

PRESENTATION OF THE AUMBRY TO THE CHURCH



Following on from last month's article about the impending visit of The Worshipful Company of Woolmen to Monmouthshire and Shirenewton, the visit took place as planned over the weekend of 13th/15th September. The group of Woolmen arrived at St Pierre during Friday afternoon in time for tea and Welsh cakes in the reception area, although about a dozen had arrived earlier for a day of (rather damp) golf. They enjoyed an informal dinner in the Chepstow Room that evening, and were entertained most mellifluously by the Chepstow Male Voice Choir, by arrangement with Peter Kent.

On Saturday they boarded coaches and visited Caerwent Roman Village, Chepstow Castle and Tintern Abbey, where they were shown round by Gordon Hill, an experienced blue badge guide. They had an excellent lunch at the Royal George Tintern, and James McMorrough and Sammie Wright looked after them very well. In the evening the Liverymen dined in black tie in the state rooms on board SS Great Britain in Bristol docks. They were played aboard the ship by the Lydbrook Silver Band conducted by Robert Morgan, who then continued to entertain them on the promenade deck during the champagne reception. Mr Keith Arnold, a Past Master of the Worshipful Company of Information Technologists and also a Past Master of the Welsh Livery Guild, and fortuitously a resident of Weyloed Lane, was the guest speaker. In an amusing speech he was able to inform the guests that the Guild was most pleased to have been granted a Royal Charter by HM The Queen in their new title *The Worshipful Livery Company of Wales, Cwmni* Anrhydeddus Lifrai Cymru. The Charter was sealed at the Crown Office on 6th September 2013, and the new title will be used from the Installation of the new Master on 12th October 2013.

On the morning of Sunday 15th September the Company attended the morning service at St Thomas á Becket Church and presented the aumbry, which was dedicated by the Reverend Julian White, who also gave the sermon. The aumbry was made by Siân Evans from Sussex, assembled by Allan Saysell, installed by John Saysell and the curtain for it was made by Claire Lewis. Karen Miller played the organ for the service, and the lessons were read by Past Master Richard Pickance and the Master of the Worshipful Company of Woolmen, Bill Clark.

CHURCH WEBSITE & SHOPPING PORTAL

Despite me failing to get a Parish mag entry to the editor for the last few months, the church website continues to exist! The good news is that, to date this year, it has delivered over £1,000 to the Church. So, many thanks to those of you who continue to shop through it.

For those that don't use it, please start to use it. It really is free money. The actual shop is at www.shirenewtonshop.com and there are approximately 220 shops on the portal in over 30 categories – including many of the high street and web shops you use all the time. Each one pays us a small commission on sales made by clicking through from the portal. All special offers, etc. at the linked shops are the same as if you went onto the site directly.

It's not just about shopping. It's a community resource. There are photos of the village fete posted, historical copies of the parish magazine and copies of the community council minutes. Links to local traffic cameras and to various parts of the Monmouthshire County Council website.

BTW: I'd reiterate the warning I posted a few months ago regarding the increase in 'drive-bys'. This is where you get infected by malware for just visiting a site. It is strongly recommended that you disable Java and ActiveX in your standard browser. So, for example, I use Chrome as my default browser which has both java and ActiveX disabled (just google 'disabling Java in Chrome' for how to do this – you'll only have ActiveX if you installed it). I then have Internet Explorer with both these options enabled as it is sometimes necessary to use them for things like online banking, online meetings, etc. But I never generally browse with IE and only go direct to trusted websites.

FAIRTRADE NEWS

All kinds of new products are entering the fair trade market. I have written before about the ubiquitous presence of palm oil and the well-founded criticisms made of much of its production. There has been massive unregulated expansion of large plantations in South East Asia, very often to the serious detriment of the environment, the local population and wildlife. Palm oil is one of the world's fastest growing commodities and constitutes one third of global edible oil production with demand predicted to double by 2030. It's a high-yield versatile oil that can be used in a wide range of non-food and food products. As I have mentioned before, many 'moisturising, creamy' toiletries and cosmetics rely on palm oil.


West Africa is the birthplace of palm oil and this is where Traidcraft is working with small-scale producers to enable them to fulfil the criteria for fair trade status. Liberation peanut butter already includes a small amount of sustainably sourced palm oil. This and most of the other products in the Traidcraft catalogue can be obtained from the Fairtrade shop in the cafe in the Methodist Church Hall, Chepstow. Traidcraft is planning to launch other products containing palm oil when the developments in Ghana have come to fruition.

Another rather startling piece of news is that a Dutch company has just launched a fair-trade smartphone. Companies such as Apple and Samsung have in the past been criticised for failing to reveal that their products were made from resources mined in conflict zones and manufactured in far-east factories where labour practices are very poor. A number of minerals used in smartphones come from areas such as the Democratic Republic of Congo and armed groups controlling the mines are alleged to benefit, with profits fuelling the fighting. In contrast to Apple's sealed devices the Fairphone handset can be opened and repaired, extending its lifespan. Apparently almost 15,000 Fairphones have been pre-ordered. It will be available in December.

STARGAZING

As it is now getting darker earlier there are more opportunities for stargazing.





In the early morning sky, bright Jupiter lies to the south, forming a triangle with the stars Castor and Pollux. To the south-east and and lower in the sky, Mars is the lowest corner of a triangle formed with the stars Regulus and Algeiba, the brightest stars in the constellation of Leo. On the 26th, the Moon is below Jupiter.

The constellation of Cygnus the Swan lies pretty much directly above. It is in the shape of a cross – in fact it is sometimes called the Northern Cross. According to legend, Jupiter the king of the Gods changed himself into a swan when he wanted to visit Leda, the wife of the King of Sparta. In memory of the episode, he placed a swan in the sky.

The seven stars of the Plough are to the North and the four stars forming the Great Square of Pegasus lie to the South.

Looking at Jupiter with binoculars should give a good view of Jupiter's four largest moons: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto – they form a line with the planet. In 1610 the Italian scientist Galileo used a telescope for the first time and discovered the moons of Jupiter. The four moons have been called the Galilean Moons ever since.

SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Extracts from the minutes of the meetings held on 2 September 2013 Planning applications considered

- 1. DC/2013/00453 Blue Bell Farm, Penycaemawr. Proposed barn conversion to provide one dwelling. **This Council recommends approval.**
- 2. DC/2013/00600 Agricultural Notification, information only. Development of a new forest road and turning area, south area of Grondra Great Wood Shirenewton, to Rhewl Farm Shirenewton. **This Council recommends approval.**
- 3. DC/2013/00595 Tredegar Farm, Newchurch West. Change of use Planning Permission. Change of use to proposed caravan park and facilities block. (Previous application DC/2011/00008). **This Council recommends refusal.** Members were aware of the previous application made in 2011 which had been dismissed at appeal in March 2013. Mon CC had reported that there are currently sufficient small caravan sites in the area.

Members acknowledged that the number of caravans had been reduced by 50% and they had been sited closer to the hedges to take advantage of screening, but despite the amendments to the proposal, the caravans will still be highly visible, and the Inspector made it clear that the number of caravans might be increased at any time with or without planning consent, which would be unacceptable. Hedges may be trimmed at any time and the site could quickly become extremely intrusive.

There would be an unacceptable visual impact on the countryside. The highways issue concerns all vehicles, but particularly motorcycles, which travel much faster. The slow egress of vehicles towing caravans onto a highway that is a renowned motorcycle route for testing the capability of motorcycles, along which they travel at great speed and present a very real risk of accidents. There have been fatalities on this road, and there are regular near misses between cars and motorcycles. This situation must be taken into consideration in any decision as it involves human life and limb.

There are also concerns of light pollution in the open countryside, and water courses at the location are already contaminated at times of heavy rain.

Overall, members felt the situation has not materially altered from the original application, and recommended refusal.

4. DC/2012/00631 Hill View Cottage, Shirenewton (IM/PM) Amendments to original application. **This Council recommends refusal.** Although members recognised that amendments had been made to the original plans, there were still concerns about access and members felt that not enough of an improvement had been made to recommend approval.

5. DC/2013/00231 Change of use, Shirenewton Village Shop. Council approved the Clerk writing to the Mon CC Planning Committee meeting being held on 3.9.13 to inform them of details of the previous recommendation for refusal made by this Council. C Cllr G Down advised of his intention to attend the meeting.

Items of local concern

Postcodes at Newchurch West - Members discussed an e-mail received from Mon CC detailing delivery and emergency service difficulties with several properties in the area having the same postcode. A number of households did not wish to have alterations made to their address/postcode. C Cllr Down to contact and discuss with residents.

Dog waste bins - application made to 'Tidy Towns' for £810 funding for the supply of three bins. Clerk visited proposed bin locations with Alison Howard on 22.8.13, all acceptable and bins installed 23.8.13. Also requested a further £120 for litter bin for Earlswood to replace damaged bin opposite Cherry Orchard - this was agreed, total funding of £930. This Council to fund future specialist emptying of bins.

Best Kept Village Competition - invitation received 30.8.13 to Presentation Evening at Chepstow Garden Centre on Friday 20.9.13 from 6pm. Cllrs Jones and Hughes to attend.

Car Rally - a letter had been received from the Forresters Car Club - Notification of Patriot Stages Car Rally on Sunday 29 September 2013 at Caerwent Training Area. Marshals to enter by the East Gate at Crick and competitors by the West Gate, Caerwent from 6.00 - 8.00 am and leave at around 5.00 pm.

New road surface from Huntsman Hill to Shirenewton centre - a resident had spoken to the Clerk to express her thanks for the work being undertaken and to mention how pleasant and patient the workmen had been.

The mobile police vehicle will be at the Tredegar Arms car park on Thursday 24th October from 9 - 11am and at the Huntsman Hotel on Sunday 20th from 9.30 - 11.30am.

Date of next meeting: Monday 7 October 2013 at 7.30pm at Shirenewton Recreation Hall. Members of the public may attend meetings and speak to Councillors about issues/problems/compliments for the first 15 minutes.

Anyone can go along to the library and use their computers to do research the staff will give help, there is a charge for hard copy printouts.

Everyone enjoyed the evening and we were all given starter packs with tips on how to get started, lots of useful websites and how to make best use of the information on birth, marriage and death certificates. We were warned that tracing family histories can become addictive with the possibility of losing oneself for hours going through documents or taking trips to places you never expected to visit.

Our visit certainly gave us all a lot to think about.

GARDENING CORNER

One of the most noticeable results of the fine weather this year has been the numbers of butterflies in the garden. I have never seen so many Painted Ladies or Peacocks. There have been guite a few 'lesser' species around as well but the two mentioned have been the most striking because of their size and colour. Whilst going for a well earned cup of tea in the summerhouse the other day, we counted over thirty butterflies all sunning themselves on the roof and there were plenty more still flying around. Unfortunately the downside to this is the number of cabbage whites that are also around. Wholesale warfare has been declared in the winter greens department as we try to ensure that there is enough leaf left on the plants to continue to grow. I have had to resort to chemicals as well, but you have probably read my complaints about these in the past when I not only bemoaned the cost, but also the ineffectiveness of the odd ones or two's that are still available to the amateur gardener thanks to the EU. I think so far we have one a few battles, but the war will continue for a few more weeks, when colder weather will start to take its toll. Another downside is the increase in wasps. I and the many badgers around, have managed to destroy everyone we have found so far, but I know, by the numbers around, that there are at least one, if not more nests, that still survive fairly close to hand. I was working on the bees the other day, putting medication in the hives for the varoa mite. I opened one hive up to discover a number of wasps in the roof. They had obviously gone in to rob the honey, but decided that perhaps they wouldn't run the risk of going back down the hive again. As a result of this discovery I've reduced the size of the entrance to the hive so that the bees guarding it have a better chance of seeing the wasps off. Fortunately I haven't seen any evidence of hornets this year as they can also be a nuisance.

Our house martens have produced second broods this year which has also been a bonus. We have 8 artificial nests that I put up each year and last year we had another five built naturally as well. Unfortunately the rotten weather last year meant few chicks were raised which reflected in the fact that our artificial nests were full, but no others were built. We now have tens of youngsters swooping and crying around the house every morning as they build up strength and start to gather for the mass exodus south. Hopefully more will return next year – provided our EU colleagues don't shoot or catch them on the way there or back.

In the vegetable garden things have been a bit hit and miss this year. We have had some exceptional crops, but then again, due I'm sure to the heat, we have had some pretty poor results. The main failures have been some of the tomatoes and runner beans, whilst other tomatoes and the French beans have done extremely well. We have a bumper crop of melons and are continuing to cut cucumbers. The grafted plants have proved themselves with the melons resembling 'The Day of the Triffids' all over again. They have gone absolutely mad

in the tunnel and are now getting to the point where we are going to have to be violent and slash them back before they take over everything. The early and salad potatoes have been dug up and stored, but the main crop is continuing to grow at the moment. If it starts to turn moist and keeps warm we will have to keep a close eye out for potato blight, but at the moment things are looking OK. As soon as blight is noticed we will have to cut all the green tops off which will keep the potatoes below disease free. They can then be dug when conditions permit – but before the slugs start to find them! The dry weather has also meant a bumper onion and shallot crop, both of which have been dug up and are drying on the staging in the greenhouse. One of the next jobs will be to sort out the ones we want for cooking and those for pickling. Pickling, a nice little job to do one wet autumn evening! Having been removed the beds are now empty. Normally I would put winter or spring greens into these but the beds concerned are infected with club root so are no go areas for brassica crops. Instead I'm covering the beds in manure and then plan to cover with 'ground cover' to stop the birds from pecking and flicking the manure in all directions whilst they search for the worms! This will be left in place all winter and hopefully the worms and the weather will ensure that the manure works down into the soil, leaving beds in ideal condition for next spring planting.

We are busy harvesting everything that we can at present. We have two large deep freezers which are already bursting at the seams and we are switching to alternative means of storing. We have numerous bean varieties which are just starting to mature, nearly all of which are for drying. The first two varieties have been picked and are currently in trays in the conservatory allowing the autumn sun to do its work. The kitchen has also been busy with number one daughter and the assistant head gardener busy making chutney and jams. The nectarines did extremely well in the end and have ended up as either cooked fruit (now in the freezer), chutney (mixed with apples) or as jam (combined with blueberries) the latter being an experiment! We are also busy 'foraging' outside of the garden and this year has proved to be the best in my current memory anyway, for blackberries. Many have been frozen loose, or cooked with the fallen cooking apples to make either jam or stewed fruit. We have had an excellent crop of early eating apples as well, mainly the variety, discovery. These, picked fresh from the tree, are a revelation compared to most of the standard commercial varieties available. Because of the pressure on the deep freezers, we are actively considering whether to invest in a food dryer. These are electrically operated mini ovens that gently dry the produce for storage. This would allow us to dry our own fruit (like the dried fruit you pay huge money for in the health shops). The thought of our own dried apricots etc is very tempting. You can also use them to dry herbs etc as well, so quite versatile. Still must get on. We have started cutting all our hedges this week. There is something about a nice tidy hedge as it has a huge impact on what the rest of the garden looks like and we need to finish cutting them!



NERYS'S NATTY NOSH

Haven't we had a fabulous summer this year? The sun shone and blessed our fruit trees with an abundant crop of delicious, sweet fruit.

We grow plums and apples in our garden. I preserve them by:- Cooking the fruit in a very small amount of water, cinnamon and sugar. Then freeze the fruit in plastic containers or freezer bags. I then use later for various puddings, toppings, and sauces.



The fruit can also be juiced or preserved into delicious jams and chutneys.

Apple Thutney WI recipe-makes 2x 500ml (18fl oz.) jars Ingredients.

250g (9oz) onions, chopped 1kg (2lb 4oz) cooking apples, cored and chopped 125g (4½ oz) sultanas, raisins or chopped dates

1 tablespoon ground coriander

1 tablespoon paprika

1 tablespoon mixed spice

1 tablespoon salt

350 g (12oz) granulated sugar

700ml (11/4 pints) malt vinegar

Method

- **1** Put all the ingredients into a large pan or preserving pan. Slowly bring to the boil, stirring often, until the sugar has completely dissolved.
- 2 Simmer for 1½-2 hours, stirring from time to time to stop the chutney sticking to the pan.
- 3 After 1½ hours, start checking if the chutney is ready by dragging a channel through the mixture (with a wooden spoon) so that the bottom of the pan is visible. If the channel fills immediately with liquid, the chutney is not ready. Cook for a further 15 minutes and check again. The chutney is ready when the channel does not fill and the mixture is very thick.
- 4 Remove the pan from the heat and leave to stand briefly. Carefully pour the chutney into sterilised jars and seal. Allow the chutney to cool completely before labelling and storing in a cool, dark cupboard. Store for at least 2 months before eating.

Tips

This is a spicy apple chutney, perfect for serving with cheese and cold meat.

Nerys's Natty Nosh

Clafoutis is a baked French dessert of black cherries arranged in a buttered dish and covered with thick flan like batter. While black cherries are traditional there are numerous variations using other fruits including red cherries, plums, prunes, apple, cranberries, blackberries or blackcurrants. When other kinds of fruit are used instead of cherries, the dish is called Flaugnarde.



Cherry Clafoutis Serves 4

Ingredients

500g (1lb) pitted black cherries

Batter

75g (3oz) plain flour, sifted 25g (1 oz.) caster sugar 3 eggs 225 ml (7½ FL oz.) milk Few drops of vanilla extract

Method

- 1 Preheat oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6.
- 2 Make the batter. Whisk the eggs, then gradually add the milk, vanilla, sugar and sifted flour.
- 3 Grease a 1.5- 1.8 litre (2½- 3 pints) soufflé dish with butter.
- **4** Add the pitted black cherries to the greased dish.
- **5** Cover with the batter.
- 6 Bake for 30 minutes or until well risen.
- 7 Dust with icing sugar and serve at once.
- 8 Accompany with single cream or ice cream.

Did you know?

- 1 When storing cherries, choose fruit on the stem (the darker the cherry the more antioxidants) to discourage decay and refrigerate for up to six days. Canned and bottled cherries retain many nutrients.
- **2** Glossy cherries are one of the best fruit sources of antioxidants, which help prevent many diseases associated with ageing. Research shows that these antioxidants inhibit inflammation-causing enzymes and reduce the level of uric acid in painful joints. Eating cherries daily can help alleviate inflammatory disorders such as gout and rheumatoid arthritis as well as relieving headaches and migraine.
- **3** Cherries have a very low glycaemia index, so a handful of cherries is an idea snack, stabilizing blood sugar levels and keeping hunger at bay.


