

Planning applications considered at September meeting

1. DC/2014/00857 Laurel Cottage, Earlswood

Amendment to approved drawings to erect annexe to cottage and replace flat roof with a pitched roof to cottage. Recommendation: Approval

2. DC/2014/00736 Well Cottage, Earlswood

Variation of Condition 1 on DC/2008/01365 to extend period in which consent can be commenced. Recommendation: Approval

3. DC/2014/00774 Hillside House, Shirenewton

Erection of a two storey extension to improve accommodation.

Council noted that the proposal is not obtrusive; there is no increase in height; materials will be used that match existing and no objections have been received.

Recommendation: Approval

4. DC/2014/00980 Hillside House, Usk Road, Shirenewton

Erection of an agricultural shed, including the provision of an access drive. Council noted that this is a conventional shed for the purpose of wood storage for a biomass boiler; it is not visible from the Usk Road; there are no Rights of Way issues and access will be via a spur from the access into the field.

Recommendation: Approval

5. DC/2014/00939 Rhewl Farm, Shirenewton.

Provision of photovoltaic solar park and ancillary infrastructure.

Council noted that although the property is within the Mathern community, we are being consulted as much of the land falls within the Shirenewton community. A working party was formed to consider this complex application and visit the site. Clerk to contact Mathern CC for details of the next meeting, also Planning Dept to request an extension to the consultation period.

Extracts from the minutes

Best Kept Village Competition 2014 - Council has been invited to the Presentation Evening on 19th September, but will not know until then of the winning categories.

Telephone kiosk - the kiosk has been refurbished and is to be returned to its site on Saturday 6 September. Clerk to obtain quotes for provision of notice board and shelving.

Update on traffic calming proposals - C Cllr Down advised that responses made at the public exhibition on 15 July had been analysed and a summary submitted to Mon CC Highways Department.

Wild Flower planting 2015 - Clirs Hughes and Morton have measured the Crick Road and verges at The Spout - approx 70 square metres. Two areas in Mynyddbach (village green and play area at Blethyn Close) were considered to be unsuitable as they are areas well used by members of the public and well maintained by Mon CC and local residents. Other suggested sites - the bus shelter at Spout Hill to Postman's Lane, Cock-a-Roosting triangle, area around bus shelter at Gaerllwyd crossroads and top road junction to Earlswood. Clerk to contact Mon CC with suggested areas and offer to contribute £100 towards wildflower seed.

Parish Magazine - Whilst the Council appreciates that the notes of meetings that appear in the Parish Magazine are a light hearted take on the formal business of Council meetings, concern and disappointment were expressed over the particularly flippant and some felt disparaging nature of the article in the September issue.

Correction to last month's article - It was wrongly reported that the owner of 'Oslo', Mynyddbach had not contributed towards the maintenance of the unadopted lane, when in fact they had. Apologies for the error.

SHIRENEWTON WI SEPTEMBER 2014

September can be a lovely month, this year it is doing better than most of August. Plenty of good dry weather and lots of fruit especially the blackberries. Our meeting was chaired by Diane Ward as Jenny, although on the mend, was not quite up to it yet. We started with a talk from Auriol about our last founder member, Gladys Lloyd, who had sadly passed away in August. It was good to hear of the early days of our WI and Gladys's part, a very active member for so many years.

Our speaker for September was Mr Andrew Griffith, with a talk about Hypnotherapy. Mr Griffith practices locally using hypnotherapy and relaxation techniques to help people with a whole host of problems.

Mr Griffith told us of the history of hypnotherapy and its use to help patients with operations before anaesthetics became available. Nowadays the techniques are used to help people who are nervous and people suffering post-traumatic stress benefit from its use. Mr Griffith said we all experience going into a type of trance when concentrating on something, most people have experienced getting somewhere on 'auto-pilot' or have been unaware of what's going on around because they were 'daydreaming'. It's very natural for people to experience a short term trance state. By using relaxation techniques and hypnotherapy unwanted symptoms brought about by stress, fear etc. can be relieved, it's not always necessary to be in a deep trance to get results just well relaxed. People in a trance state tend to believe positive ideas which fit with what they want. Mr Griffith sometimes makes a recording so that the client can play it through at home and gain further benefit. The techniques can help with habits, coping with pain, irritable bowel syndrome, anxiety before events and phobias. Mr Griffith told us that hypnotherapy is very different from the hypnosis performed as an act for entertainment, so no one was going to be hypnotised but he did show us a little of how his techniques work. We all found his talk very interesting, plenty of questions were asked and his number noted for future reference.

October the 9th we will be having a talk by 'the Fudge Fairy' about her lovely fudge and sweets.

November the 13th Mr William Clarke will give us a talk about his experience of arranging the Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall.

STARGAZING

As it is now getting darker earlier there are more opportunities for stargazing. The slightly orange-coloured planet Mars can be seen in the evening sky. It lies just above the south-west horizon as it gets dark. On the 28th the crescent Moon is directly above Mars. In the early morning, the bright planet Jupiter is in the south-eastern sky. On the 18th the crescent Moon is just below the planet.

The constellation of Cygnus the Swan lies pretty much directly above. It is in the shape of a cross – in fact it is sometimes called the Northern Cross. According to legend, Jupiter the king of the Gods changed himself into a swan when he wanted to visit Leda, the wife of the King of Sparta. In memory of the episode, he placed a swan in the sky. The seven stars of the Plough are to the North and the four stars forming the Great Square of Pegasus lie to the South. The W-shape of Cassiopeia lies fairly high in the sky to the North-East. In Roman mythology Cassiopeia was a queen chained to her throne as a punishment for being boastful, whilst the Chinese considered the constellation looked like a path through mountains.

Edward Lowe, a Victorian gentleman-scientist lived at Shirenewton Hall from 1880 until his death in 1900. Although renowned for his contributions to meteorology and to botany, in particular ferns, he was also interested in astronomy. In particular he studied the "haloes" that sometimes form around the Moon and Sun, and sun-spots. His memorial plaque in Shirenewton Church records his wide interests – he was a Fellow of the Royal Society, the Royal Astronomical Society, the Meteorological Society and the Linnaean Society. GARDENING CORNER

The night's have closed in markedly in recent days and there is definitely an 'autumn tinge' to many of the trees around the countryside. Most of the hard work associated with growing crops is now all but over, apart from a few exceptions and attention starts to turn towards autumn clean ups and other maintenance jobs. Hedge-cutting is high on the list of tidy up jobs, but as many of our boundary hedges are old mixed species hedges, they are a food larder for species such as dormice. This area seems to be a stronghold for this endearing little species, and so I'm reluctant to cut away the hazel nuts, blackberries and other fruits that this little tree dwelling rodent requires in order to build up food reserves for the winter hibernation period. So my attentions at this time are directed at the beech hedges that we planted many years ago to break up the internal structure of the garden. There are also areas that have suffered because I haven't had the time in recent years to keep them as part of our managed garden. These are now bramble patches and ash tree woodlands and desperately need cutting and cleaning. Because of the size of the garden I have strict instructions not to turn them all back to what I call proper productive garden. So some will be cleared, kept clean and then probably replanted with a wild flower meadow mix. I've been very impressed with the efforts of both Newport and Monmouth councils with their wild flower sowings this year. Certainly from the honey bee point of view these would act as a great nectar bank. In recent years I have increased the number of raised beds that grow flowers for cutting, which has meant that the area of productive vegetable gardening has decreased. To some degree this is OK as often we have too much and the freezers can't take any more. However I will need to return some of this wild area back to productive beds, as this will give me the opportunity to actually rest a couple of beds each year and build up their fertility. One of my main problems remains time! I had planned to take partial retirement in October, but things are conspiring against this at present, but I have put a marker down with the management that March is the final deadline for a decision. I'll need to know before the new gardening year and fishing season!

In the vegetable garden I have started clearing some of the beds as crops are harvested. Trying not to replace crops of a similar type to avoid disease problems, I have cleared some of the beds which grew beans and peas, and replanted these with the autumn garlic. In theory these beds should have been replanted with green crops such as cabbage and Brussels sprouts. This is because the peas and beans lock nitrogen in their roots, which remain in the soil to feed leaf crops. However the particular beds I'm dealing with have developed club root over recent years and so not suited to these crops any more. In recent years the seed companies have developed so called 'club root' resistant varieties, which I have yet to try. Maybe next year, but for the time being I plant the greens on areas that I know are clean – at least for the time being!

The main areas requiring work at present are in the tunnels and greenhouses. The large tunnel in particular requires a little tender loving care, but unfortunately because of the weather staying pretty warm, it is almost too hot to work in there during the day! The tomatoes have not done too well. We grew a large variety, especially for cooking, and despite growing well to begin with, many of the fruits have split and started to go rotten, before they ripened. We have had several large pickings from them, but with so many fruits going rotten I think that they need to go. We have had a number of problems with mildew and other fungal diseases this year. Some of this is the warm moist weather, but another problem is that one of the areas that has 'got out of hand' is at the end of the tunnel and this is I'm sure, stopping the air circulating, hence the problems. This will therefore be one of the first areas to be cleared. I planted some perpetual fruiting strawberries earlier in the year in large grow-bags and these are still cropping even as we reach the end of September, This will be replanted in one of the areas currently under tomatoes, whilst the rest will be planted with early spring broccoli and some lettuce. The large greenhouse is still producing cucumbers, but the melons never did anything. All were meant to be 'grafted' plants that I bought in May. Whilst the cucumbers were definitely grafted I was never convinced with the melons and this proved to be correct when all three just wilted over night – the problem I always used to get from seed sown melons, raised at home. So a complaint will be heading in the seed company's direction I think – especially as grafted plants are not cheap to buy!

This year continues to be an up and down one for the bees. The large swarm that I gathered in June has done exceptionally well. I have taken about 50lbs of honey from them and have decided to leave the rest for the winter as the hive is particularly big, still carrying a lot of bees. As with the others I noticed that the bees are still bringing in plenty of pollen which suggests that the queens are still egg laying well. With a couple of 'supers' from two other hives it has meant that I have extracted over 100lbs of honey, the most for a long time. The one hive that I mentioned as always struggling has given up the ghost as expected. You may also remember that one was gueen-less as well and really struggling. I had placed a frame of young eggs and grubs, as described in earlier articles, but it didn't seem to make a difference. However I was putting some treatment (for the varroa mite) into the hives a couple of weeks ago, and before wasting the treatment, checked to see what was going on. Remarkably they had made several queen cells, so I placed the treatment in the hive and am keeping my fingers crossed that a queen will hatch. It is still extremely unlikely that the colony will build any numbers up before winter to allow them to survive, but this will depend on the weather over the next few weeks. Their honey supplies are quite good as the works have continued to bring honey in whilst they sorted the leadership issue out, but time will tell.

<u>Commemoration Concert for</u> <u>World War 1 outbreak, 1914</u>

Chepstow Choral Society will commemorate the centenary of the commencement of World War 1, August 4th 1914, with a programme of appropriate music, choral items and readings


The programme will include contributions from students of Chepstow Comprehensive School and the 1st Battalion Rifles based at Beachley Barracks.






Avocado, Pear with Ginger dressing Serves 2

Ingredients

1 ripe avocado and 1 ripe pear Mixed lettuce leaves

Chopped walnuts to garnish

Dressing

1/2 tsp grated orange rind

3 tbsp fresh orange juice

1 level tsp mustard powder

- 1 level tsp honey
- 2 tbsp olive oil

1/4 tsp ground ginger or 1/2 tsp grated fresh ginger

Seasoning

Method

- **1** Whisk together the dressing ingredients.
- **2** Peel and stone the avocado, peel and core the pear, cut each into eight segments. Divide the lettuce between two plates. Add the avocado and pear segments.
- **3** Pour over the dressing and garnish with the chopped walnuts.
- 4 Serve immediately. Enjoy!




