FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear People of the Parish,

By tradition at this time of year I get grumpy.

Sandra will retort, "So, what's new? It is in keeping with the rest of the year." More generous parishioners will say "Hear we go again. Another rant about how commercialism threatens to engulf the spiritual message associated with Christmastide."

However, this time I am feeling markedly different. I feel sad and angry. This has to do with the recent atrocities we have seen promulgated in Paris, and more recently, in Mali. The loss of innocent lives, the acute bereavement felt by many and the haunting fear experienced by even more humans stands in stark contrast to the sense of benign wonderment and of peace generated as we stand on the brink of the Christmas season.

This statement, I know, reflects a Christian take on the significance of this time of year. Countless others (those who I have been quick to criticise in previous years, in fact) nevertheless see it as a time of affirming what is best about the human condition. A display of love and fellowship towards others – never mind the religious connotations – is held to be important and it would be mean-spirited of us to say that it is all very well in that this rises to the surface on this one occasion in the calendar.

One of the most profound statements to emerge from the recent horrors - and it carries huge gravitas in that it comes from someone directly bereaved - is the composition from a Frenchman, reflecting on the sudden and barbaric loss of his wife and mother of their young child. His thoughts concerning what had happened and his ability to put it in some type of context, speak far more eloquently than many sermons from the pulpit at this time of the year ever will. He considers that the hatred shown by the aggressors, and the barbarity which resulted, lessens the cause of the perpetrators and increases the dignity of the victims. In like manner we should be compassionate towards innocent parents of suicide-bombers who share the bewilderment and horror of the majority of societies.

We are reminded by recent outrages that there is also a darkness associated by those of us who subscribe to the Christian faith in the significance of Christmas. It isn't all about cute babies and angels flapping about. The Biblical account also concerns the butchery of young children, flight and exile.

It, surely, is unconvincing to claim that all will be well sometime in the future, in heaven, when we are no longer part of this physical world. More pertinent perhaps, to be reminded that for every terrorist or Adolf Hitler there is a considerable number of everyday human beings who consider (and practice) sensitivity, care and selflessness on a daily basis. In this life in and this world they manifest – perhaps hesitantly – what lies at the very centre of the nature of God: Love.

It would seem a little crass at this point to move onto indicating what festive plans are afoot for our churches in the group. Notice of these can be found elsewhere in this magazine.

Please remember before God those who have lost their lives, and those who have lost those dear to them..



Extracts from the minutes of the November meeting

Council received and reluctantly accepted a letter of resignation from Councillor T Hughes effective from 6.10.15, he was sincerely thanked for his contribution and service to the Council.

There are now two vacant positions for Community Councillors for the ward of Shirenewton – if you are interested in applying for one of these vacancies, please contact the Clerk (details below).

Planning applications considered -

1. DC/2015/00847 Gaerllwyd Barn amendment to drainage. The amendment from a cesspool to a sceptic tank would seem sensible providing the required porosity test proves that the ground can accommodate the suggested herringbone drainage from the sceptic tank outfall. However it must be stressed that the ground outside the proposed development must not be disturbed when laying the drainage pipe work or indeed during any building process as a Neolithic chambered tomb is close by which is a Scheduled Ancient Monument.

This Council recommended approval with a watching brief from an organisation such as the Glamorgan Archaelogical Trust.

2. DC/2015/01086 Bluebell Farm, Usk Road to Buckwell Road, Penycaemawr

Council noted that four previous planning applications had been approved. Also that the farmhouse is an eyesore that does not provide practical living accommodation. The proposal is to build on the same site, but at a 45 degree angle, with the footprint being 4% less than existing. There is also a proposal to build a new garage to replace an existing tractor shed. Building materials to be traditional natural stone. This Council recommended approval.

The monthly police report – During the month there were five reports concerning vehicles, two minor vehicle collisions (one near the Huntsman and one at the Tredegar Arms) and three reports of sheds being broken into in the Earlswood/ Penycaemawr area. There were three calls to Brookacre.

Clerk to request an update from PC L Thorpe.

Items of local concern -

Update on traffic calming scheme - A response had been received from G Kinsella of Highways to advise that white lining is not planned for the centre of Shirenewton. **Mr P Keeble of Highways Dept, Mon CC had agreed to attend the December meeting to discuss traffic calming**. County Cllr Down confirmed that he is in discussion with the police regarding a public meeting on a community speed watch initiative, also with Highways regarding a traffic speed and volume assessment through Shirenewton. He further confirmed that the funding for this scheme was brought forward into this year's budget but that costs were over budget.

The Working Party arranged last month will hold its first meeting on 11.11.15.

County Clir Down reported that Mon CC's budget gap is likely to be around £1.7 million which will mean potential withdrawal from non-essential services such as libraries, museums, public toilets, street cleaning, etc. this has implications for the future budget setting of town and community councils within the county.

Letter from Nick Ramsay AM regarding proposed changes to abolish the county of Monmouthshire and merge it with Blaenau Gwent, Caerphilly, Torfaen and Newport, creating a super-region of almost 600,000 people.

Footpath closures - information received from S Pritchard, RoW Officer, Mon CC on the temporary closure of public paths in Wentwood for forestry harvesting from 10 November 2015 to 6 April 2016. SP to meet with NRW re. keeping alternative routes open as the area is well used by the public – Clerk to monitor.

That's the result of the speed test I just did. Happiness is a man with 37.5Mb – trust me I know these things.

Thanks to the wet and windy weekends (and, of course, the vastly improved upload speed of Infinity) I've almost

caught up with the new Church website and, now, all main pages are in the new format. There is still a bit on tinkering to do which I'm sure will happen over the winter months. Take a look. As a reminder the site is fully responsive – i.e. it's designed to work across all devices and will automatically adjust its presentation to fit the format of the viewing device, whether that be a phone, tablet or laptop.

Remember the site has lots of community information and links including links to useful traffic sites and local 'jam cams'.

The latest security item to cross my desk concerns boarding passes. I'm sure most of you shred or otherwise destroy your credit card receipts and any other pieces of paper with personal information on - but I'll bet you just chuck the old boarding pass in the bin without a moment's thought. Well this article (http://tinyurl.com/q4vs2ew) explains why this is a bad idea. The bar codes on boarding passes actually contain quite a lot of information about you. Your surname, record locator (confirmation code) and your frequent flyer number amongst other stuff. With two pieces of information from that list it is trivial to get into your airline account and read all your future flights as well as possibly update your details. So, shred your boarding passes and don't post pictures of them on any public forum – including Facebook!

And so we come to the time of year when lots of spending appears to be de rigueur. Forecasts suggest that online retailers in UK will see Christmas sales grow by over 16 per cent this year when compared to last year. If you are spending online this year please consider accessing the shops via www.shirenewtonshop.com. It won't cost you anymore and the church will get a kick back. There are around 200 shops of the portal including many high street brands such as Argos, Debenhams, Screwfix, Tescos, etc.

So far this year the website has earned just over £544. As always that is cash paid into the church account. There is money in various accounts waiting to be paid out so I expect to end the year at around the £800 mark. This is down on last year's

£1,202. I suspect several factors are to blame. Retailers are being squeezed and reducing commissions. More security products are implementing 'do not track' so, even if you do click through from the church website the sale doesn't register. If your security product does include a do not track capability I suggest you turn it off when purchasing via the church website.

So all it remains for me to do is wish all the readers a Happy Christmas and a great New Year. See you all in 2016.

STARGAZING

In the evening to the southeast, the constellation Orion is a glorious sight – three bright stars make up his belt; two stars are his shoulders, and two more make his legs. Orion was the great hunter of Greek Mythology who boasted that he could kill any creature on earth – but he met his match in the scorpion, which stung him in the heel and killed him. The bright blue-



white star in Orion's right leg is Rigel, an extremely powerful star but at great distance, it is at least 60,000 times more luminous than the Sun. The bright star at Orion's left shoulder is Betelgeuse (pronounce it "beetle-juice" and you'll be close enough). Betelgeuse has a reddish colour – it is a vast red super-giant star, large enough to contain the entire path of the Earth round the Sun. Hanging from Orion's belt is his sword. One of the stars in the sword appears fuzzy compared with other stars and is well worth looking at through binoculars. This is the Orion Nebula and is a huge cloud of gas and dust. It is one of the most intense regions of star formation visible in our galaxy.

In the early morning sky the brilliant planet Venus is just above the horizon in the south-east, whilst Jupiter is higher in the southern sky. Mars is less bright, placed roughly half-way between the two bright planets, and is just above a bright star called Spica. The crescent Moon is just below Jupiter on the morning of 4th December, near Mars on the 6th and above Venus on the 7th. There are no planets visible in the evening sky before midnight this month.

We reach the Winter Solstice on Dec 22nd. The Sun reaches its lowest point in the heavens as observed in the northern hemisphere. This gives the shortest day and the longest night.

Shirenewton looses one of it's oldest residents

On the 23rd of April 2013 one of our mature Oak tree's was uprooted in the Great Storm!

After clearing up

the mess, the remaining parts were left. The children's swing remained and some large but sound branches were left overhanging the footpath.





Just recently we became aware that one of these branches was beginning to break up, so the decision was made to cut the tree down to a safe size, still leaving the swing.

We estimate this Oak tree was in the region of 110 years old. It is sobering thought that when this Oak tree began its life around 1905:

- * Edward VII was King
- * East Coast gales: Great Yarmouth flooded and pier at Scarborough washed away.
- * Alf Common becomes the first £1,000 footballer in his transfer from Sheffield United to Middlesbrough.
- * First public protest by suffragettes, led by Emmeline Pankhurst, at Westminster.
- * First performance of George Bernard Shaw's 1903 play Man and Superman at the Royal Court Theatre, London.
- * GPO London to Brighton horse-drawn parcel post coach makes its last run, being replaced by a motor lorry the following day.
- * Automobile Association inaugurated.
- * National Colliery disaster at Wattstown in the Rhondda: an underground explosion kills 120, with just one survivor.
- * Henry Wood first conducts a performance of his Fantasia on British Sea Songs at a Trafalgar Day concert in London.
- * Aspirin sold in the UK for the first time.
- * Irish nationalist Arthur Griffith founds Sinn Féin in Dublin as a political party whose goal is independence for all of Ireland.

We were treated to an inspiring Christmas card making session by our own resident arts and craft expert, Diana Such.


Diana showed samples of 'some-I-made-earlier' Christmas cards,

GARDENING CORNER

As I sit here writing this we are suffering another period where the jet stream has shifted so it is sitting right on top of us, bringing the inevitable rain belts day after day. The ground is now completely sodden so there won't be any digging for a few weeks. If the weather improves a bit I will take the opportunity to cut the remaining hedges and also prune the various fruit trees. These jobs can be done anytime now over the coming months, but there is always a sense of satisfaction if you can get them done sooner rather than later.

Looking on the bright side, the high winds will hopefully finish blowing all the leaves off the trees. Not that I spend ages clearing leaves up, but I do have to spend an odd hour here and there blowing the leaves off our driveway. Mainly because they block all the drainage channels, which then results in the water running down the drive it's self. Fortunately we were able to concrete this earlier this year, so we don't get the problems we once did, with the water washing the road away on a regular basis.

So with little to do outside, attention has turned to inside jobs and planning for next year. The small tunnel has been completely cleared of any crops. I was going to plant it up with calabrese for early crops next year, but have used it as a stacking area for sawn timber. This has been drying for several weeks and is now ready for painting with timber preservative. So whilst it is raining outside, I'm snugly tucked up inside. The timber will then be ready for repairing the raised beds in the vegetable garden and creating some new ones as mentioned previously. The large tunnel is also going through a transformation. I have pruned the two apricots and nectarine trees, so these are now looking tidy. I've also been through the strawberry bed, removing all the unwanted runners and weeding as I've gone. As soon as the weather improves a bit I'll spread a little manure, to help give the crop a head start for next year. I need to source a supply of 'leaky hose' so that I can lay this among the plants, before spreading some straw. The latter won't be done until early spring, but hopefully doing this will result in more and better crops next year. This year we lost a lot of the crop because of mildew, which isn't helped by overhead watering. I won't linger on the squirrel problems we had last year. Suffice to say that I will be trying to control their numbers during the winter months! Still to be sorted in this tunnel are a couple of beds with tomatoes in. These have finished producing, but I just haven't had the time to get in and sort them out yet. I may get around to this later today and will attempt to clear the greenhouse out at the same time. I prefer to do this cleaning up as early as possible as the vegetation only harbours pests and diseases, so the sooner everything is cleared out the better.

Half of the large greenhouse, where I have staging, is full of young plants, many of which should have been planted out for next year flowering. The wallflowers, Sweet Williams and violas have been re-potted into larger pots and will stand for a

few months. It's obviously too wet to do anything at the moment, but hopefully I can get them out in the New Year. I took delivery of some new raspberry plants a couple of weeks ago, and also some new blueberries. I will have to earth the raspberries in for a few weeks as I need to get the old fruit cage sorted out again. Hopefully it won't be like the last ones I bought which, three years later are still growing where they were earthed in. As my old school reports used to say "Stephen could do better if he would only try"!

The blueberries are in small pots so for now I can just re-pot these into larger ones, using ericaceous (acidic) compost. These may have a few berries this year, but I'm really looking for the following year before they really start producing. The older plants we have are still in pots, but some of these are relatively old varieties and they just do not produce fruit of any size. Some of the newer varieties are phenomenally productive/ The berries are fantastic eaten fresh, but are equally good when frozen, especially when defrosted and mixed with a few raspberries and then served on top of some meringue nests (I would recommend M&S!). I can just taste them now!

The seed catalogues have been sitting on the side table for several months now, so I really must get my act together and get everything sorted and ordered up for next year. This usually takes a couple of hours as I try to source the best varieties from several producers. I inevitably end up double ordering on some things, but I usually find a home for the crop somewhere or other. It is the time of year when I reflect on what has done well and what not so well, and then try new varieties, or quite often go back to old ones that have stood the test of time. One crop I have never tried is sweet potato. Although expensive to buy I am tempted to give them a try.

Cropping wise we have been steadily picking green kale for several weeks. This will continue to crop into the winter months, and has always proved super hardy. Leeks, parsnips, carrots, turnips, swedes and celeriac are all helping to vary our daily vegetable intake. We have now started picking the first brussel sprouts too to add a little more variety. We have almost finished the last of the early potatoes, so will be starting on the main crop before the end of the month. There are still a couple of crops to harvest, but these need better weather. The bean seeds that are for drying are looking particularly bedraggled, and I may not actually be able

to harvest them if this rain continues. The other is the Jerusalem artichoke. The tops have now died off, but I desperately need to dig the tuners out of the ground before they start to rot or attract too much attention from the slug population. It is still raining outside, so time to don the coat and get down to the tunnel for timber treating.

We hope you and your family have a great Christmas and look forward to the new gardening year. Happy gardening until then.

Nerys's Natty Nosh



The Bundt cake derives in part from a European brioche-like cake called *Gugelhupf* which was particularly popular among Jewish communities. Opinions differ as to the significance of the word *Bund*. One possibility is that it means "bunch" or "bundle", and refers to the way the dough is bundled around the tubed center of the pan. Another source suggests that it describes the banded appearance given to the cake by the fluted sides of the pan, similar to a tied sheaf or bundle of wheat.

Ingredients

225 grams soft butter (plus more for greasing) or Soya Margarine 300 grams caster sugar

6 large eggs

350 grams plain flour

1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

250 grams plain fat-free yoghurt or Soya Margarine

4 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 tablespoons icing sugar

Method

1Preheat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4/350°F and put a baking sheet in at the same time. Butter or oil your large, regular heavy duty fir-tree shaped Bundt tin (2.5 litres capacity / $2\frac{1}{2}$ quart capacity) **very**, **very** thoroughly. (I use Wilton Bake Easy, non-stick spray.)

2 Either put all the ingredients except the icing sugar into the processor and blitz together; or mix by hand or in a freestanding mixer as follows: – Cream together the butter and sugar in a mixing bowl until light and fluffy. – Add the eggs one at a time, whisking each one in with a tablespoon of flour. – Fold in the rest of the flour, and add the bicarbonate of soda, the yogurt and vanilla extract. Pour and spoon the mixture into

the greased tin and spread about evenly.

3 Place the tin on the preheated baking sheet in the oven and cook for 45–60 minutes until well risen and golden. After 45 minutes, push a skewer into the centre of the cake. If it comes out clean, the cake is cooked. Let it sit out of the oven for 15 minutes.

4 Gently pull away the edges of the cake from the tin with your fingers, then turn out the cake.

5 Once cool, dust with the icing sugar pushed through a small sieve, to decorate: think fresh snowfall on the Alps.

MAKE AHEAD TIP: Make the cake, turn out and leave to cool. Wrap in Clingfilm and foil and store in an airtight container for up to 2 weeks.

FREEZE AHEAD TIP: Make, wrap and freeze the cake for up to 3 months. Thaw overnight in a cool room. I did this last year and presented it as a birthday cake for a family member on Christmas Eve.

Nerys's Natty Nosh



Being a Home Economics teacher I was very keen to encourage my own children to be confident in the kitchen. It's part of becoming independent and self-sufficient. Both my children enjoy cooking and found their knowledge and skills very beneficial when they left home and began college life.

Cooking should be fun, but at all times be

supervised when children are involved. This is a very simple recipe to follow and children love it, but always stress the dangers around the kitchen before commencing.

Malteser and Mars Bar Slice makes 24

Ingredients

- 1 cup of Maltesers plus extra to decorate (280g pack)
- 4 Mars Bars (4 x 53g bars)
- ½ cup Condensed Milk (125ml)
- 1 pack of double chocolate cookies (250g)
- 2 blocks of Cadbury Milk Chocolate (2 x 200g blocks)
- 100g unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil

Method

- 1 Line the base and sides of a swiss roll tin with baking paper.
- 2 Crush the chocolate biscuits (place the biscuits in a sturdy plastic bag and use the end of a rolling pin to beat).
- 3 Roughly crush 1 cup of Maltesers.
- 4 Dice the Mars Bars into small pieces.
- 5 In a small saucepan over a low heat, melt the butter and condensed milk, stirring until combined.
- 6 Add the roughly crushed Maltesers and Mars Bars to the crushed biscuits and stir through. Then add the melted butter and condensed milk and stir until combined it will be very sticky!
- 7 Pour the mixture into the slice tin and flatten with the back of a metal spoon.
- Pop it in the fridge for approximately an hour until it has completely cooled.
- 8 Melt both of the blocks of chocolate and add 1 teaspoon of vegetable oil to the melted mixture, making sure you stir it in.
- 9 Pour the melted chocolate over the cooled slice and then decorate with remaining Maltesers.
- 10 Put the slice back into the fridge and cut into pieces before it has completely set. Enjoy!




