FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear People of the Parish,

At the recent Vestry Meetings (not exactly the high-point of the ecclesiastical calendar) I droned on about the rapidly changing face of parish life as we know it – or thought that we did.

Of course, the parish structure has always changed during the course of time and I suspect that many of you long for a return to the days when 'absentee clergy' was not unusual. Jesting aside, many of you will remember significant changes to the system in your own lifetime. For a start the days when there was broadly 'one Vicar for every parish' has long gone. Indeed, as I have mentioned before, there was a time (up to the 1960's) when, for example, if you were Vicar of Mathern that was it. The community was half the size it is now and Mounton and St. Pierre belonged elsewhere. Some fifty years ago, or thereabouts, there was an amalgamation to form the present group and, just last year, we were joined by Shirenewton.

Those who attended the public Vestry Meetings (OK, as usual just the existing Parochial Church Council in reality) have heard this before, but I repeat it in the hope that it will be of interest to a wider audience.

We live in an age where parishes are amalgamated, church membership is generally in decline and where priests are often not replaced when they reach the age of retirement. No longer, it would appear, is a priest obliged to reside within the parish to which they are licensed. In addition, we seemingly have the diocesan attitude whereby the 'parochial system' with which many us are familiar, is increasingly replaced by new thoughts on structure on the ground. The cosy and somewhat fuzzy impression we have of 'parish life' in the ecclesiastical sense is largely a thing of the past.

I mention this in order that you might be informed of the changes that have already happened and look likely to continue. We now live within a time of 'Ministry Areas' and patterns of worship, for example, with which we have become accustomed may well be subject to radical review. Older clergy, such as I, may well feel uncomfortable with many of the changes – proposed and in place – but it must be admitted that a new generation will respond positively to such shifts. There is the argument, after all, that an institution (if we may call the Church that) that does not change is one that ultimately becomes fossilised and dies. We do, indeed, live in interesting times.

On the subject of deeply-rooted structures, and following the 'Annual General Meetings' of the churches, I wish to sincerely thank all officers for their effort and commitment over the years. In particular I acknowledge Churchwardens Peter Pope and Monnica Williams (Mathern) who have been appointed/elected to office. At Mounton we express our gratitude to Sandra White who has helped see the church through challenging times, and wish her successor Lynne Jones all the best in taking over. Carole Oakes continues as the other Warden and we appreciate her contribution in this respect. Down in St. Pierre we wish Wendy Sinden, who has also given many years service as Churchwarden, every blessing and convey our thanks. Her son, Matthew, has now taken over and it is our hope that he will find this office both stimulating and rewarding. Merran Higgins has graciously agreed to continue as Rector's Warden and I am indebted to her for undertaking this task. Shirenewton continues much as before, and I take this opportunity to thank Rev. Nansi Davies for her strong and wise ministry sometimes exercised in demanding circumstances. Andrew Baker (Peoples' Warden) is an example of commitment in an extremely hectic schedule of work and family life, and we are indeed grateful to him. Special mention must be made of Sally Saysell (Rector's Warden) who has contributed significantly to the robust health of Shirenewton Church over the years.

Vicars come and go but church officers tend to remain. To all Parochial Church Councillors I extend warm appreciation and thanks for presenting their church and what it represents to such a high standard.

THE BELLS, THE BELLS.

Ringing is no different to classical team activities such as contact sports, orchestral music, dance and other cooperative skilled human activities in that common to all these is an inter-team competitive streak leading to organised competitions. For bell ringing this is known as a *Striking Competition* and is the comparison of the skill level of bands of ringers from different churches. The basis of the competition is a set piece of ringing which is judged by independent examiners, who at the time have no knowledge of the identity of the band ringing. What happens in practice is that bands assemble at a predetermined church on a specific day and draw lots as to the order in which the bands perform. The independent examiners (judges), who are appointed from outside the locality, are positioned so they cannot observe the bands entering and leaving the ringing chamber, so have no knowledge as to the origin and identity of each band until the order is revealed after judging has occurred. Once the competition begins the bands in turn enter the ringing chamber, ring a short practice piece lasting 3 minutes and then with a predetermined signal to the examiners (usually 4 strikes of the lightest bell) begin the ringing to be judged, which usually lasts for about 5 minutes. Once completed the band leaves the ringing chamber and the process begins with the next band. Such competitions happen all over the UK with the most prestigious being the National 12 bell competition, which has in the past even been televised! Now why am I telling you all this?

The 2014 Striking Competition of the Monmouth Branch of the Llandaff & Monmouth Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers was held at Magor on May 17th. There were 2 sections, the first of call changes competing for the Gordon Wilkinson Trophy, and the second of method ringing competing for the Audrey Bruton Trophy. Shirenewton were able to enter a band for each section. For the call changes we were placed first and awarded the trophy. The band was Mike Penney, Jenny Millar, Sam Bolingbroke, Chris Jones, Simon Stanley and our most recent recruit John Montague. The bells at Magor are a bit tricky to ring, with the bells rung from the nave with a long draft of rope (not dissimilar to Shirenewton before we re-commissioned the ringing room), so particular congratulations to John for mastering these bells so well. In the method ringing section were awarded a very credible third place only beaten by bands with collectively much more experienced ringers. The band for this was the same except for the substitution of Pip Penney for John. The Gordon Wilkinson Trophy is currently being engraved and will then adorn our ringing chamber for the next year. A deserved win that befits our Shirenewton Ringer's motto - Onwards and Upwards.

In this last month a major vulnerability in Internet Explorer was exposed and there was even a US and UK government suggestion that people stop using it (http://tinyurl.com/oledmlf). Despite what some thought, this affected all versions of IE and not just those on the now end of life no longer supported XP platform.

Those of you who are avid readers of this column and who follow it's wholesome advice would, of course, have given a self-satisfied chuckle safe in the knowledge your default browser was something other than IE and that you had turned off java and flash to further reduce standard attack points.

Last month we ended with the observation that you can avoid a "cross-site request forgery (CSRF or XSRF)" attack by opening the link in a 'private' or incognito tab or window - but we didn't discuss why. This month I'll answer that question and explain about private browsing.

Every time you visit website you get 'cookies' stored in your browser. Some of these cookies are useful. For example, they track you when you click through from the shopping portal and ensure we get our commission. Cookies are used to keep track of you as you move through the website as you add stuff to your shopping cart and so on. They have their uses. However they are also used by advertisers to track your journey through the internet and that is why, for example, if you have checked out 'holidays in America', as you browse other sites, all adverts are related to holidays in America.

What private browsing does is create a new browser instance which has no cookies associated with it on start-up and, subsequently, it deletes all associated cookies 'captured' in that browsing session on closure. So, you have a 'previous browser history' free browsing.

This is useful for numerous reasons.

Reason 1: Your internet search is not subjective to 'interpretation/contamination' based on your previous searches;

Reason 2: Any sites which use cookies as determining whether how many pages/ articles your looked at in a time period can't track this and you start with a clean slate each time;

Reason 3: Advertising isn't based on your previous searches;

Reason 4: And, for those with things to hide, your search history is not kept. In fact, I habitually use private browsing these days – not for the last reason I hasten to add.

Each private browsing window exists in its own little environment. To get private browsing, in Chrome select the three horizontal dashes to the far right of where you type in the url and select 'New incognito window'. In the latest version of Firefox (which seems to have emulated Chrome) it's the same the three horizontal dashes to the far right of where you type in the url but 'new private window'. Safari and Internet Explorer use the settings 'cog' in place of the three horizontal dashes . With Safari select 'Private Browsing'. IE on the other hand, makes it harder. From the cog, select 'Safety' and then 'Inprivate browsing'.

So, why does private browsing stop "cross-site request forgery" (CSRF or XSRF) attacks? The answer is 'sessions'. A session is defined by cookies and is a connection to the server. So, try this experiment: Go to a site where you have to log-on (I used eBay) and log-on. Then (in my case using Chrome with Flash and Java disabled!) use the menu (three horizontal dashes or cog) to open a new window or tab. Go the same site and you will be logged on automatically because the browser has picked up the session cookie and you are in the same session and therefore logged on. Clearly, if there are no previous cookies because it's a private/incognito browser session, you are not logged on. This is why, if you open a linked using the private/incognito browser option, a cross-site request forgery wouldn't work – you are not logged on.

Two notes:

Note 1: IE has, on the 'File' menu a 'New session' option. Hopefully, by now, this is self-explanatory. For those who haven't followed the discussion, this means that it's a new session (i.e. you won't be logged on) but you will have the legacy cookies (i.e. your previous searches will affect adverts).

Note 2: If you are using cookies blocking software or private browsing, the cookies which track your clicks from the shopping portal will not be registered (unless, in the later case, you click through and purchase in the same session).

So, moving on, over the next few months I plan to upgrade an old XP laptop to Ubuntu (the free Linux based operating system) and I'll discuss why advertisers and website operators are trying to move away from cookies and what the future potentially holds.

In the meantime please use the shopping portal for your online shopping www.shirenewtonshop.com and don't block your cookies there.

Extracts from the minutes of the May meetings
At the Annual Meeting the current Chair, Councillor Ian Moore, retained the seat for a further year and Councillor Paul Harris was elected as Vice Chair.

Planning

DC/2014/00425 Westfield Cottage, Mynyddbach
Proposed extension and alterations.
 As the alterations are sympathetic to the existing property and there were no objections from neighbours the Council recommended approval.

2. DC/2014/00387 Improvement of the entrance to track leading to former Whitemill, Welsh Water treatment works, Mynyddbach Entrance to be widened requiring the removal of a mature oak tree. Council recommended refusal of this application with the following observations: This treatment works is closed so why is there a need for the entrance to be altered? When the works was in operation it was serviced by large vehicles via the current entrance. There were serious concerns regarding the removal of the mature oak tree which is subject to a Tree Preservation Order, as it was felt that this would not improve visibility and three neighbours had objected to this. Removal of the tree would not improve safety as no accidents have been recorded at this location.

Council would be prepared to reconsider a more inclusive application in the future.

- 3. DC/2014/00108 'Oslo', Old School Lane, Mynyddbach Erection of 1 pair of semi-detached dwellings and a bungalow with additional works. To allow for closer consideration this application was deferred to the June meeting.
- 4. DC/2014/00494 Upper House, Earlswood Road, Shirenewton Removal of redundant chimney at rear of property, replace roof tiles to blend in with existing roof, install guttering in line with existing guttering. Council recommended approval.
- 5. DC/2014/00486 5 Tan House Court, Shirenewton Ground Floor remove existing prefabricated garage and build a replacement extension incorporating a utility room, garden store and double garage. Lower Ground Floor extend an existing bedroom to include an en-suite and walk-in wardrobe. Alter existing utility and bathroom to a new kitchen area and erect an 1800mm fence to part of the boundary.

There had been requests that the fence be lowered from 6' to 5' but Council were informed by the applicant that they had been advised by Mon CC that the fence was not subject to planning permission. Council recommended approval.

6. DC/2014/00511 1 Oakview Cottages, Mynyddbach Create a single storey garage which will be attached to the house including internal access via the current porch on a corner of the existing driveway. To allow for closer consideration this application was deferred to the June meeting.

Items of local concern Best Kept Village Competition 2014

All will now be in place and Councillors wished to thank all the residents that have worked hard and contributed to making Shirenewton look so beautiful this year. Please continue with the good work throughout June, when the judging takes place. Particular thanks go to Councillor Tony Hughes for co-ordinating the tidy up for the first time this year. We hope the judges appreciate the efforts made. We should know the results of the competition in September.

Update on traffic calming proposals.

The Working Party proposal has been submitted to Highways and further revisions have been made. CC G Down is expecting to hold a further Working Party meeting in early June, resulting in public viewing of the proposals by mid-June. He also confirmed that speed of traffic and safety concerns at Mynyddbach will be taken into account. The road will not be resurfaced within the next couple of months.

Signage at Weyloed Lane has been received by Mon CC and will be included in an upcoming work schedule.

FAIRTRADE NEWS

Earlier this year the face of Fairtrade Fortnight was Foncho - Albeiro Alfonso Cantillo, a 44 year old banana farmer from the Coobrafrio Cooperative in the Magdalena region of Colombia. This cooperative began selling their bananas in the



Fairtrade market two years ago, which has secured the farmers' livelihoods and improved immeasurably the quality of their lives.

Cheap bananas are threatening farmers' futures. In the last 10 years, a bitter price war has seen the UK supermarket sector almost halve the price of loose bananas while the cost of producing them has doubled. Bananas seem to be the 'loss leader' of choice for a lot of supermarkets, with the losses largely borne by the producers. The Co-Op and Waitrose are amongst the honourable exceptions to this rule. Apparently one in three bananas sold in the UK is fairly traded. Generally people feel that bananas are one product that is regularly associated with fair trade, along with coffee, tea and chocolate. There is no doubt the market for these products has grown enormously in the last few years, but nevertheless it is sobering to note that Fairtrade products still represent less than one percent of global trade in most categories.

Juliet Arku-Mensah works for VREL (Volta River Estates Ltd) in south-east Ghana. She explains how the workers vote to decide how the Fairtrade premium will be spent. Some has been used for specially treated mosquito nets, and some on ensuring there is a clean water supply. A hospital block has been built, and a health insurance premium has been paid for. Some of the women have been able to add to their income, receiving training and using small loans to start up small businesses such as soap making, and cloth weaving.

So much can be achieved, with a relatively tiny extra outlay on our part!

Concerns from Members of the Public

These issues were dealt with next. Apparently there are worries about the speed of the traffic coming up Old School Hill and going round that sharp right-angled bend. It was suggested that a sign of an adult holding a small child's hand might be employed to remind people not to go so fast.

Police Report. No police, so no report. Maybe they had forgotten that our meeting was this week. Or maybe there was no crime.

Planning

1. DC/2014/00425 Westfield Cottage, Proposed extension and alterations.

The plans show a single storey extension to the front that will match and is in keeping and so Approval was Recommended 2. DC/2014/00387 Improvement of the entrance to track leading to former Whitemill, Welsh Water treatment works, Mynyddbach. Entrance to be widened requiring the removal of a mature oak tree. But this oak tree has a Preservation Order on it! Also one of the councilors reminded the meeting that when the water treatment plant was in operation, vehicles had used the drive quite easily and hadn't been inconvenienced by the tree at all. So why is this plan before the council? The waterworks is now not used. Maybe something is in the offing... someone suggested darkly that it might be planning by stealth. So watch this space. And the Tree. REFUSAL was Recommended. Most Strongly.

3. DC/2014/00494 Upper House, Earlswood Road, Shirenewton Removal of a redundant chimney. The councilors looked out of the rec window, saw the offending chimney and said no problem. Remove it. 4. DC/2014/00486 5 Tan House Court, Shirenewton Ground Floor — to remove existing prefabricated garage and build a replacement extension incorporating a utility room, garden store and double garage. There was some discussion about a fence along the footpath but the plans were Recommended for Approval.

The Best Kept Village Competition. Cllr Hughes produced a long list of jobs to do of the hacking, spraying chopping, mowing, trimming, cutting, weeding, sweeping variety. This is to be completed by 1st of June. The judges will make two visitations during the month. The weeds of Earlswood, Newchurch West and Mynnyddbach can relax. But the weeds of Shirenewton be afraid. Be very afraid. Jeyes Fluid is on its way.

Poor Land Field. Good heavens — do we have something to report? But yes! The registration application has been accepted and will be dealt with — wait for it... 'as soon a possible'.

The Play Area. The good news? The Horse's head has been replaced. The bad news? It's body is tatty.

Communal Web Portal. No progress this month. Well there's a surprise. The Portal is stumbling over the problems of 'Welsh Government Compliance in Bilingualism, Accessibility and Mobile Compatibility'. I reckon by the time this is up and running, technology will have developed a completely new way of communicating information thus making this proposed Portal as up to date as a new feathered quill. And talking of modern communication, news on the Telephone Kiosk. A Big Lottery grant of £1213 has been awarded to help toward the refurbishment. I think it's going to be turned into an information centre...

Damaged Keep Left Bollard. A new Keep Left Bollard is on order. But there has been some sort of inexplicable delay.

Traffic Calming Proposals. Signage for the top and bottom of Weyloed Lane. The signs are ready – but they just have to be slotted into a time schedule...but there's been anoh dear...

The Potholes in Mynnyddbach have not been done properly and have been poorly patched. Sadly, it's not a priority to have them repatched in the near future.

And now the nonsense of Noise Monitoring on the Usk Road. There is No equipment to monitor and measure noise on the Usk Road. It seems that the original noise-monitoring machines supplied some months ago were not 'fit for purpose'. They could best measure the noise of the motorbikes when stationary. Excuse me? The next meeting will be on Monday 2^{nd} June at 7.30 at The Rec. Members of the public are, of course, welcome to attend!



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



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5 foods to help make you happy.



Broccoli

Broccoli contains the mineral chromium, which helps to regulate moods and make you happy.

Other foods that contain chromium are:-

NERYS'S NATTY NOSH

Lemon Ginger Salmon. Serves two



Ingredients

2 salmon fillets

2 teaspoons olive oil

Zest of a lemon, 1 tablespoon lemon juice

2 tablespoon fresh grated ginger

1 teaspoon honey

Method

- 1 Preheat the oven to 200C / 400F Gas 6.
- 2 Rub the salmon with 1 teaspoon of olive oil.
- **3** In A small bowl, mix the lemon zest, lemon juice, remaining 1 teaspoon olive oil, ginger and honey. Brush evenly over the top of the salmon.
- 4 Bake for 10 12 minutes.

Serve with pasta or boiled new potatoes, and salad or vegetables of your choice.

Hummus serves 6

Ingredients

2 x400g can chick peas, drained

2-3 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped

1 tablespoon tahini

3 tablespoon olive oil

Juice of 1 lemon

Seasoning

Method

- **1** Blend the chick peas, garlic, tahini and olive oil in a food processor until smooth.
- 2 Taste and if need be add seasoning.
- 3 Serve in a dish.

Tips

Other ingredients can be added to the hummus. Make a choice.

Chopped coriander: - chives, parsley, red pepper, chillies or red onion.

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


Broccoli and cabbage slaw with raisins serves 4
