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FROM THE VICARAGE Julian E LI White

We stand on the point of the most important date in the Christian Calendar. Easter Day.

One of the earliest descriptions of the Christian community was that of 'The Easter People' and this indicates the centrality of their belief that the message of Easter – the triumph of life over death – has defined their faith more than anything else.

You could be forgiven for thinking that this assertion has been somewhat diluted over the centuries.

The poet Steve Turner reminds us that sentimentality, platitudes and general 'dumbing-down' have all played their corrosive influence in this respect. In his work *Christmas is Really For The Children* he argues the following:

Christmas is really for the children. Especially for the children who like animals, stables, stars and babies....

Easter is not really for the children unless accompanied by a cream filled egg. It has whips, blood, nails... It involves politics, God and the sins of the world...

Or they'd do better to wait for a re-run of Christmas without asking too many questions about what Jesus did when he grew up or whether there's any connection.

No one should pretend that the journey of Lent into Easter, if taken seriously, is an easy ride. It makes demands of us. Not least a confrontation with the deepest part of our character and the willingness to meet God face to face. Are we able to handle such an encounter? It is small wonder that it is said that one of the most

difficult things to achieve is silence in our daily prattling and the ability to listen. It is only then that we stand in the presence of God and that is the whole point of the Easter experience.

We welcome Revd. John Waters to a regular position on the rota of services offered by Shirenewton Church. This is part of the restructuring of the Severn Wye Ministry Area and we look forward to his priestly contribution as we seek to meet the needs of contemporary society. In particular, John will be well known by many members of Saint Thomas a Beckett and we look forward to his ministry among us.

The picnic bench on Mynyddbach Green has now been repaired and a clear preservative has been applied. Hopefully, this should enable it to be used for some time to come.



County Councillor Report March 2023 County Councillor Brown advised:

Budget 2023/24

Cabinet on the 1st of March 2023

In terms of changes on the budget as a result of the consultation the current changes in the final proposals are set out in paragraph 3.32 of the Cabinet report.

a) Cabinet is fully aware and acknowledging of the risks regarding deliverability of savings within adult social care, and in the face of demographic challenge and the ongoing ripple effects of the pandemic and pressures within health. To that end and consistent with concerns raised by residents and member scrutiny, £1m of savings

will now be delayed into 2024/25 and subsequently reassessed.

- b) To now limit the increase in before school clubs from £1 to £2 per day to only the first child, thus ensuring that families with more than one child are not disproportionately impacted.
- c) To remove the proposed increase in the concessionary fee for home to school transport.
- d) To remove the proposal for an annual subscription of £30 for users of the Grass Routes bus service, and in light of recent funding announcements causing uncertainty on what type of bus services can be sustainably delivered in Monmouthshire.
- e) To remove a proposed increase in the licence fees for pavement cafés and to ensure that businesses are supported to flourish in our town centres and across Monmouthshire.
- f) To remove a proposed reduction in opening hours in leisure centres during the summer months, leaving it to the service to undertake ongoing review and to ensure that services are responding to customer demands.
- g) To confirm that opening hours at community hubs will now no longer be reduced, albeit community hubs will still be operated with reduced staffing levels as planned.
- h) The removal of a proposed saving to delete a post in the internal audit team resulting from feedback received from the Governance & Audit Committee and concern that the level of audit coverage will fall below acceptable levels.
- i) Further investment is made in the capital programme, and that will result in additional investment in our highways infrastructure and specifically £500k in 2023/24 and each of the subsequent three years of the capital MTFP for pothole repair.
- j) Capital investment of £50,000 to allow for surveys and assessments to be undertaken of bridges across the Council's public rights of way network, and to ensure that a risk-based approach is being taken to maintain assets and keep the network safe.

The proposals currently include a 5.95% rise in Council Tax.

The end of the meeting discussed ECO4 and ECO4 Flex energy efficiency and the eligibility for low-income households to ask for help.

Home to School Transport Savings Proposals

Current Policy

As per the Learner Travel Measure and Monmouthshire's Transport Policy free home to school transport is now only provided to pupils who attend their catchment or nearest school and live more than 1.5 miles from their Primary School and more than 2 miles from their Secondary School. These distances relate to the shortest available walking route between home and school, accompanied by an adult if necessary.

Proposed Savings Policy

The above proposals for school transport changes means limiting free home to school transport down to the statutory distances. It would then apply to children who live more than 2 miles from their Primary school and more than 3 miles from their Secondary school.

Impact in the Shirenewton Ward

Restriction to Statutory Distance with Walking Route Available

This first change which may impact 131 pupils across Monmouthshire of which 3 pupils are currently in the Shirenewton Ward, 2 at Pwllmeyric and 1 at Mounton for the primary school.

<u>Proposed Restriction to Statutory Distance with no available walking route- 24/25</u>

In the second phase of school bus cuts, which may impact 197 pupils across Monmouthshire of which 18 are currently in the Shirenewton Ward, 9 in Mathern for the Secondary school, 2 in Pwllmeyric and 1 in Mounton for the primary school and 1 in Shirenewton and 5 in Earlswood for the primary school.

The aim would be to take active travel measures to make such routes available walking routes by highways measures.

Concessionary places on school buses may be available when statutory places are allocated at a current cost of £440 per annum per pupil.

The Final Budget proposals are to be considered by a full council meeting on the 9th of March 2022, so potentially subject to change.

When I raised concerns at the meeting on the 2nd of March about cuts in school transport, the response from the administration was that it is in line with other Local Authorities on restricting to statutory distances.

Despite the proposals being in the budget there will be a consultation later in the year on these proposals prior to any implementation when residents can make representations.

Performance and Overview Committee on the 27th of February 2023

Empty and Second Homes

<u>Pre-decision scrutiny of the Council Tax Premiums Consultation:</u>
<u>Long Term Empty Properties and Second Homes - To consider the findings of the public consultation exercise on introducing council tax premiums from 1st April 2024.</u>

This committee considered a report on empty and second homes with the recommendations:

• That the Council use its discretionary powers to introduce a council tax premium for long term empty properties on a sliding scale from 100% to 300% effective from 1st April 2024. With a 100% premium applying to properties empty for 1 year, a 200% premium to properties empty for 2 years and a 300% premium to properties empty for 3 years or more.

That the Council use its discretionary powers to introduce a council tax premium for second homes of 100% from 1st April 2024 and will give further consideration to the impact on the local economy before utilising that power.

The premium would be in addition to the full council tax, the idea of which is to get properties available for occupation. There are 400 empty properties and 190 second homes in Monmouthshire. There will continue to be the following exceptions:

- Class 1 dwellings being marketed for sale this exception is time-limited for one year.
- Class 2 dwellings being marketed for let this exception is time-limited for one year.

- Class 3 annexes forming part of, or being treated as part of, the main dwelling.
- Class 4 dwellings which would be someone's sole or main residence if they were not residing in armed forces accommodation.
- Class 5 occupied caravan pitches and boat moorings (second homes only).
- Class 6 seasonal homes where year-round occupation is prohibited (second homes only).
 Class 7 job-related dwellings (second homes only).

The Committee discussion was centred upon the Council using its discretion in addition to the above general exceptions and any appeals process for example where progress on the property was delayed by planning. The Committee considered this report as part of pre-decision scrutiny.

Compline: The ancient office of Compline derives its name from a Latin word meaning 'completion' (completorium). It is above all a service of quietness and reflection before rest at the end of the day. It is most effective when the ending is indeed an ending, without additions, conversation or noise.

Holy Tuesday

7pm -Taize Service at St Mary's Priory, Chepstow

Taizé (pronounced: tay-zay) is a prayerful form of music known for its simple, yet rich and meditative character. Taizé music often takes the structure of an ostinato (a simple melody that repeats over and over) and is meant to serve as a kind of musical centering prayer.

Holy Wednesday

7pm - Eucharist Service at St Arvan's Church

Holy Eucharist: The Eucharist is at the heart of Christian worship. It is celebrated by Christians around the world as a memorial of the death and resurrection of Jesus, in response to his words at the final meal he shared with his disciples, 'Do this in remembrance of me.' In the Eucharist, God invites us to his table as a foretaste of the heavenly banquet which he has prepared for people of all

Maundy Thursday

7pm - Tenebrae Service at Mathern Church

A tenebrae service typically takes place in a dark room lit by a number of candles. A series of Scripture readings chronicles Jesus's final week, ending with his burial. After each reading a candle is snuffed out, until only the Christ candle remains lit.

Good Friday

11am - Stations of the Cross at St Pierre Church

The Stations of the Cross have formed part of Christian devotion at Passiontide for many centuries because they enable us to engage actively with the path of suffering walked by Jesus. They originated when early Christians visited Jerusalem and wanted to follow literally in the footsteps of Jesus, tracing the path from Pilate's house to Calvary. They would pause for prayer and devotion at various points. Eventually, those pilgrims brought the practice back to their home countries and ever since then Christians of differing traditions have used this form of devotion.

Holy Saturday

7.30pm - Easter Vigil Service at St Arvans Church

Easter Vigil, also called the Paschal Vigil or the Great Vigil of Easter, is the first official celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus & renewing baptismal vows. It is held in the hours of darkness between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter Day – most commonly in the evening of Holy Saturday or midnight – and is the first celebration of Easter, days traditionally being considered to begin at sunset.

Letter from E.I. Jones, dated 16th April 1852.(D 1128)

Quotes the Norton, architect's report:

"The nave roof which is very ancient is now (so) completely decayed in parts that it must be replaced, nor do I think it desirable to use any of the old materials in its reconstruction. The windows in most cases are very ill restored, with wooden mullions in lieu of the ancient stone ones; these require to be entirely renewed.

He (the architect) then goes on to mention the decayed state of the walls and the necessity for repewing - but from the small size of the church and the removal of the unsightly gallery, which blocks up the west window, he is not able to increase materially the number of sittings without adding to the sacred edifice."

Later in the letter: Shirenewton is I am sorry to say the poorest, and the most overburdened with a pauper population in the Chepstow district - the exposed situation and shallow soil afford no encouragement to wealthy occupiers; the rate payers generally are small tenant occupiers, a class quite unable to bear any heavy expenditure. We have two large landed proprietors residing in the parish but from one of them we have no hope of receiving assistance - I do not think he will offer any serious opposition but he will do nothing to forward the work - the other has very munificently given £100 for the new aisle and £50 for repairs.

Letter from William Lawley, of Bryngwyn, dated 20th April 1852.

"The parish of Shirenewton lies upon a continuation of the same wild hills as Devauden Green which was brought so much into notice by the self denying labours of the good old schoolmaster James Davies. The population is generally of the like scattered and very poor who live in cottages built on generally upon the waste and surrounded by a few pockets of unproductive land which have been claimed by their industry from the surrounding common. It is only in the last 13 or 14 years that a parsonage house has been built and the rectors have residence on the spot, and their efforts to improve the people have been greatly impeded by the want of substance and sufficient accommodation in their parish church. I shall very deeply regret if the present attempts should fail for want of sufficient funds. The necessity of very extensive repairs contemporaneously with the important addition of a north aisle will add greatly to the cost."

One other letter comments that no-one has a living memory of any repairs being undertaken to the church. If this includes recollections from long dead parents, then it would take us back about a century, so it is unlikely that anything had been done since about 1750 at least.

The bells were hung in 1757 - so this would suggest that a restoration was carried out then.

Shirenewton Recreation Association Survey 2023 Results Feedback

A very big thank you to all those residents who took the time and trouble to complete the above survey last month.

The survey was distributed to 480 households across Shirenewton, Mynyddbach, Earlswood and Newchurch with a response rate of 28%. We are very pleased with the constructive feedback received and the responses are summarised below.

1. The principal uses by respondents, which can be for more than one purpose, are currently:

Attending organised village events - 84%

Taking in the views and wide open space - 68%

Using the children's play area - 35%

Dog walking - 34%

Exercise - 34%

2. Frequency of visits to the Recreation Ground by respondents:

Daily - 21%

Weekly - 32%

Monthly - 22%

Less often - 25%

- 3. 60% of respondents were happy with the Recreation Ground in its current form.
- 4. The things that mattered most to respondents and would make them use the Recreation ground more were:

Seating areas / benches / picnic tables - 80 respondents Improve drainage to field - 67 respondents Improve current sports ground for community use - 59

respondents

5. The vast majority of respondents skipped the any other comments question but from those that did comment there was a clear feeling that the current facilities (recreation field and hall) are under - utilised and could be improved for all age groups. Suggestions were wide ranging from enhanced parking / accessibility, resurfacing of the tennis court, cycling / jogging areas and improved play areas. There was also a clear appetite for more community events in the hall including coffee mornings / afternoon teas together with table tennis and bridge clubs.

The next step will be for the Committee to explore improvements and related funding in the light of the feedback received before consulting residents further.

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
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Gardening Corner

I'm writing this month's article feeling a little battered and bruised — literally. 11 March saw me go into hospital for a new hip operation. Fortunately, everything went well with the surgery and I'm now at home on two sticks and learning to walk again. We managed to catch up pretty well with all of the outstanding jobs in the garden, so hopefully there won't be a big backlog waiting my return. It will be novel not to be able to drive for six weeks, but I won't be missing the relentless madness of or major roads! Regular readers may remember that I have always been a bit of a nurd when it comes to garden tools. So long as it is wooden handled with stainless steel workings then I'm a mug to buy the latest 'must have' tool.

Over the years this has meant that I have built up a bit of a collection of what I would refer to in my eyes as 'sub-standard' tools – so they are either plastic handled or aren't stainless steel! We pride ourselves on re-cycling as much of anything that we lay our hands on. A trip to the Monmouthshire recycling depot at Five Lanes has been a regular trip about every three months or so. We stack everything together in piles until we have enough to make a trip worthwhile. It has always amazed me, especially in the metals skip, just how much seemingly very good equipment gets disposed of, from pushchairs, bikes, tools; the list seems to be endless. Although this has improved greatly recently with the recycling shop open and doing brisk business – always worth a nosey around after you have dropped a load off! I had already been down to dispose of a lot of bits and pieces, and they often really are just that. With a mixture of electrical wiring, old horse shoes (there seems to be a lot around here), bucket handles, lumps of iron from an old railway carriage as well as more recent additions, the biggest being our old wood burning heating stove that gave up the ghost over a year ago. This had languished in our conservatory since it was taken out. Recently it was dismantled / destroyed depending on how difficult it was to-dismantle. Some bits were saved, as the new stove is – on purpose – the same colour. So heating drawer, doors and various flaps have been stored, just in case the new bits might fail one day. Having spares will save a fortune. One good thing with the German manufacturer is that they have changed nothing design wise, since we bought our first stove of the same model, some 35 years ago. It looked smart then, and still looks the part now. Looking in the skip at the recycling centre, there still appeared to be a mix of what appeared to be really good, functional tools as previously. We wanted to get rid of our old tools, but they were still perfectly serviceable and so I was reluctant to throw them into the skip. Enter TWAM. 'Tools With A Mission', a church-based charity. Look at their website at twam.co.uk. They send around 300 tonnes of tools and other items to Africa each year, and their aim is to train individuals in their use, as well as how to establish a business. Often those in receipt are young, and sadly very often, they will have lost their parents, and be trying desperately to support their siblings. The website carries a list of things they want and include carpentry, plumbing, gardening, mechanics, and farming for the men, and sewing machines (hand, electric it makes no difference), knitting machines, or any of the fore mentioned for the women. There is also a clear list of what

is not acceptable. Computers, and appropriate books are also welcome – so long as they can be used to help individuals grasp an understanding of creating a business and then running it successfully. The charity is based in Ipswich, Suffolk but they have a couple of depots about the country, where they give the tools a bit of love and attention before putting them into 'packs' for the individual end user. So, a carpentry pack will include saws, hammers, chisels, measuring equipment, etc. The packs then get loaded into a container ready for shipment once full. They can't repair broken tools however, as they simply don't have the time or resource for this. The best though is that they do have a very good spread of local collection points all around the country. The nearest to us is a very friendly individual called Alan Parker on the outskirts of Croesyceiliog. All you need to do is check the website for the tools they want, arrange a suitable day and time to deliver to Alan, bung them in the car and drop them off. We had a full car load, as our fishing club was recently closed down, so many of their unwanted tools were included as well. So, what about gardening, well, as I said, we were busy making the most of the dry weather (if you can remember that), by spending most of our time weeding and turning the ground. All of the vegetable areas have been cleared, some have had black weed matting put over them to ensure that they remain weed free for planting time, and some have been covered with large cloches. The majority of the flower borders have also been cleaned, although time did run out in the end, so those that didn't get 'done' will have to wait for now until I am mobile enough. Most of the roses got pruned as well, bar four climbers. March is the last month for pruning, so if you haven't done your roses by the time you read this, then leave them until next year – just as these four will be! The first sowings of broad beans, peas and lettuce were put on the hot bench a month ago, and were planted out in the large tunnel as the

very last job on the list before my operation. Apparently, these are establishing well! I planted some really early sweet peas in their as well, so hopefully we will get some much earlier flowers from these than anything planted outside. All peas and broad beans are pretty hardy, so they should all shrug off any cold nights – unless we get something really exceptional. In which case they will get the horticultural fleece treatment. I had sown a few of the really early half-hardy annuals and a few perennial flowers seeds as well and as I write this the assistant head gardener, is down in the greenhouse potting these on into individual cells. Other various crops were also sown earlier, so the onions and tomatoes for the shows, along with mixed herbs and these will be planted on into larger pots as and when it becomes necessary. The other job I wanted to complete prior to my incapacitation, was to sort out the first and second early potatoes. Half of the early potatoes were planted direct into the large greenhouse border, with the rest in one of the large tunnel beds. The idea being that the greenhouse will crop four or five weeks before any outside planted potatoes, and the tunnel ones would be two or three weeks earlier – thus extending the cropping period for as long as possible. The second early potatoes were all placed in 5 litre pots and are currently standing on the around between the first earlies. This makes best use of the limited space and best use of water as well. Any excess water from the pots will drain into the ground and water the first earlies. At least that is the theory. Once things start to grow, the pots will simply be moved on and planted outside as and when appropriate (or necessary). As I recover, the next few weeks will see sowing and repotting duties expanding exponentially. But more of that next time.

One job I was very pleased to complete at the start of March was all of the pruning in the orchard. This is the first time I have ever managed to prune everything and was well overdue. As with the roses, if you haven't done this by the time you read this, it is too late. The sap will be rising well in the trees and pruning will allow the wounds to seep too much.

So far, all of the bees appear to have survived. I have fed them with fondant, but they need more. Unfortunately, they will have to wait until I can manage to move about well enough again. Happy gardening until next month, *Steve and Felicity Hunt*.

Is that brilliant or what?

OK, so what is ChatGPT? It essentially an advanced version of the chatbots you get on website masquerading as 'customer service'. But it's so advanced it can do just about anything. Microsoft is so impressed that they are already spending billions to incorporate ChatGPT in its products, such as its search engine Bing and its collaboration tools. 

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STARGAZING



In the evening the brightest planet Venus is near the horizon to the west and is just below the very fine crescent Moon on 23rd April. The orange-coloured planet Mars is higher in the sky above the constellation Orion. Mars is near the crescent Moon on the 25th April.

The seven stars of the Plough constellation are directly overhead and Leo, the Lion can be seen to the South. Orion the Hunter is just above the Western horizon whilst W-shaped Cassiopeia is to the North-West. The Plough and Cassiopeia can always be seen at our latitude, but Leo and Orion are only above our horizon during the Winter months.

The second star from the left of the seven stars in the Plough is called Mizar. On closer inspection it can be seen to have a close companion called Alcor. Mizar and Alcor together are sometimes called the "Horse and Rider", and the ability to resolve the two stars with the naked eye is often quoted as a test of eyesight.

The two stars furthest from the handle of the Plough point to the North Star. The North Star or Polaris is approximately 400 light years away. This is a distance of approximately 2,000,000,000,000,000 miles! The light we now see from this star left the North Star 400 years ago.

On clear nights, when the Moon is new and seen as a fine crescent, the rest of the Moon can often be seen as a very dark grey against the black sky. Whilst the bright crescent is directly illuminated by the Sun, the rest of the Moon is in its own shadow. The shadow is dark grey rather than black because of "Earthshine", where light reflected from Earth illuminates the Moon very faintly.
