You.

#### Best Kept Village Competition

Once again it is that time of year to timetable cleaning your windows, sorting out your verges and repelling your borders ready for the Competition. In Shirenewton anyway. And the judges will be asked to excuse the Tan House as it's unlikely to be in a blooming condition. (Or should that read it will still be in a blooming condition?)

#### Other items of local concern -

Still to Do. As reported previously, the non-slip road surface on the Huntsman Hill has worn away and more non-slipperyness needs to be applied. The Street Lighting at Blethyn Close now dims down at 11. It's taken 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  years for this to be put into operation but now that it has, the residents are very pleased.

The roads up at Earlswood are still in a very bad state with oodles of potholes. But there have been sightings of something happening. A man came and 'repainted' them and a verge cutter came to clean them out – so I guess that's progress of a sort. Now I confess I'm not very good at mending potholes myself, but wouldn't a cartload of tarmac be a good idea?

After a whole year, the Westend Bus Shelter still hasn't got a timetable. No point putting one up now as new bus time tables are due to come out shortly.

The Council was asked whether they were going to have a stall at the Church Fete. It took a while for interest to ignite on this one – but when it was suggested that this was a great way to raise the profile of the council there was a little more interest and then when Cllr David Adams suggested bringing along his tractor there was lots more enthusiasm. Then there was jumping on the bandwagon with suggestions of tables! And gazebos!

#### The Clerk's Report.

Notice Boards – these boards will be repaired when there is no longer a likelihood of frost. So August then?

Dog Poo Bins. Last month I forgot to tell you about the Dog Poo Bins. I can't think why I forgot. It seems that there are not enough of them in Shirenewton and Mynnyddbach. And the ones we do have, continue to overflow. Is this because they are not emptied frequently enough? (the bins not the dogs) Or is it because of the number of dogs walking and dumping per day means that the bins do not have the capacity to contain the problem? And one poo bin is very near the bus stop and in the hot summer – this gets to be quite horrible.

So once again, this issue was back on the agenda. And indeed, the other member of the public was there to say this problem is getting worse and he asked for more and bigger bins to be provided. For those who take the poo home, MCC say it can be put into the black bags and the bin men will collect in the usual way. Although please, please can it be double wrapped. And there was a plea not to decorate trees, bushes or crevices in walls with the little bags.

(I was discussing this issue at the TA the other night – you'd have thought I'd got better things to talk about - however a local resident told me that she'd had a rather large bag of doggy do -dos and had put it outside for the Bin Men to collect. But before the Bin Men had arrived – someone had seen the Supermarket bag outside her front door and had stolen it)

Anyway Cllr Graham Down has agreed to look into this problem. The bins – not the theft.

**Poor Land Field** - It was felt that the Land Registry forms, should be looked at by a solicitor as they were complicated and full of legalistic jargon. Also there didn't seem to be any original documents to confirm the council's ownership of the Poor Land as they'd been receiving rent from the land even though the council didn't have any paperwork to prove ownership.

The clerk confirmed that a chain and padlock had been purchased for the field gate. (However, I've heard via the grape line that there is a massive big hole in the hedge just down the road so the Poor will be able to escape anyway)

The meeting finally came to a close.

The AGM followed by the monthly meeting will be on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30. I may – or may not be there.

#### GARDENING CORNER

At last! A couple of days decent weather when you can feel the warmth of the sun on your backs. Unfortunately this has come to late to save our bees and losses have been complete. Ironically the local bee inspector rang me the other day to arrange to come and go through our hives. Even he has lost 30% of his colonies and it appears that we are not the only ones to suffer complete losses. Hopefully those that have only lost one or two hives will have a few swarms that they won't want themselves. We have guite a few spring flowers now out in full bloom but the quietness is already very noticeable. Normally there would be a continuous drone of bees going about their business as only bees know how. But for now there is just deathly silence. It will take some getting used to, the first time in over fifteen years without bees. We will have to pick ourselves up from this disaster, but it will take many years to get back to how things were. It has to be a warning to those sceptics that still maintain that there is no global warming. With no signs of any bumble bees until now, the apricots and nectarines in the tunnel have failed to set any fruit. Despite my best efforts with a paint brush it looks like we will be very lucky to get a picking of either.

Recently I had the opportunity to get hold of another polythene tunnel. This is quite a bit smaller than the one we have up at present being about 6 metres long and 3 metres wide (20' by 10'). However it has straight sides, unlike our big tunnel, so it is easy to grow crops right up to the side. It belonged to a cousin who sadly passed away before Christmas, and it meant that I had to scoot down to Hampshire to dismantle and bring back. It took about half a day in total, but I have the perfect spot on which to erect it, but unfortunately a lot of clearing up to do before I can get it put back up and in use. For the first year I intend to grow tomatoes in it. Due to lack of space I have had to grow these in pretty well the same spot in the tunnel for the last four or five years and the ground desperately needs' a rest. Hopefully this tunnel will allow me to move things around more frequently and will avoid the build up of any pests and diseases. The last couple of years have seen a drop off in tomato production, so hopefully this will be the answer. Our young tomato plants are due for potting on, but because of the cold they are still only a about 8 centimetres high (3"), so hopefully I will find the time to get the tunnel up and covered before they are big enough to need a permanent home for the rest of the season. For now they will be put into larger pots and will languish in the small propagating greenhouse.

Back in the tunnel I managed to build up the raised beds and these have been copiously manured. I have planted the two by the fruit trees with strawberries as planned, and these are now starting to grow on rapidly. Hopefully we will get a bumper crop during June – fingers crossed! One of the other beds has been

planted with the early calabrese. The intention is that this will produce lovely heads during June and the ground will then be cleared and planted up with sweet and hot peppers. As with the tomatoes, these are already growing on in small pots and will be transplanted into larger pots to ensure that they keep growing as fast as possible.

Another raised bed has been sown with early carrots, but this time I have put a fine mesh net around them to try and keep the carrot fly at bay. These have already started growing well and are also benefitting from the warmer weather. Elsewhere in the garden it has been a case of all hands on deck whilst it is dry. The Assistant head gardener has been going through cutting and clearing all the rubbish out of the way and I have now started following on behind digging out everything we don't want in the way of weeds, brambles and the thousands of young (and some not so young) ash trees. I had started to use these to plant a small wood in our top field, mainly for a future firewood crop, but with the introduction of the ash dieback disease (Chalara), this now seems a bit of a futile exercise. In hindsight, yes it's a wonderful thing this hindsight, I should have started planting it up fifteen years ago, as by now we would have had a nice woodland, and would have already been cutting our own firewood. With any luck some of the trees will show resistance, but for now I intend to leave them to grow as big as possible until they become infected (if they do of course). Fortunately for us over here, the disease is presently mainly in the east of the country, with only new plantings being infected with diseased stock on this side of the country. The Forestry Commission will be offering assistance in England to remove these newly planted diseased trees, so hopefully this will slow down the spread, but I'm not sure if the same is happening in Wales. Indications are that it will take at least five years to spread nationally, so let's hope that this is a pessimistic prediction.

So clearing the raised vegetable beds is progressing well and several are already planted. The garlic bed that was planted in October, has suffered a few losses but generally speaking there isn't too bad a crop. I started the onion sets and shallots off in pots in the greenhouse and the first of these have also now been planted out. I did have some early broad beans and peas, which were planted out before the last cold spell. Fortunately we didn't get the snow of elsewhere in the country, so these have mostly survived, to be joined by some latest sowings. Hopefully there will be enough bumble bees about to pollinate these as I have relied heavily on the honey bees to do the necessary. I have cleared one of the asparagus beds, but need to desperately sort the other one out as well. A bit more warm weather will see the first spears coming through and I need to weed and feed before this starts to happen otherwise the spears will get damaged. WE have had the first picking of salad leaves from inside the tunnel, and the next couple of bags are planted ready for successional crops over the coming weeks. I need to get on with sowing some more, so must get on. So happy gardening until next month.

#### **STARGAZING**

The bright planet Jupiter lies to the west, gradually dropping to the horizon as the month proceeds. Jupiter is joined by the even brighter planet Venus at the end of the month. Saturn is in the south-east and is slightly yellow in colour. On the 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Moon is close to



Saturn.

The 5 stars forming the "W" of Cassiopeia lie to the north in the evening night sky. Constellations usually have Ancient Greek names – the name Cassiopeia was used by Ptolemy, a great Greek astronomer living in Egypt when it was part of the Roman Empire around 100 AD. On the other hand the majority of stars have Arabic names – Arabic

Astronomy was centred on Baghdad from about 800 to 1200 AD. Unusually the middle star of Cassiopeia is called Tsih, named by Chinese astronomers. This star has been used as an easily identifiable reference during space missions. Its traditional name in Welsh is Llys Dôn, which means the Court of Dôn, a character in the Mabinogion folk tales.

Other prominent Spring constellations are the familiar seven stars of Ursa Major, commonly called the Plough (a traditional Welsh name is Y Sospan, which hardly needs translating), which is now overhead in mid-evening, and Leo the Lion in the southern sky.

Which is more useful, the Sun or the Moon? The Moon because the Sun only shines during the day when it's light anyway!


## MONMOUTHSHIRE MEADOWS GROUP OPEN DAYS 9th and 16th June

#### NERYS'S NATTY NOSH



A dinner party, coffee, tea Sandwiches, or supper, all may be *In their way a pleasant.* But not for me Not one of these deserve the praise That welcome of new-born days, A breakfast, merits; ever giving Cheerful notice we are living Another day refreshed by sleep, When it's festival we keep. Part of Charles Lamb poem "Breakfast"

Breakfast is now considered the most important meal of the day. It's a time to break the night fast and nourish the body with wholesome food.

In medieval Europe only two meals were eaten, a heavy dinner at noon and a light supper, largely due to the influence of the church. However exceptions existed, for children and the infirm; they were allowed a small breakfast. Some farmers and labourers ignored the rule and by the 15<sup>th</sup> century even nobility mistreated the act. I do enjoy the odd cooked English breakfast but on the whole I like nothing better than:-

## Yogurt, seasonal fruits, nuts and seeds.

1 pot plain probiotic yogurt Chopped seasonal fruit/fruits

- 1 tablespoon dry roasted almonds
- 1 tablespoon seeds -dry roasted pumpkin, sunflower and sesame seeds.

#### Method.

- 1 On a low heat, warm a frying for one minutes. Add the seeds and dry roast for approximately 3-4 minutes, turning from time to time. The seeds should turn a golden colour.
- 2 Chop the fruit.
- **3** Place the yogurt into the bowl, add the fruit, followed by the nuts and seeds.

#### Tips

I like to make a large batch of dry roasted nuts and seeds and store them in an airtight container. You could add some dried fruit e.g. cranberries and blueberries. **Nutritional Value.** Probiotic yogurt is packed with "friendly" bacteria which helps to maintain a healthy digestive system. It also has a positive effect on the immune system. Yogurt derives from milk therefore it is full of the calcium needed for healthy bones and teeth. Due to the bacterial break down of fats in the yogurt, it is easily digested by the body.

Nuts and seeds are high in protein, essential fats, minerals, the antioxidant vitamin E, and are also a good source of calcium.

#### Eye, eye!



What keeps them healthy? Having regular check-ups on the eyes are essential but we can improve the quality of the eyes by eating certain foods!

Eggs: - Vitamin A, which helps the retina to function.

Raspberries: - Vitamin C, which may reduce the risk of cataracts.

Almonds: - Vitamin E, which helps slow down the aging process.

Broccoli: - Lutein, which may help prevent age related macular degeneration

and cataracts.

Salmon: - Omega 3 fatty acids, which is associated with a lower risk of related

macular degeneration.

Spinach: - Protects the eye from oxidation.
Yogurt:- Helps the body absorb antioxidants.

## Raspberry and Strawberry Smoothie serves 1

#### Ingredients:

100g (4oz) fresh or defrosted raspberries 150g (6oz) strawberries 4tbsp natural yoghurt

1tbsp honey

#### Method:

Pour into a blender, liquidise and serve!

## Banana, Yoghurt and Almond Smoothie serves 2

#### Ingredients:

4 ripe bananas

50g (2oz) ground almonds

8 ice cubes

6tbsp natural yogurt

2tbsp maple syrup

Pinch of cinnamon

#### Method:

Pour into a blender, liquidise and serve!

#### Tips:

Add a handful of ground nuts, bran, or oats and add a little milk until the correct pouring consistency is acquired. Liquidise. Excellent for breakfast.


